## CREDITABLE SHOWING

McCulloch County's Exhibit at Dallas Fair Shows Up Well and Attracts Considerable Attention.

The Standard editor spent a portion of the day Monday at the fair grounds in Dallas, and of course the first thing to be seen was the McCulloch county exhibit. We will confess to a feeling of fear that the exhibit would not be all that it should be, for we knew with what difficulty the stuff had been gathered, succeeding the worst drouth the country had ever known. But the surprise awaiting us was one of the most agreeable we had ever experienced.

The exhibit exceeded our fondest hopes in both quality and character. D. R. Hardison, secretary of the Brady Commercial Club, is in charge, and with the assistance of Mrs. Hardison had effected an arrangement of the various articles that could not be improved upon. The exhibit is not large, but it comprises fifty or sixty different varieties of farm produce, besides showing something of the mineral resources of the county. The specimens are all good, and the arrangement is such that the best effects are given.

The booth is one of the smallest in the agricultural hall, and is tastily decorated, and the arrangement as a whole shows much artistic ability. Right across the aisle is another county exhibit occupying four times the floor space, and which was prepared at an expense of more than \$3000, of which, we were told, the real estate men of the county had put up \$2000. The comparison between the two exhibits is far from odious, and we were extremely gratified at McCulloch county's showing in the face of so lavish an expenditure.

Mr. Hardison is the right man in the right place. He is always on the floor, always ready to entertain callers, ever courteous, and above all he is posted on his country and can and does converse interestingly on the resources of McCulloch county, letting no opportunity escape for doing some good, substantial boosting. He is provided with literature and picture post cards, and all callers leave the booth with a good idea of our resources. In the way of literature, McCulloch county is the best represented in the hall. The illustrated booklets prepared by the commercial club are the handsomest to be found on the grounds.

Our exhibit contains three items which, in our opinion, should capture first premiums in their classes, to wit: apples, Irish potatoes and seed onions. We saw nothing in the agricultural hall to equal McCulloch's showing in these three.

With the experience to be gained this time, McCulloch county will be enabled next year to place an exhibit at the Dallas Fair which will be a world beater and a premium getter.

## KEY RATE TO BE LOWER

Insurance Actuary Representative Inspects  
Brady Water and Fire Apparatus  
With Good Results

D. M. Munroe, representing C. B. Roulet, Fire Insurance Actuary of Texas, was in Brady Wednesday for the purpose of inspecting the local water works and fire fighting apparatus with a view to lowering the key rate of the city. Mr. Munroe made a searching inspection of the water works plant, and stated that the credit for same, which has heretofore for some reason not been recognized, would immediately be given. The fire fighting apparatus and the appointment of a fire marshal, which has been done since the city was inspected in the summer, will also cut the rate down slightly, and Mr. Munroe expressed the opinion that the 95-cent rate key would be reduced to something like 70 or 80 cents.

The new rates recently promulgated have caused considerable comment, as on their face they seem to be very high indeed. However, after deducting the 25 per cent required by law, and after removing other items such as trash, old boxes, barrels, etc., and with the further reduction above noted in the key rate, the rates will not be as heavy as at first thought. Of course, some risks are away up and look mighty big, but others are raised very slightly, and in a few instances the rate may be lowered. This information is given us by a local insurance agent. From the same source we also learn that many of the business risks may be sharply lowered by the observation of certain requirements of the fire rating board.

It is a matter of much satisfaction to all concerned that Brady is at last to receive credit for her water works system. Just why this important item was overlooked so long has never been satisfactorily explained.

## STATE CONTRACTS LET

Commissioners Court Awards Contracts for Three Bridges to Missouri Valley Bridge and Iron Co.

Commissioners court last Friday awarded the contracts for the building of three bridges in McCulloch County, to the Missouri Valley Bridge and Iron Co., Leavensworth, Kan., they being the lowest bidders. The cost of the bridge at Voca over the San Saba river will be \$10,900.00, same to be completed by April 14, 1911. The Brady bridge over Brady Creek will cost \$7,500.00, to be completed January 14, 1911, while the Milburn bridge over Deep Creek costs \$3,784.00 and is to be finished by February 14, 1911. This means that work will commence as soon as the election has been approved by the Attorney General, and will be pushed to completion with all possible speed.

