## FOR BOYS' CORN CLUBS

John T. Love, Special Agent Farmers' Co-Operative Demonstration Work, to Interest Farmer Boys.

John T. Love, special agent for the Farmers' Co-Operative Demonstration work, reports that he has so far secured the co-operation of thirty McCulloch county farmers, each of whom has agreed to set aside a certain number of acres of land for experimental work under the plans of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Each of these farmers will receive direct from the Department at Washington instructions by mail for the preparation of their seed beds, planting, selection of seed, cultivation, etc., all absolutely free. Mr. Love's work will consist of visiting these farms once a month, inspecting the work as it progresses, and offering advice. His advice will not be the advice of the so-called "book farmer," but will be the advice of a practical farmer who has farmed all his life, and who has studied the new methods and found them all that had been claimed for them. He insists that he can and will show McCulloch county farmers that corn—good old Indian corn—and lots of it—can be raised by them.

In this connection he will organize Boys' Corn Clubs all over the county, and as soon as the November election is over he will, with our new county superintendent of schools, Prof. J. K. Baze, visit every school house in the county, and address the boys, interest them and organize them into clubs.

Mr. Love says, and we know it to be true, that the boys corn clubs of Texas have done more in the past year or two to educate the older farmers than anything that has ever before been attempted. They have proven that corn can be raised in spots which had always been considered worthless to corn growers. He says they will be able to prove the same thing to those McCulloch county farmers who claim that they cannot raise corn here, and many of whom are so positive about it that they absolutely refuse to devote even one acre to the proposition of the U. S. Agricultural Department. Mr. Love will start the boys to work raising corn, and will show some of these old-timers their mistaken idea regarding corn culture.

In the near future Wm. Ganzer, of Denton county, who is district agent, will come to McCulloch county and will deliver one or more addresses to the farmers. These addresses will be worth listening to, and the dates for same will be announced through these columns in due time.

Mr. Love was called home to Cleburne Wednesday night by news of illness in his family, but will be back in a few days. He has secured a residence in Brady and will move his family here sometime this month, and will then get deep into the harness.

The Standard sincerely trusts that our farmers will take a big interest in this work. Besides the money the government is spending, the Brady Commercial Club is interested to the extent of several hundred dollars, and we will be glad to see results accrue which will be worth while. These results will obtain if a proper spirit of co-operation among the farmers is given.

## DATE IS ANNOUNCED

Saturday, Nov. 12, Named as "Post Card Day" for Brady--Commercial Club Provides Plenty Cards.

The Brady Commercial Club has received the big shipment of post cards showing local views, and the same have been distributed out among the several dealers in the city. Saturday, Nov. 12 has been named as "Post Card Day," and on that day it is to be hoped and expected that not less than 25,000 post cards will be mailed out of Brady.

The club got hold of a bargain in post cards and bought them, selling them to the dealers at actual cost, and at such a low price that the dealers can afford to retail them at ten for five cents--one-half cent each. The Club will distribute a great many of the cards, each of the three banks has agreed to mail out 500, and every citizen of Brady and McCulloch county is expected to buy some of these cards and mail them out on the date set--Saturday, Nov. 12.

### Notice to Voters.

The general election in Texas will be held November 8th, which is a little more than a week hence.

This election is of more importance than the average election, from the fact that in the redistricting process which will be gone through by the Thirty-second Legislature, the number of qualified electors will be taken into consideration in the re-arrangement of Senatorial Districts. The Constitution of the State of Texas, section 25 of article 3, provides that the redistricting of the state senate shall be made on the basis of the number of qualified electors in the state. Just how the provision, "qualified electors," will be construed by the next legislature is an undetermined question and one left entirely to the will of the legislature. Up to the present time, the only rule followed in determining the number of qualified electors was the vote cast at the general election preceding the redistricting of the senate.

When the senate was redistricted ten years ago there was no poll tax requirements for suffrage in Texas but since then this requirement has been made. It is possible therefore, that the Thirty-second legislature may take the poll tax payments as qualified electors in the re-arrangement of the senatorial districts.

In this event, it will be necessary in order for West Texas to have her share of the senatorial districts for a full showing to be made in the payment of poll tax.

If the old method of determining the qualified electors is followed, as indicated above, then it is necessary for a full vote to be cast at the general election on November 8th, 1910, in order for West Texas to get her full representation in senatorial districts.

If the legislature should adopt the poll tax provision as its guide for qualified voters, as the basis for senate redistricting, then it is important that there should be a full payment of poll taxes. There is no way of knowing which plan will be adopted by the thirty-second legislature and therefore every voter in West Texas in particular, and the entire state in general is confronted with two important and sacred duties.

1. To vote at the coming general election regardless of party affiliations.

2. To pay his poll tax or, if exempted, to secure a certificate of exemption both of which must be secured before February 1, 1911.

The few senatorial districts in West Texas makes it imperative that action should be taken, as above indicated, and with this opportunity afforded, it is therefore up to the voters of West Texas to bear these facts in mind and to vote in the general election and then pay their poll tax in order that the representation from West Texas in the next senate may be materially increased.

