## TO PLOW BY GASOLINE

Rev. Abner Hanson Buys 20-H-P. Gasoline Tractor Engine to be Used in Opening Big Farm

Rev. Abner Hanson returned Wednesday from Dallas where he purchased a 20-h-p. gasoline tractor engine with which to furnish power for breaking his big 600-acre farm on the old Dodge ranch six miles west of Brady. The engine will be shipped Nov. 1st, and will be put in commission as soon as received. Mr. Hanson will use two triple-disc plows followed by a harrow, and the engine is guaranteed to pull these plows, turning a furrow about six feet wide at a depth of eight inches on sod land. On old land other plows may be attached. With this equipment Mr. Hanson will be enabled to break ten acres of sod land in a day at a cost of \$1.50 for fuel and only one man is required to operate the machine.

There are other traction plows in operation in the Brady country using steam as power, but these engines require water haulers, coal wagons and other extra help which the gasoline machine eliminates. The machine is shipped here under a strict guarantee of performing all that is claimed for it.

Mr. Hanson will have one of the largest and best farms in the Brady country. The land is as fine as can be found, is convenient to town, and has a frontage on Brady creek. There is one hole of water contiguous thereto which is over a mile long and ranges in depth from three to ten feet during the driest periods. Mr. Hanson will utilize this water for irrigating purposes, if necessary, and will also get more value out of his new engine by using it to furnish power for the pumping.

Almost the entire tract will be planted in cotton.

## THIS IS APPLE COUNTRY

R. B. McCarty, of Mercury, Raises Fine Apples and Other Fruit—Will Extend Operations in Horticulture

The Standard received a pleasant call from R. B. McCarty, of Mercury, yesterday. Mr. McCarty brought us some fine apples from his orchard near Mercury, several of them measuring nearly 12 inches in circumference, being of the Pippin and Ben Davis varieties. He informed us that he also raised Elberta peaches this year measuring 13 inches in circumference.

Mr. McCarty has perhaps the finest orchard in the Brady country, consisting of sixty acres, and he now has ready for market more than a thousand bushels of fine fruit. His orchard is on sandy land and his experience has been so gratifying in the fruit raising line that he has retired from the mercantile business and will devote his entire time to fruit growing, with some fine hogs and blooded cattle on the side.

This season he will add 1500 more trees to his orchard, and eventually he expects to have 150 acres in fruit trees. Next season he will have in operation a canning factory of his own, having already practically closed the deal for the same. By so doing he will be in a position to take care of all his fruit, much of which has in past years gone to waste because of imperfect market facilities.

Mr. McCarty's fruit this year has been the talk of the country and the apples which he sent to the Dallas Fair with the McCulloch county exhibit were only prevented from taking premium through a technicality in the entry. Next year he expects to have especially fine exhibits for the Brady fair, the Dallas fair and others.

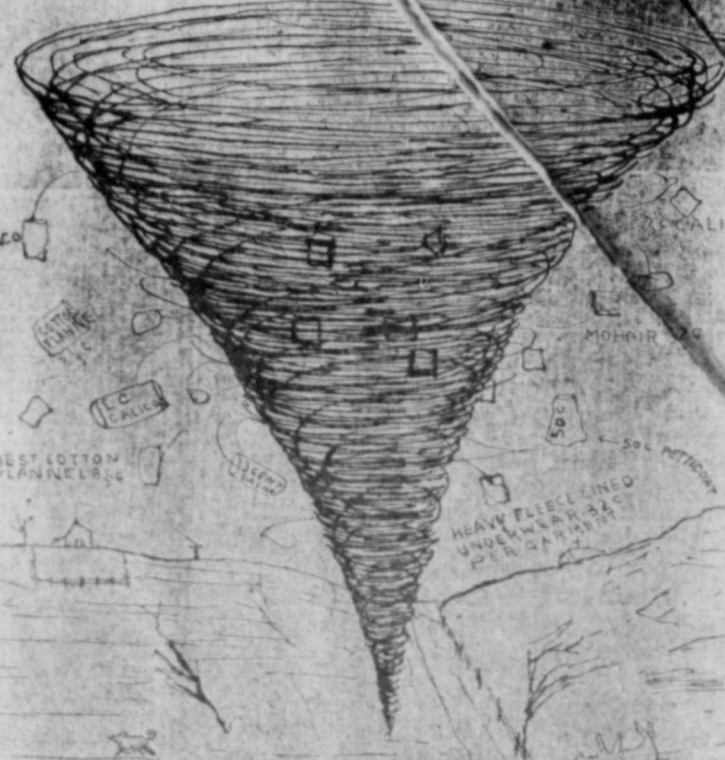

## More Cattle Deals.

Cattle deals aggregating \$59,500 were closed this week by the Sawyer Cattle Company, of Reagan county, when the firm disposed of over 2,300 head of cattle to Dick Russell and S. J. Blocker.  
Eleven hundred head of yearlings and between 700 and 800 head of 2-year-old steers were sold at an average price of \$28 per head, making an aggregate sum of \$59,400. These were delivered at the Sawyer ranch in Reagan county this week and will be pastured there this winter.  
Five hundred head of old cows were sold at a price of \$15.25 per head, making altogether \$7,625. These will be delivered in San Angelo within a few days and sent to market. Forty-four head of fine bulls also went in the deal at a price of \$32.50 per head.—San Angelo Standard.

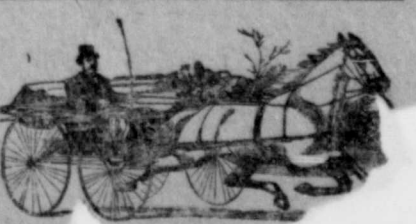

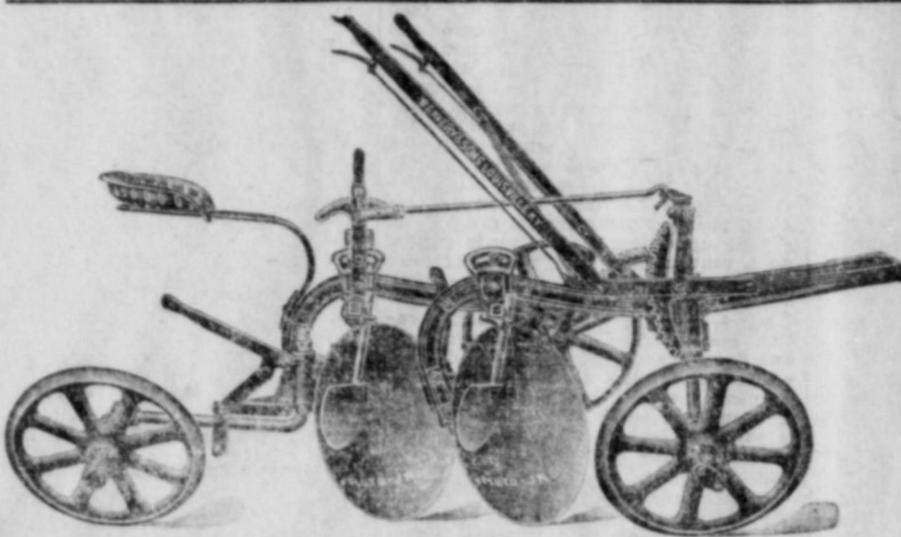
