20,000 POUND BLAST

Contractor Hutchins, on the Menard Extension of the Frisco, Touches off \$1,500 Blast.

The Frisco and Santa Fe people in building their Brady extension have encountered some extremely hard rock, and enormous quantities of blasting explosives have been used. A dispatch from Menard tells of one blast last week which cost the contractor \$1500, as follows:

A black powder blast out of the ordinary was touched off near here Thursday by J. C. Gallager, powder man for E. D. Hutchins, contractor on the extension of the Fort Worth and Rio Grande railway from Brady to Menard. 20,000 pounds were used, placed in twelve drill holes, twenty feet deep in solid limestone rock and touched off with an electric battery. The blast was at 36 miles station, two miles from Menard, but at this distance the force rattled window sashes in the town. Some idea of the force of the powder may be had when it is known that an apparently solid mass of rock fifty feet wide and ninety yards long was thrown six or seven hundred feet in the air, yet it made but little noise.

Contractor Hutchins says the blast cost \$1,500, but it paid. Several photos of the blast were taken.

A thief visited the Brady wagon yards Friday night, and several sound sleepers were relieved of money and valuables, watches, knives and some money being secured. City Marshal Sheridan and Deputy Latta got in behind the thief and on Tuesday report him safely behind the bars in the Ballinger jail. His name is said to be Green, and he will not be returned here at once as the Ballinger officers have a prior claim.

The fire alarm was sounded Monday night from the electric light station where sparks had ignited the coal bin partition. The engineer did not intend to sound a fire alarm, but blew a signal for the night man which was mistaken for a fire alarm and the fire bell did the rest. The blaze amounted to nothing in the way of damage, but the excitement was intense, as the shows were in progress at both the Vendome and Lyric.

## TWO VERDICTS GIVEN

District Court Has Been Busy All Week on Damage Suit Cases--Criminal Docket Next Week.

The time of district court has been devoted to the civil docket this week, and up to yesterday afternoon three jury cases had come up, two of which were settled by verdict. The case of J. F. Tindel vs. City Marshal Paul Sheridan, et al., was on trial.

In the case of W. P. Neal vs. the Frisco railroad, suit for damages for personal injuries, the jury returned a verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$4000.

In the case of R. D. Dyer vs. John Martin, suit for commission on land deal, the plaintiff was awarded the sum of \$1501.42.

The criminal docket will be taken up next week. Two murder cases are set for Monday, and a special venire of 72 men in each case has been ordered. These cases are State vs. Wesley Spiller, and State vs. Mary Daniels.

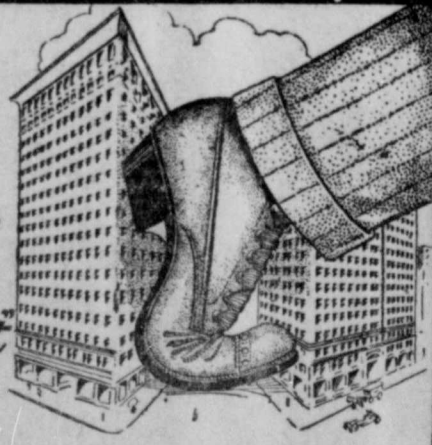

## THE SAN ANGELO FAIR

Arrangements Have Been Made for New  
and Novel Attractions and  
Entertainments.

The annual fair and carnival at San Angelo will be held Oct. 3rd to 8th, inclusive. Race purses aggregating \$7000 are hung up. The stake races, which closed to entry Sept. 1st, are well filled, there being sixteen entries of high class horses for one running race for a purse of \$500.00. Eight \$500 purses and seven \$250 purses are to be scattered among the runners, pacers and trotters, besides a number of \$100 and \$150 purses, will be contested for by the ponies. At the track at this time a number of the best horses in Texas and Oklahoma are in training, getting ready for the fastest and highest money races west of Fort Worth.

