CONTRACT IS CLOSED

McCulloch County Secures Government Agent for Demonstration Farm Work. Contract is Signed.

I am advised that the United States Agricultural Department has appointed J. T. Love, as Special Agent of the Department, for work in your locality.

Mr. Love lives near Cleburne. I have known him for a number of years. He is one of our very best citizens and an entirely capable and up-to-date farmer. I am certain to be within proper limitations when I say he is regarded as the best and most intelligent farmer in the vicinity in which he resides.

He is not a showy man but he will give you splendid service and I regard your community as very fortunate in that he has been selected for service in your vicinity. I understand that he is detailed for work about the middle of next month.

The above letter explains itself and shows that the Brady Commercial Club is alive and doing business. The club took up the matter of securing the farmers' co-operative demonstration work some weeks ago, as told by The Standard at the time, and on Wednesday Mr. J. L. Quicksall, special agent for Central and West Texas, came to Brady and presented a contract for the commercial club to sign, which was done, and Mr. Love will enter upon his duties in this county in a few weeks.

For the fiscal year ending June 3, 1911, Congress appropriated \$28,000 for the carrying on of this work in Mr. Quicksall's territory. The demand for agents has been so heavy that this appropriation was insufficient and it has been necessary for counties desiring agencies to put up some money. The Commercial Club was asked for \$250 and agreed to pay it, and the contract signed Wednesday covered that feature of the proposition.

Mr. Quicksall has agents under him, and the work done by these agents consists of visiting the various farms interested and giving practical instructions in the best methods of farming. The agents are always chosen for their knowledge of farming. They are not altogether "book farmers," but are practical men who have made a success of farming under the improved methods. One of the most important items in the work is the organization of "Boys' Corn Clubs," and these clubs in Texas now total a membership of 10,000 farmer boys, of which 6000 are in Mr. Quicksall's territory. These boys are given practical instruction in corn culture, and the results attained have been little short of wonderful. The same will be undertaken here, and the girls will also be given opportunities to organize poultry and sewing clubs.

It is desired to have 40 or 50 farmers in the county interested, and to all who will promise to follow instructions Mr. Love will give personal supervision.

The securing of this agent is a big step forward in the development of the county and big results are anticipated.

COTTON SEED DROPS LARGE CATTLE SALES

Twenty-Five Per Cent Slump Reported in Price of Cotton Seed Oil—Further Drop Predicted.

Relative to the drop in prices on cotton seed products the following appeared in Tuesday's Dallas News:

"The mills are all up in the air today," said W. I. Yopp, commenting on the break in the cotton seed market yesterday. "Prime crude oil sold last Wednesday for 60c a gallon for immediate shipment. Today it sold for 45c for November shipment, and for immediate shipment at 49c. This is a difference of 25 per cent. Take 25 per cent from the price of cotton seed last week and you have about \$22 or \$22.50 a ton left."

"The big packers are out of the market. They say they expect to get their supplies at 40c. The price of oil here in August was due to the squeeze in the New York market. Refined oil, in barrels, for October delivery sold in New York in August for 9.4c a pound; today it sold down to 8.12 a pound."

"The bottom has dropped out of the squeeze in New York, and the market is getting back to normal. Today a year ago October oil was selling at 40c and the mills have a right to expect 40c oil again in November this year. The break in the seed market is of course due to the going to pieces of the New York oil market. In the latter part of August oil sold as high as 65c. At the end of September it is below 50c."

A report from Ennis says that the cotton seed market over the State had gone to pieces, dropping from \$30 and \$31 per ton to \$22. Three of the Ennis gins were offering but \$22 yesterday, one was still offering \$23 and another \$28. One gin man stated that he had assurance that the market would go down to \$20 before the end of the week.

The break in the market caused quite a sensation there, where a local fight had put the price up to \$31.

The local market is unaffected so far as the two Brady oil mills are concerned, as they are still paying their opening price of \$25 per ton for seed. The \$33 price made by local ginners, however, has been reduced to \$25.

