## \$72,000 CATTLE DEALS

Renewal of Activity in Cattle Sales in the San Angelo Country—Prices Holding Up.

The closing of live stock deals amounting to approximately \$72,000 in the past few days marks the renewal of activity in the cattle buying and selling in this section. The prices remain good, and in some instances they show an advance.

The biggest deal closed the past week was the sale by H. C. Campbell, the Kickapoo ranchman, of 1,200 steers, twos and up, to John G. Lipe, of Talala, Oklahoma, at an average of \$25 round, making a total consideration of \$30,000. This bunch will be shipped to the purchaser's pasture in Oklahoma, October 12th.

Jim Bevens, of Menard, bought 820 head of steers, twos and up, from Pleas Childress, Beecher Montgomery and John Henderson, Crockett county stockmen, paying \$22 to \$30 round. These cattle were shipped from San Angelo Saturday over the Santa Fe to Meyers, Oklahoma.

Huey Brothers, last week, shipped 21 cars or 793 head of two-year-old steers to Elgin, Kansas. Of this bunch, 244 head were bought from J. R. Nasworthy, San Angelo, at \$26 round; 399 head from Thomson Brothers, Schleicher county, at \$27.50 to \$30 round; 80 head from Davis Sheen, Schleicher county, at \$26 round.

Pendleton Brothers, of the Bismark Farm, sold their registered Hereford herd, consisting of 11 bulls, 21 cows and calves and 1 dry cow, to a Mr. Tolbert, of Albany. The price paid was \$40 per head. These cattle were shipped to Albany Monday morning of this week.—San Angelo Standard.

### Presbyterian Meeting.

J. Gilmore Smith, Ph. D., superintendent of Home Missions of Brownwood Presbytery, is coming and will have charge of the personal work of the series of meetings which will begin Sunday. Dr. Smith has had large experience along this line of religious work. He will preach at the Presbyterian church next Sunday morning and night. At 3:00 p. m. he will speak to Sunday school teachers and personal workers. Of course everybody is invited. At the close of the afternoon service he will organize a personal workers' class. Rev. J. M. Martin, of Denison, will reach Brady on Monday and will take charge of the preaching.

## OFF TO DALLAS FAIR

Secretary Hardison Left Last Night With the McCulloch County Exhibit.

A Good Showing.

Secretary D. R. Hardison left last night for Dallas, to get the McCulloch county exhibit in place at the fair. The exhibit itself was shipped on the same train by express, and comprised about 1500 pounds in weight.

The exhibit includes about fifty different kinds of McCulloch county products, including all the field and garden products and a fair representation of the county's mineral resources as well. Mr. Hardison was disappointed in securing an exhibit of McCulloch county coal and oil, but hopes to have these items shipped to him within the next few days. He was promised both faithfully, and it is greatly to be regretted that these important products were not included in the original shipment.

Mr. Hardison will be accompanied by his wife, and the two will spend today and tomorrow in arranging and displaying the exhibit in the allotted space in the agricultural hall. While it is not anticipated that this exhibit will be the best on the ground or take any great number of prizes, yet it will be a fair representation of what this county can do in an extremely dry year. A large amount of good literature has been prepared for free distribution at the fair, and much good is sure to result to Brady and McCulloch county as a result of the exhibit.

In preparing this exhibit the Brady Commercial Club has assumed the full responsibility and burden. Not a dollar has been contributed for the purpose; in fact, no one has been asked to contribute anything, but the entire expense will be borne out of the club's regular funds—and it is quite likely the treasury will be empty when the fair is over.

It is a fact, peculiar but true, that in the preparation of this exhibit the club has had positively no assistance from any source except the farmers of McCulloch county. The people of the town as a whole have taken no interest in the matter whatever, either from a financial standpoint or otherwise. Mr. Hardison has labored practically alone, having the assistance of only a few of the faithful and a large number of enterprising farmers. It is a fact worth mentioning that if the farmers themselves had not taken a good interest in the matter it would have been impossible for the county to have been represented. Whatever of good that may result may be charged up to them and to the club strictly.

When you go to the fair be sure to call and see the McCulloch county exhibit in the agricultural hall. It will probably not be the best there, but The Standard is of the opinion that it will be something not to be ashamed of, to say the least.

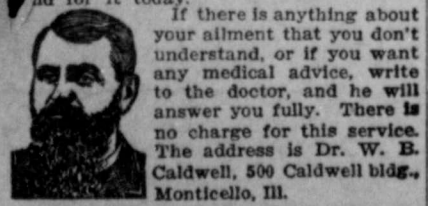

## HOW DUROC-JERSEY HOG WAS DEVELOPED

Iowa Breeder Sheds Some Light on Fashion of Evolving Variety.

### SWINE IDEALS ARE MIXED

Great Size of Breeds First Attract Experimenters Among Western Farmers.

The Duroc-Jersey red hog is the result of a cross of two old breeds, but there is no written history of these two breeds. They were both red breeds and the individual hogs grew to enormous size. Roberts, the well known Iowa swine breeder, has done some investigating into the ancestry of the Duroc-Jerseys, and throws some light on the subject. He says: "The red hogs first engaged my attention in 1879, while living in Indiana, when we used to hear about them being a breed that would attain great weight in New Jersey and New York, while a few had pushed their way as far west as Indiana and Ohio, says a breeder of those popular hogs. In the fall of 1880 I moved to Iowa, into that part then newly settled. My father, the late William Roberts, and myself had the red hog fever pretty bad, and purchased our first foundation stock in the fall of 1882, securing a pair from T. R. Ballsback of Illinois, and I want to say that the sow Roberts' Queen was a fine sow of the type, and would do any man's herd justice today. In 1882 and 1883 the first steps were taken to form a record, though of a local character, at Elkhorn, Wis. The first president was George A. Lytle of Elkhorn, and the first secretary was W. H. Morris of Elkhorn. At the close of their June meeting, 1883, there were nine members on the roll, and it included William H. Holmes of Iowa, who did very much for the breed several years prior to this time in looking up its history and traveling into many states and investigating the different claims made by the breeders of Duroc-Jerseys.