The Brady bridge will be forty feet in width, with 30-foot driveway and a 5-foot passageway on either side. A change was made in the old contract for the Voca bridge, by which the bridge will be seven feet higher and will contain an additional span. The contracts all include excavations and all dirt work for approaches.

No definite agreement has been reached as to the placing of the old bridge over Brady creek.

His environment naturally bred certain habits of command, fostered a capacity for directing the efforts of others, and imposed a sense of responsibility upon the planter for the lives that were in his keeping. Above all else, the planter jealously guarded his rights as an English freeman. When liberty languished in England, the Virginian sturdily resisted every aggression of royal tyrants. One husband, one wife, one home, one king, one God—this was the planter's creed. But he reserved the right to renounce a monarch who violated the ancient compact between king and people. No other people, numerically as unimportant as that group of Virginian settlers, has given to humanity so many statesmen, soldiers, orators, patriots and philosophers.—Everybody's Magazine.

SWINE BREEDING BECOMES HIGH ART

Improved Breeds Not Repulsive but Attractive in Their Splendid Perfection.

PURE BLOOD IS VALUABLE

Beginners Make Mistake by Selecting Inferior Animals When Starting Herd.

Editor Hog Department:

At the request of your editor for a contribution to the swine department of your valuable paper, would say that it seems a great privilege to write these few suggestions along that line. As I have been a great admirer of pure-bred swine for several years, the first article I write will touch on that subject somewhat and being yet young in years, what I will write will be the things that have come under my father's and my own observation in the past few years. Being farmers, we take this question to solve when we started to raise pure-bred swine:

"What Breed Shall We Choose?" This same question arises with beginners with any other class of livestock. It surely is a hard question as to what is the best and most profitable breed for the farmer to handle, yet the local conditions and the financial circumstances may be such as to force him to adopt a breed which is entirely different from the one he most earnestly desired. Still after close observations and careful studying of the breed which he adopted, he finds it just what he wants and is far superior to the breed he previously desired.

But the truth of the matter is, some good may be obtained from most any breed, although success depends on the judicious handling as much, if not more, than in the breed. If this is done properly it will not be the fault of the breeder if unseen circumstances cause him to fail. But the hog, no matter what the breed, must be of good blood at least.

The Value of Blood. Some success may be obtained with scrubs, but not with the certainty as with pure-bred stock. To obtain good results a good sire is the utmost necessity. This farmer who makes the mistake of trying to economize on this point starts off on the wrong road and will bitterly regret it in after years. If he buys an inferior animal for a sire, all the future generations in his hogs will be blasted with inferiority. The best and safest plan now for him would be to sell out and start all over again.

Perhaps in no line of the hog business is the effect on breed so visible as in the hog industry. A man who never devoted any of his attention to hogs, and whose knowledge as to their appearance being based on the ordinary sight of a scrub, would experience a feeling of amazement when he first lays his eyes on a bunch of pure-bred hogs, the kind that take the ribbons. The shapes being entirely different from what he expected, as well as the hair and other features, which are directly contrary to the scrub or razor-back variety, so unjustly accepted as typical. He will find instead that the pure-bred has astonishingly long bodies, round as a barrel, covered with a smooth glossy coat of hair, which is even beautiful to look upon. Also he will find that they are supported by ridiculously short legs, seemingly entirely inadequate for the bulk of weight they support.

Instead of being filthy and repulsive, they are really attractive in their splendid perfection. The feeling of surprise will perhaps be mixed with admiration for the breeder who has accomplished all this. It is no doubt true that the breeder needs commendation for the splendid work he has accomplished in the transformation of the hog from the wild state into the present. This was only accomplished after years of research and experiments in crossing breeds, studying the type and gradually molding the typical porker into his present form.