Two-Year-Old Steers Bring \$26 and Yearlings \$18 in San Angelo Country. Many Cattle Selling.

The San Angelo Standard reports cattle deals recently aggregating nearly \$200,000, as follows:

One of the largest cattle deals of September is the sale of 3,500 head of two-year-old steers by Willis Johnson to George B. Hendricks for a consideration approximating \$87,500. Three thousand head of the steers were shipped to Mr. Hendricks' holdings in Oklahoma, and the other five hundred head were delivered at the purchaser's ranch near Miles.

Mr. Johnson, this fall, sold off \$125,000 worth of cattle, including \$15,000 worth he has disposed of on the market.

Cattle deals aggregating \$88,000 were closed today. The purchasers being Blackstone and Slaughter, ranchmen of Iron and Reagan counties and of Oklahoma. In all they purchased 2,700 head of cattle, paying on the average about \$26 round for the two year old steers.

From John Chambers, the Buena Ventura ranch, they purchased 1,000 head of 2-year-old steers; from Willis Johnson, 700 head of steer yearlings and 700 head of 2-year-old steers; from W. C. Barren, 300 head of 2-year-old steers; from Harris Bros., 1,000 head of yearling steers at \$18 per head.

Some of these cattle will be shipped to Oklahoma and the remainder of them will be grazed on the Irion and Reagan ranch of Blackstone and Slaughter.

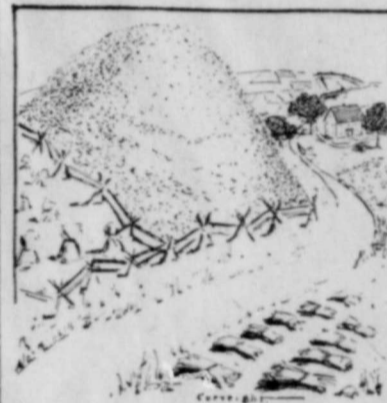

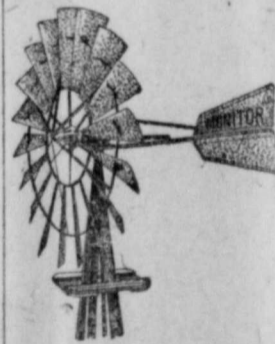

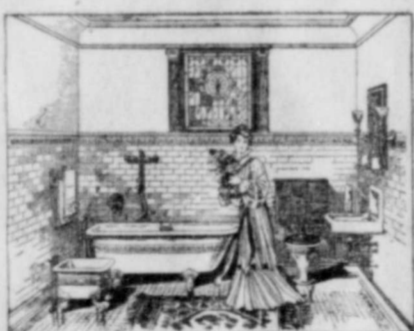

PREDICTS 15c COTTON

Former Selling Agent for Texas Farmers Union Urges Farmers to Hold Their Cotton.

J. C. Allbritton, former selling agent for the Texas Farmers Union, is in Brownwood today representing the W. L. Moody company of Galveston, and to a Bulletin man said he confidently expected the price of cotton to reach 15 cents early in the season. He said there are three reasons why the price is low. One is the fact that the bull leaders have withdrawn from the market in New York. Another is the bill of lading troubles between this and other countries, and the third is the disposition on the part of the farmers to turn their cotton loose as soon as it is picked. "Not until within the last ten days have the farmers shown a disposition to hold cotton," said Mr. Allbritton, "and of course to glut the market will run the price down. Never before in the history of the country has so much cotton been received in Galveston during September."

Mr. Allbritton is now in the employ of W. L. Moody & Company and is seeking consignments of cotton, on which the company proposes to advance as much as \$50 or \$60 per bale at the rate of 6 per cent interest. He says the Brownwood country has never consigned but little cotton and he is here to induce the farmers and business men to do so. He was at Brady last week and reports a nice business. — Brownwood Bulletin.