"Prior to this time hardly any two breeders had the same ideal, as they had no general standard of characteristics adopted. One of the first authorities in the early days on the red hogs was C. D. Curtis of Charleston, N. Y. He stated in a report in November, 1872, at the National Swine Breeders' convention, held at Indianapolis, that no written history was back of this convention of the breeders of the Duroc-Jersey swine. Prior to this time there were two distinct families of red hogs, one known as the Durocs of New York and the other as the Jersey Reds of New Jersey. While the positive knowledge of the origin of these two families of red hogs cannot be given, they were known to exist fifty years back of 1872 in New Jersey, and were considered a valuable breed.

"They were of immense size, attaining as much as 800 pounds in November, 1872, at 18 months old, some reaching 1,000 pounds at 2 years, and on up to 1,200 to 1,300 pounds dressed weight. The Durocs were considered of finer grain than the Jersey Reds, with smaller bone and carcass, though otherwise they were similar. It was the belief of some of those who had looked into the matter that the Durocs were originally called Red Berkshire, and that they came from England. It is considered that William H. Holmes, about the year 1880 did as much or more than anyone to bring these hogs into prominence in the West, improving and developing them, spending both time and money in visiting different places where the red hogs were raised.

"At the time we first purchased our stock the hogs exhibited at the fairs were subject to considerable fun and jeers at the hands of the Poland-China and Berkshire breeders, and were few in comparison with the other breeds exhibited. At that time they were heavier than they are now. They are now of better symmetry and finer finish and certainly can compare with any breed at any show without disparagement to them, either in numbers or quality. It shows that the breeders who took hold of them first had faith in their ability to improve and bring forth a kind that would meet the popular demand of the farmers and breeders fully."

### IOWA PIG CROP BELOW STATE'S STANDARDS

Expert Grower Cannot See That Year's Yield Will Be Up to Ex- pectations.

"The Pig crop in Iowa this year is not a good one," said James Hill, a banker and livestock authority of Odel, Iowa. "It is no earlier than last year and it certainly is not larger. Many pigs did not get the benefit of good March and April weather, as they came too late, and a seventy-five-pound pig is now a rarity. I think the new crop of hogs will be later as if prices hold it will be held back to put on weight."

Iowa is the leading hog producing state in the Union, and there has been a big rush of aged sows from there to the market, the gets being held for breeding. On this point Mr. Hill said: "Aged sows will be cashed in as fast as their pigs can be weaned and they can be put in condition. The country has adopted the definite policy of holding gilts for breeding purposes. But there will be a marked scarcity of light and medium stuff right along. There will be plenty of material to fill the lard kettle and the pork barrel and no scarcity of heavy salt meats, but there will be a scarcity of light weight bacon hogs.

"How could it be otherwise? We have plenty of old corn and feeding it to hogs at present prices is as easy a way of making money as selling automobiles. Never since Columbus discovered America has the farmer made as much money as he is doing now by converting corn into pork, provided he has the hogs for the conversion process."

A hog's defects will be reflected in the offspring just as surely as the good points will be.

Uniformity in a bunch of hogs will increase the ease with which they can be fattened, and it helps the sale of them for the best prices.

### Judge Goodwin Mandamus.

Over in Coleman county there is a dispute about who was elected cotton weigher for a certain portion of the county, said district not being a precinct, but part of several. Attorneys there undertook to have Judge Goodwin determine who was elected and he refused to take cognizance of the matter on the ground that there was no law authorizing a district judge to try and determine such a controversy, and upon his refusal to take cognizance of the case, attorneys for the contestants sued out a writ of mandamus to compel him to hear the case.

Judge Goodwin filed his answer in the supreme court this week showing why he refused to hear and determine the case at bar.—Ballinger Banner-Leader.

Leverth Thornton of Lohn, heard Rev. Little preach Saturday night and Sunday.

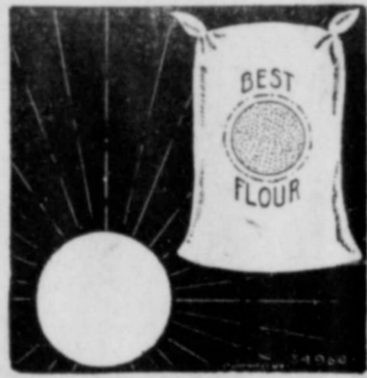
Mr. and Mrs. Henry Davis were among the guests at the Burk home Sunday. They attended the Wilson-Burk wedding.

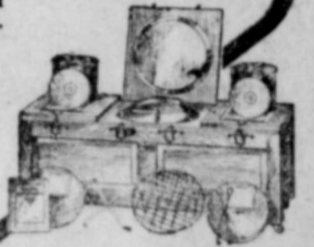

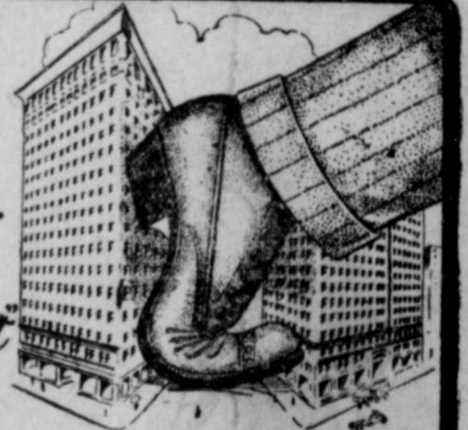
