LAWS NOT VIOLATED

Recent Game Law Violations in Kimble County Prove to be Not Violations After All.

All the hullabaloo raised over in Kimble county recently over alleged wholesale violations of the state game law has proved to be a flash in the pan. There were twenty-three cases to appear before the district court, and after having three jury trials, resulting in acquittals, the balance of the cases were dismissed.

The deputy game warden who was responsible for the filing of the suits was given some pretty hard bumps, and admitted having exceeded his authority in the matter, pleading that he did not know fully just what his authority was.

The district judge delivered a special charge to the grand jury on the subject, and criticised severely the game commission's department for recent lurid interviews reflecting upon the citizens and officers of Kimble county.

Chief Deputy Game Commissioner R. W. Lorange deploras the mistake that has been made and no doubt will proceed more carefully in the future when relying on the work of his deputies and see that no such grandstand plays are made to the public.

Hallowe'en Pranks (?)

Monday night was Hallowe'en Night, and the spooks which are supposed to be abroad in the land on that occasion were unusually prankish in Brady, in fact, some of their pranks approached the stage of malicious mischief, and a number of our citizens suffered real damage to a greater or less extent.

Several large galvanized water tanks were removed from the O. D. Mann & Sons establishment, rolled several blocks and left on the public square in a battered condition. Numerous signs in the business district were removed, battered or destroyed. M. Simon suffered the complete loss of all his canvas signs. At the plant of the Brady Cotton Oil Co. the water was let out of the big tank which keeps the boilers supplied, and as a consequence the plant had to shut down Tuesday. Dr. J. G. McCall's barn was entered, his automobile taken out and hidden at a safe distance. His buggy horse was turned loose to wander off.

Other visitations of a more or less serious character were reported, and the city authorities were busy this morning making a list of names of those known to have been participants in the pranks (?). It is quite likely that developments will follow which will suffice to restrain the spooks another time.

NEW ROAD MAP OF TEXAS

The Texas Commercial Secretaries Association has prepared a road map showing the number of miles of public highway in each county, the number of miles improved; the annual expenditure on public roads other than bond issue and the bonds issued during the past twelve months.

The report shows that we have 140,101 miles of public highway in actual use in the state; 4,652 miles of improved public highways. We spend \$3,235,468.00 annually by public taxation, in construction and maintaining our public highways and we issued \$4,015,000 of bonds during the past year. We are now preparing to spend \$25,000,000 on our public highways in 1911. The average cost of public highways is \$13.05. Interesting tables bringing out distinctive and instructive features of road building are also shown. Tarrant County is the banner county in miles of improved public highways and Ellis county leads in bond issue, having issued \$895,000 bonds within the past year.

Hill county has the largest mileage of public highways, having 3,500 miles. Harris county spends the largest amount by annual taxation per annum, the amount being \$250,000. El Paso county has spent the greatest amount per mile, \$450 per mile. Collin county has the largest mileage of public highway per square mile of area, 3.6.

The maps are for free distribution and can be secured on application to the Commercial Secretaries Association at Fort Worth. The Standard is making arrangements for the publication of this map in these columns in the near future.

COLEMAN

Joe Toland, Who so Mysteriously Disappeared From Rockwood on the Frisco, Turns up in Brownwood.

Considerable interest was manifested in Brady last week over the mysterious disappearance of Joe Toland, a prominent ranchman of Coleman, who was last seen on his road home from his rancho at Rockwood, just across the river from Waldrip in this county. The following account of the manner in which Toland discovered himself is published in the Brownwood Bulletin of Saturday, 29th:

Joe Toland, the missing ranchman for whom all Coleman has been hunting since Wednesday morning, was found at the Santa Fe station here last night. The discovery was made by members of the Coleman foot ball team, who were enroute home after playing a game with the Brownwood high school team. The boys upon entering the Santa Fe station just before train time discovered Toland sitting in the station and while some of their number kept him under surveillance others hurried off and called up Sheriff Futch by phone and reported the find. Sheriff Futch called up Sheriff Emison and asked him to bring Toland home. Sheriff Emison arrived at the station after the train had arrived and found that Toland had boarded the train and had a ticket for Coleman. He accompanied him on to his home.

Toland it will be remembered very mysteriously disappeared from his ranch at Rockwood, where he went on business Tuesday afternoon, and it was feared that he was foully dealt with. Searching parties from Coleman, where he lived, scoured the whole Rockwood country and failed to find trace of him. They found his horse and buggy in a pasture and near by found his collar that had been torn from his neck. The searchers were sure that the body of the unfortunate man would be found in that vicinity and they fished in an old shaft filled with water and dragged the Colorado river. Parties were still out when the finding of the man was announced.

Toland is a wealthy cattleman of that city. He is unable to recall an event since his disappearance. He says he went from his pasture to Brady on foot and from there probably went to Fort Worth, since he came to Brownwood on the night Frisco from that place. Arriving here last night he rode in one of the Armstrong Transfer Company's busses to the Santa Fe station. When inside the Santa Fe passenger station he took a magazine from his pocket and was quietly reading it when discovered by the members of the Coleman foot ball team. Ticket Agent Robinson says Toland came to the window and appeared to be an ordinary traveler.

It is announced at Coleman today that the man's mind is unbalanced and he is under the care of physicians.

There was a reward of \$500 offered for Toland dead or alive, but it is not likely the whole of the reward will be claimed since he was on his way home when found.

J. W. and W. H. Hunter, who were arrested for protection, in connection with the disappearance of Toland, were released today.

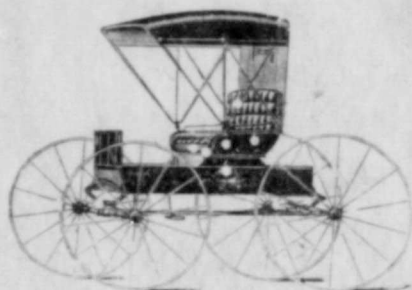

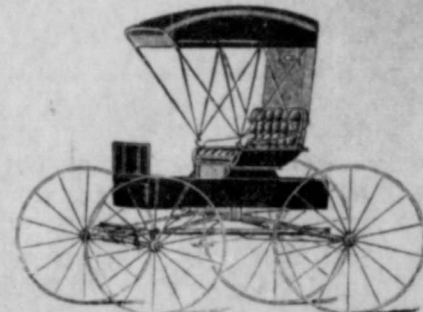