Autoists will compete for prizes aggregating \$1,075, there being five events commencing with Oct. 4th; or one each day. The cattle, horses, swine, sheep, goat and poultry departments each have attractive premium lists. Agricultural products will also stand to carry off a heavy list of premiums.

There will be a matrimonial department, a baby show, bronco busting and other features. As a fitting climax to each day's program, a large and well known carnival company will hold the boards on the down town business streets, in fact San Angelo will be turned over to the pleasure seekers.

A special feature will be the trial flights of two aeroplanes now being constructed in San Angelo by two local amateur aviators, Noah Smith and Ben G. Campbell.

A woman's building, which is being erected by the ladies of San Angelo at a cost of \$3,500.00 will contain the ladies' work department as well as providing a rest room for the women and children.

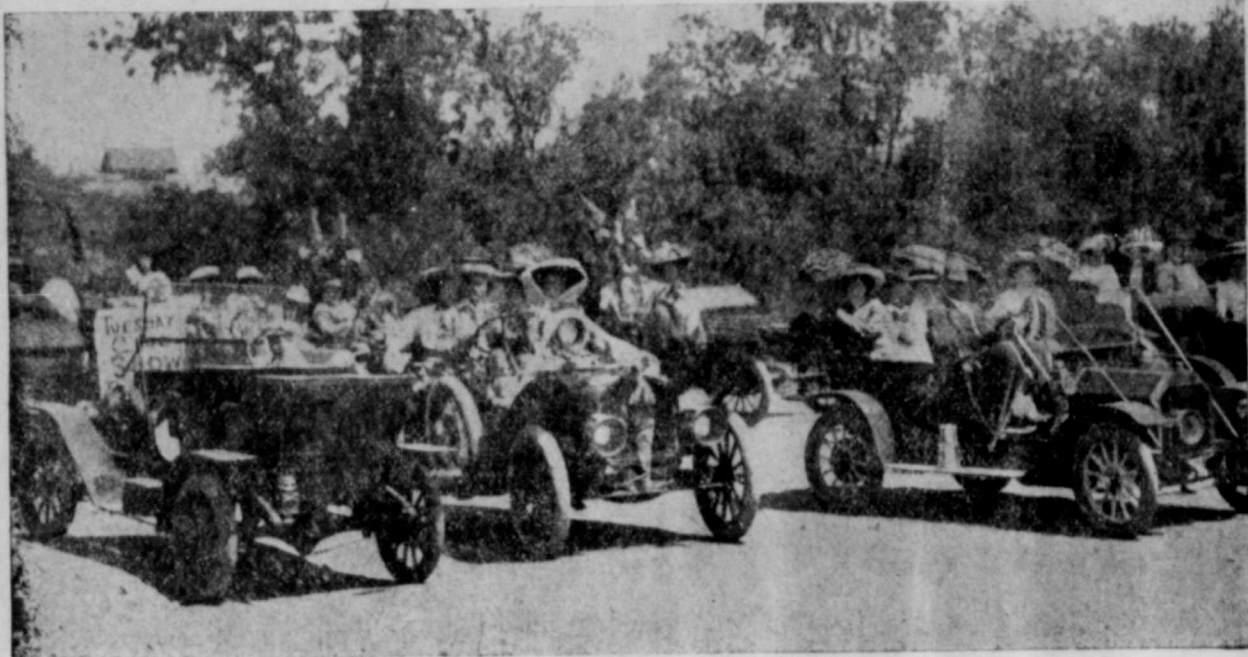

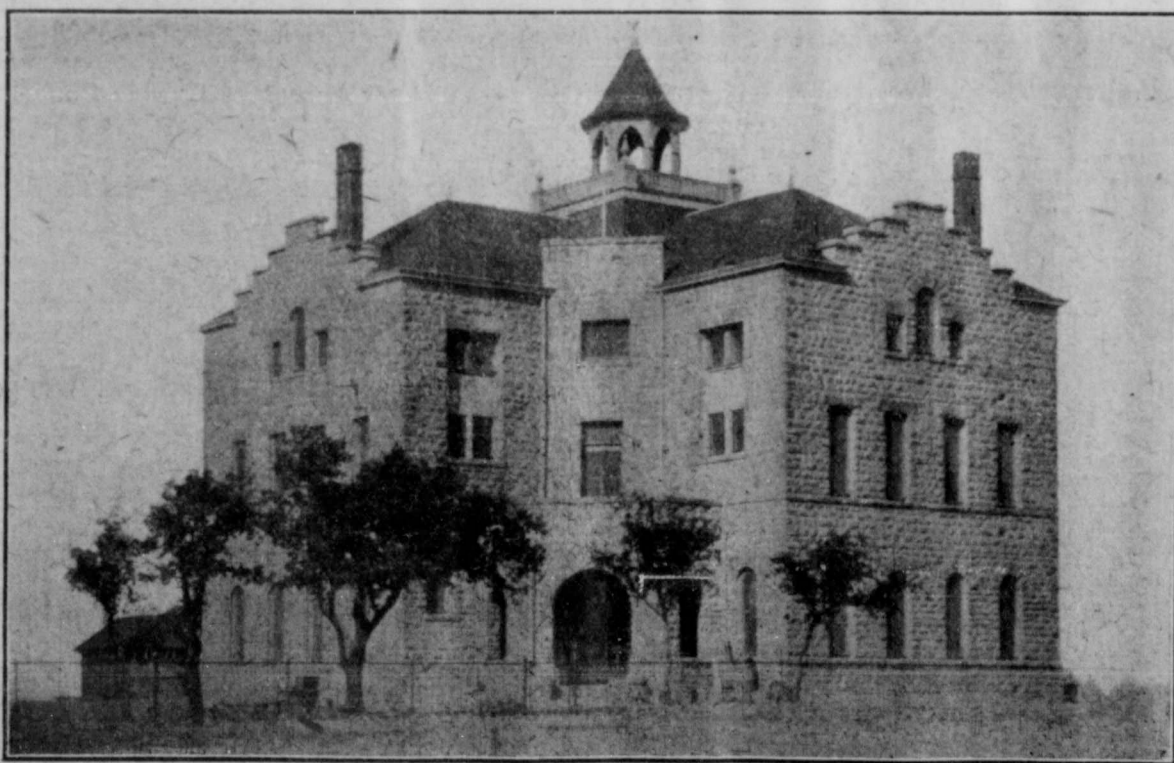

## EXTRA GOOD TURNOUT

Brady Farmer Finds that it Pays to Plant  
Selected Seed—1265 Pounds  
Yields 520-lb Bale.

That it pays to plant selected cotton seed has been amply evidenced by R. L. Frankum, a McCulloch county farmer who lives four miles north of town. Mr. Frankum on last Friday brought to the Bauhof gin 1265 pounds of seed cotton which yielded a 520-lb bale. He brought the tickets to this office to prove the statement, and Mr. Bauhof stated that this was the best turnout he had ever seen in Brady, and he has been ginning here for many years.

Mr. Frankum secured the seed for this field of cotton from A. B. Mabian of Lockhart. It is called the Mabian Improved Triumph. He purchased 20 bushels for \$50, and planted 40 acres. The bale ginned Friday was the first picking, and Mr. Frankum says that besides securing more lint this cotton will also make nearly twice as much to the acre as other cotton he planted on the same farm. The improved Mabian is a short jointed stalk and bears a large 5-lock boll. The seed are much smaller than the ordinary cotton seed and are uniform in size.

It takes from 1500 to 1700 pounds seed cotton usually to make a 500-lb bale, and Mr. Frankum thinks that the new brand is the best that can be planted. He will save all the seed from his crop this year, and will have some for sale.