Farmers—I am in the gin business at the old N. A. Perry south side gin in Brady, and I want to gin your cotton. Can do it right and do it quick. Wm. Bauhof.

A Satisfied Farmer.

J. A. Eklund, who lives on the old Severin place about two miles east of town, was a pleasant caller yesterday. Mr. Eklund has 175 acres of old land in cotton and estimates that he will get a quarter-bale average. On fifty acres of sod land he will not get much as the drouth hurt it badly. He has already taken out 28 bales this season, has sold eight and will hold the balance until about Christmas in the expectation of getting 15 cents for it. One bale sold netted him nearly \$100, counting the seed at \$33 per ton.

Mr. Eklund bought the Severin farm of 400 acres two years ago, at \$50 per acre—the highest price paid for land hereabouts at that time. He was thought by some to be crazy, but results have proven that he was much wiser than those who criticised. He made 76 bales of cotton last season, his crop running from a half to a full bale per acre, and this cotton averaged him between \$80 and \$90 per bale. He has one of the finest farms in Texas and is doing well.

Mr. Eklund has a large family and "lives at home." He raises his own hogs and feed for them and his work stock and cows. He is prospering, and with such energy as his any farmer can prosper in this great country.

Memorium of G. W. Jones, Rochelle,
Texas.

G. W. Jones was born in Hickman county, Kentucky, May 1, 1832, and died at Rochelle, McCulloch county, Texas, at 12:30 a. m., September 23, 1910. He was educated at Clinton College, Kentucky. He came to Texas in 1851, and located in Colorado county, near the old town of Columbus, where he lived for two years, after which time he returned to Kentucky.

In 1854 he married and moved to Audrin county, northeast Missouri, where he lived and taught school until 1859, when he returned to Texas, locating in Grayson county, near the present site of the city of Denison, at that time known as Cypress or Willow Springs.

The deceased was an anti-secessionist and spoke all over North Texas against secession, but entered the army of the Confederacy with the first battalion organized in Grayson, Collin and Fannin counties. He was in the army four years and four months, all of the time he was located west of the Mississippi river with Generals Price and Heintz.

In the fall of 1864 G. W. Jones came to McCulloch county, organized the county and was elected the first county judge, for the short term and was re-elected for the regular term at the general election. He located the county site of said county at Brady, moved from McCulloch county to Llano county in 1880. He was converted to Christianity in 1886 and joined the Missionary Baptist church, entering the ministry in 1887, and was actively engaged in the work till 1901, when bad health and partial paralysis of the vocal organs forced him to abandon the same. He taught school for a quarter of a century.

G. W. Jones moved from Llano county in 1895, locating in Cherokee, San Saba county, for the purpose of educating his children at the West Texas Normal and Business College. He returned to McCulloch county in the spring of 1902, locating in Rochelle, where he engaged in the mercantile business with his boys and where he remained until his death.

It was the writer's privilege to be acquainted with this pioneer and Christian only one year; but there are certain Christian and heroic spirits we meet in life who are congenial and cheer us through life. Such was the character of Elder G. W. Jones. In his opinions he was firm and heroic; no one ever doubting where he stood on any subject, yet he was not obstinate or dogmatic, being ever kind and considerate of the feelings of others. He had grown old gracefully, but not peevish or childish.

His scholarly attainments and well stored mind made it delightful for any one to converse with him. It was my privilege to listen to him unfold intricate phraseology of the Scriptures as if he had been educated in the advanced schools of today.

The infirmities of old age prevented him from being actively engaged in the pulpit or on the platform, but not from active thought on these themes, nor from a Christian life. His own words to me were, "My faith grows stronger, and my hope grows brighter day by day." No one who knew him will doubt this. While his personality is gone the influence of his scholarly Christian life is left as a legacy rich in fruition, to those who knew him best. One of the best lessons we gather from his life was the fatherly affection he had for his children and the filial affection they had for him. It was delightful to see his children anticipating his every want as a mother with her child.

Rest in peace, dear brother, we will meet thee again. J. A. LINCOLN,