Breeders and Enthusiasts. In a certain sense of the word, hog breeders and fanciers are artists with a higher sense of the ideal. The real enthusiast continually seeks perfection in the lowly swine, with as much zeal as an artist with his canvas. The thoroughly practical breeder, who is in the business for the money alone, is likely to consider the intelligent promotion of the hog considerable of a nuisance, with his eternal quest of the ideal, but there is no room to doubt that the latter has had most to do with the wonderful achievements that have been accomplished with this animal. Hoping the work of bringing this most abused animal of the farm nearer perfection, I will try and have a few suggestions for your readers in next issue.

THERE IS MONEY IN THE RUNT PIG

In these days of high prices for hogs the runt pig is worth some consideration and he should have it; there is money in him. It doesn't matter whether the runt is of good pure blood or not, the most value is sufficient to entitle the runt to care.

The runt is generally constitutionally weak; that's why he or she is a runt. It is either that or the other pigs have rooted it away from the mother in their greediness. If it is the latter case the runt, if given a chance, it has qualities that will make it a more economical feeder and pork producer than the pig that eats so fast. Runt pigs have been known when separated from the larger ones to outgrow their mates in a short time and in the end make heavier porkers.

The runt does not eat so greedily as the others, but if it is healthy it will digest its food better than the greedy eaters, since it chews its food better and of course the food is better mixed with saliva. Once I made a runt pig gain 100 pounds in 174 days. Another time made a runt gain ninety-three pounds in ninety days. Of course these pigs were of good blood and were healthy, but it shows what may be done with pigs that would be and likely should be destroyed by the pork grower who operates on a large scale.

FAST SERVICE PLANNED

New Line to San Antonio Via Brady to Comfort and Southern Pacific Decided Upon.

The Frisco has finally selected a route for its line to San Antonio and here it is—from Brady via Katemey, Mason, Loyal Valley and Fredericksburg, making connection with the San Antonio & Aransas Pass at Comfort. The Sap is included in the Yoakum possessions.

When Yoakum gets ready to build to San Antonio, this is the line that will be taken. This statement is not accompanied by an official confirmation by either President Winchell, Chairman B. F. Yoakum or any other real authority, but the last map of Texas issued by the Frisco bears out the correctness of the theory. Reference marks under the map indicate that the Brady-Comfort branch is under construction.

The distance between Brady and Comfort via the route picked by the Frisco is between 125 and 150 miles. The Fort Worth officials of the Frisco claim to know nothing of the proposed branch, but it is quite certain that if the track was not planned the map would not tell the story.

Chairman B. F. Yoakum will probably touch on this construction in the annual report of the Frisco, which is yet to be issued.

This information dispels the theory that the Frisco would effect an entrance to San Antonio via Menard. It is announced that work on the Menard branch, which was delayed by heavy rains last week, has been resumed and that progress is being made.—Fort Worth Record.

EAST TEXAS NOW IN LIME LIGHT

Preparations Being Made by Several Men to Establish Hog Farms.

NATURAL ADVANTAGES

Bermuda Grass and Oak Acorns Grow Plentifully. Cheap Feed for All.

East Texas as an ideal hog raising country is now attracting great attention, and it is not unlikely that in a very few years it will produce the bigger part of the hogs raised in this state. Already preparations are being made by a number of men to establish hog farms in that section, and more will follow. Why East Texas is a great country for hog raising is set out in a communication on that subject by F. A. Gay, which follows:

"The writer has for many years lived in Montgomery county, and has watched its progress as well as other west counties, and has noted that this section of our state has developed in hog raising, as well as in many other lines of improvement. He has seen the 'razor back' disappear from his range on the 'ridges,' just as the Indian left his hunting grounds upon the advent of the 'pale face.' He has seen the 'piney woods rooster' replaced by the graded hog, the coming of the latter being the best proposition the East Texas farmer could desire.

