The name of the conference will be the same as it was for football—3-B.

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Mustangs Get Hot, Stomp Whitharral 33-0

Playing like champions, not like a team with six losses, the Bovina Mustangs galloped smoothly and confidently over the Whitharral Panthers 33-0 in a still cold that had settled on Mustang Field Friday night in the last game of the season for both football teams.

Seven of the Mustangs—the seniors of the squad—were honorary captains for the game. Those participating in their last football contest for the maroon and white were Billy Richards, Kenneth Estes, Erith Hawkins, Jerry Loflin, Lynn Isham, Larry Ezell and Darvell Read. All of the men were starters. Mustang Coach Bob Willis says, "They leave a big gap for us to fill next year."

The Mustangs, who were on the rebound from a hard-fought 6-0 loss to Farwell the week before, scored the second time they were in possession of the ball. Read took the opening kickoff on the 21 and returned it to the 22. On the first play from scrimmage, Read passed to Ezell only to have it go incomplete. But Ezell carried the ball on the next play for six yards to the 28 and Julius Bradshaw made three on third down to the 31 to bring up fourth down with one yard needed for a first. Ezell made the one

yard for the first down and one to spare as he was stopped on the 33. Read almost broke into the clear on the next play but was halted after a 17 yard run to the 50 yard line. However, a fumble on the next play was recovered by the Panthers and they took over on their own 48.

Led by the hard, shifty running of Halfback Charlie Denny, who is considered by many to be the best running back in District 3-B, Whitharral brought the ball back to the Mustangs' 22 before the determined Mustang line forced the losers to give the ball over on downs.

Bradshaw was stopped for no gain on the first down, and Ezell went to the 36 to set the stage for a 64 yard run by Read. Read had perfect blocking by his teammates and went down the right side line for a standing up touchdown that furnished the locals with the winning margin. After a timeout, so Read could catch his breath, he, with Ezell holding, place kicked the extra point to make the score 7-0.

The Panthers brought Ezell's kickoff back to the 47 but an illegal use of hands penalty put the ball on the one. They failed to get

the ball back out past the three yard line and with fourth down they punted to try to get out of danger, but Read, playing safety on defense, took the punt on the 33 and ran back down the middle, again with good blocking, and was tackled squarely on the goal line for the second touchdown of the first quarter. The attempted conversion was no good and left the score 13-0.

Fighting back, the Panthers, who took a 42 district record into the game, marched down to the Mustangs' 15 before they again were held on downs by the Mustang line-men, who tightened up everything after the opposition got inside the 20.

IN CLOVIS—

Parmer County Sheriff Nabs Bovina Burglars

The individuals who broke into two Bovina businesses and attempted to break into another Sunday night, November 13, have been captured by Parmer County Sheriff Chas. Lovelace and Clovis police officials. The burglars—three of them—are in jail at Farwell.

Henry Hernandez, 17, who was released from Springer Industrial School for Boys on the third of November, Joe Palacio, 19, and Jake Vargas, 17, are the three that were involved in the break-ins. They are Latin-Americans and make their homes in Clovis.

They were taken into custody Sunday. Lovelace picked the youths up in Clovis and also recovered some of the clothes that were taken from Esquire Cleaners and part of the merchandise that was taken from Wilson Food

Store. Lovelace said that he and the Clovis officials were suspicious of the youths. After the stolen goods were found in their homes, they signed statements admitting to the break-ins. They did not, however, admit that they had attempted to break into Wilson's prior to that time.

After the bond is set—and it was scheduled to be set Monday afternoon—the boys will be bound over to the grand jury.

A younger brother of Palacio's

was sent to Gatesville School for Boys some three months ago for car theft in Parmer County.

A. M. Wilson, owner of Wilson's Food Store, estimated that \$150 worth of merchandise was stolen from his store. Five shirts and a coat were taken from Esquire Cleaners and two screens were taken off the windows of Paul Jones' Service Station but they did not enter the building.

No other reports of break-ins in Bovina have been turned in since that time.

A total of six contests were held, three for students in vocational agriculture I and three for advanced students. The contests were Farm Skill Demonstrations for both divisions, chapter conducting for both divisions and Radio Broadcasting for seniors and FFA quiz for juniors.

The local entry in the junior Farm Skill contests had 788 points out of a possible 1,000 to put it second behind Friona, which had 885 points. The Sudan chapter was third in this division with 665 points.

Dwayne Rea, Elmer Shodgrass, and Rammy Brandon picked up another second in the FFA quiz with 264 points out of a possible 300. Littlefield was first with 283 and Dimmitt third with 263 points.

Keep in mind Bovina's need for paved streets. Towns on all sides of Bovina that are of similar size and financial standing are paving streets or already have them paved.

We don't think that other towns of our "caliber" should be able to do things that we can't do here. The idea of curbs and gutters on the section of Highway 86 that goes through Bovina seems to be slowly but surely becoming a reality. However, the starting of the work may be several months in the future. But if the groundwork for such a project can be laid, half the battle is won.

Since it does take such a great amount of time, other paving project ideas need to be started NOW.

Some people can't realize the advantages of paving, therefore, the more we talk about and discuss the idea now, the quicker we can come to some agreement about what, when, where, and how the project should be taken care of.

We aren't speaking of the paving along the highways alone. Many, many more streets in town need paving. And there is no obvious reason why they couldn't or shouldn't be paved.

In dollars and cents, everybody would be better off, even with the high cost of paving. This is the point that is hard to understand. Property, if it has paving on its borders, is worth more to people who are coming here to buy. If a potential buyer doesn't think that the property is worth more when it is located on paved streets, he isn't progressive enough to fit into this section of the state, anyway.

Let's don't let these paving ideas die. Paving is something that we need and can have if enough people are interested.