"In discussing why East Texas is destined to be the future hog country, we might begin by informing you that the natural advantages afforded the hogs there would cause that worthy animal to choose such place as his place of residence without an invitation being extended to him in North, Central and West Texas we understand that practically everything a hog gets to eat has to be raised for it from cultivated lands and when there is no corn crop there is likely to be no hog crop. It is in such sections of our state that when these crop failures come, as they sometimes do come, then it is that we hear the statement of 'root, hog, will grow.' In East Texas, East Texas is 'root hog and live.' When crops are a failure and nothing has been prepared by the hand of man for the benefit of the hog, nature has seen to it in that section that the hog is properly provided for, and the hog is only asked to root and nature will do the rest.

"Bermuda grass and oak acorns are two of the natural foods of the hog. Both of these are in East Texas in abundance. The writer raised a litter of pigs which at the end of thirteen months were of the average weight of 210½ pounds each, and they were never fed anything except Bermuda grass and oak acorns.

"With abundance of natural food like this available, why should not East Texas be the future hog country? It is with pride that our East Texas farmers say that such section of Texas will grow and grow reasonably well, anything that may be—the future hog country, because the question of proper feed and sufficiency thereof is the first proposition in hog raising.

SAYS TAMWORTH BEST BACON HOG

W. Warren Morton of Russellville, Ky., breeder of Tamworth hogs and owner of Englewood's Friedman No. 1864, winner of the grand championship prize at the world's fair, 1884, says that the Tamworth is the best bacon hog that is grown. He says:

"I hold to the opinion that these fat, chubby, pony built pigs are the result of years of constant effort in trying to attain certain so-called ideas of form at the expense of size and every other point of utility, rather than to in and in breeding. Be that as it may, the Tamworth breed is offered to the public by its advocates as the quickest route to return to the good old kind that have ten to thirteen pigs at a litter and rear them, has a bone and frame large and strong enough to carry 1,000 pounds of good old-fashioned country bacon, with a streak of lean to each streak of fat, and constitution so rugged that disease and injury are unknown quantities with them; and the old sows breed on and on, two litters a year, good old mothers that they are, farrowing a whole pen full at a time and yielding an abundance of milk for her young continuing from year to year, till old age negates them to the pork barrel.

Mr. Morton is well known to the editor of this department, and he is one of the most successful hog farmers in the United States. He went into the business when a boy, stuck to it and is now has one of the best herds of pure-bred hogs in the whole country. What he has done on a rocky farm in Kentucky can be done by good management in Texas. His Tamworths have been prize winners in New York, Illinois, Kentucky and Ohio, winning as many as seventy ribbons in 1906. He has made a study of the hog and by doing that has made big money.

The pigs will need green food this fall and winter. Plant a cover crop to protect your soil and to furnish pasture for your pigs, calves, colts and lambs. The dairy cows and work animals should not be forgotten when a crop is ready for pasturing.

Hogs are scarce and corn will doubtless be cheap. Those who have pigs will find it profitable to keep them. Do not rush your hogs upon the market, but finish them properly, if you want a good price for your feed.

The hog produces its species more rapidly than any other farm animal and can be depended upon to bring money quicker than other animals. Three litters of pigs a year have been produced. One sow has been known to yield her owner \$100 a year. This is true, but many farmers will buy their meat next year.

Frisco Pays for Putting Man Off.

The court of Civil Appeals yesterday affirmed the case of the Fort Worth & Rio Grande railway company against James Conner from McCulloch county. This is a damage suit growing out of personal injuries received by Conner and for which he received a judgment for \$400. Conner got on the defendant company's passenger train at Brady to see his brother-in-law, who was leaving the place and before he could get off the train it had started; he declared he requested the conductor to stop the train, and let him get off, but instead the conductor demanded his fare; but, appellee explained that he did not wish to make a journey, however he told the conductor, according to the statement of facts in the case, that he would rather pay his fare to the next station than be forced to jump off the train while in motion, the train slowed up, but did not stop, and plaintiff asserts that while the train was moving he was kicked off, falling down an embankment, received the injuries complained of. The company contended that Conner was under the influence of liquor at the time but the court of appeals held that the company was liable and affirmed the judgment of the trial court. This is the case in which Conductor B. J. Fitzgerald figured conspicuously and has been watched with interest by the railroad people.—Brownwood Bulletin, Oct. 14.