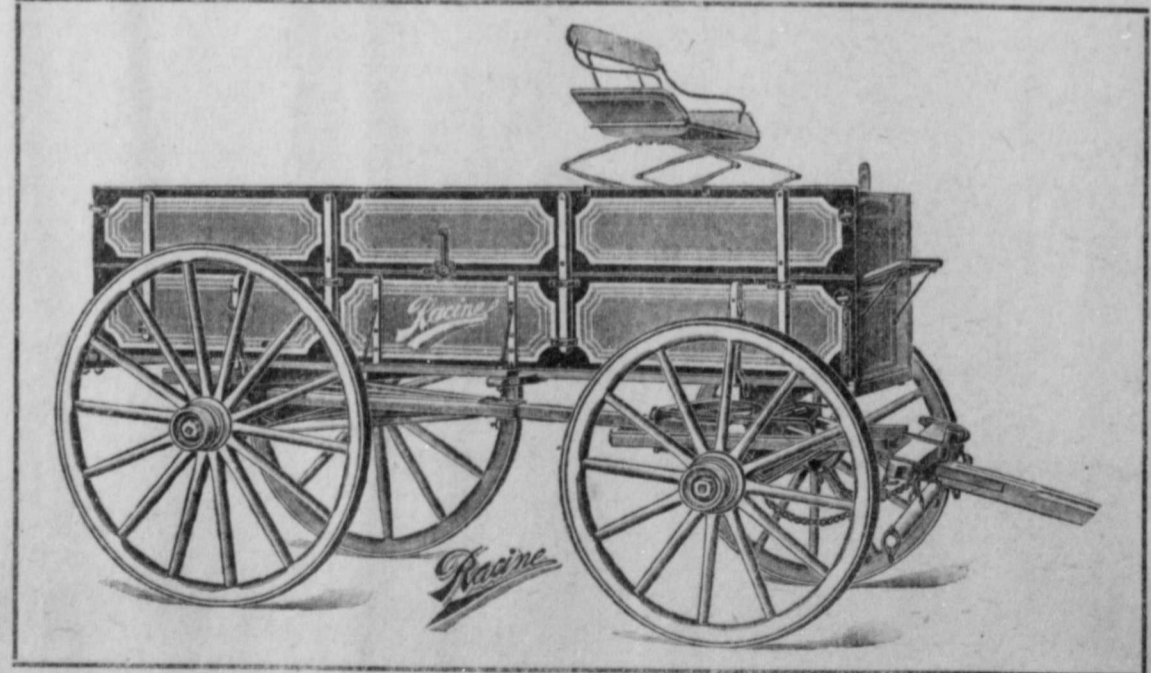

## NORTH SUPPLIES SOUTH WITH PORK

Most of Meats Come From  
Other Side of Mason and  
Dixon Line

### PRODUCTION IS EASY

2 Litters Per Year and Green  
Pasture Assures Success  
In Business

How to raise fourteen pigs from a  
brood sow in one year, where the practice  
had been to raise only seven, thus  
largely increasing the swine breeder's  
profits, was ably and interestingly  
discussed in the Breeders' Gazette by  
M. Walter McDonald. What he said  
will be well worth the time for any  
hog raiser to read. It follows:  
"With the rapid increase in prices  
on all farm products and especially on  
meat-producing animals, nothing can  
so deeply interest producers of meat  
more than the methods by which we  
can secure twice as many porkers at  
an increased cost of production of only  
45 per cent. Through the years 1899  
to 1904 only one litter yearly was  
sought on my farm, and the average of  
these six years was 7.5 pigs per sow.  
The cost of keeping the sow was \$18,  
flouring \$10 for feed, \$1 for service  
and \$1 for insurance, loss, taxes and  
interest. On two litters a year from  
1905 to 1909 the average per sow per  
year was 14 pigs, produced by the  
same type of sow, at a cost of \$22.50  
per sow per year. The added expense  
was in extra boar service, labor, loss  
and extra feed.  
"In the fall of 1904 the sows were  
bred for early March farrow. Such  
early pigs were a new venture with  
us and for the first season we lost a  
few due to the fact that we were not  
prepared for so many during cold  
weather. That spring, as in other  
years, the youngsters learned to eat  
with the old sows and were given no  
extra feed until six weeks old, when  
they were allowed extra trough room  
in a pen separated from the sows by a  
screen-like arrangement of vertical  
slats.  
"Their feed from this time on con-  
sisted of all they would eat of ear corn  
and slop made of skim milk, seven  
parts, short two parts and tankage  
one part by measure. The ear corn  
was broken in two and fed from a  
half to a whole hour before the slop.  
While still with the dams the young-  
sters were turned on bluegrass early  
in the spring and later, about May 1,  
on clover and timothy mixed. This  
latter forage lasted until haymaking  
time, when it was rested a month and  
the pigs grazed on a couple of acres  
of rape and peas. With such early  
feeding the pigs get a good start;  
they do not lose weight at weaning  
time, which is usually the eighth week,  
and we are able to market them the  
forepart of November weighing 300  
pounds.  
"While the pigs suckle, the sows are  
fed very liberally on ear corn and  
tankage about 10 to 1. At weaning  
time the sows are put in dry lots and  
the rations lightened. However, their  
udders are soon dried up. They are  
then range, put on a clover and timothy  
pasture, and for the remainder of the  
summer receive about three ears of  
corn once a day. From May 1 to 30  
we breed for the fall litters. The old  
sows are divided into two lots of  
10 each. One lot is turned in one pasture  
and a rented boar which costs us \$10  
for the month is put in the other. No  
breeding dates are kept on the  
pigs. The results we have secured  
have been very good and in the five  
years we have been able to get 90  
per cent of the sows to breed during  
the month of May and produce each  
two litters. At the fall breeding sea-  
son we are unable to secure a rented  
boar, so the breeding crate is used.  
The boar is kept separated from the  
sows and only one service given each  
sow. Approximate breeding dates are  
kept so we know what sows come the  
first week in March, the second and  
so on until all are bred.  
"The fall pigs are farrowed during  
the last day of August and the first  
of September, late enough to miss the  
worst of the fly season, yet early  
enough so that they will be of fair  
value before cold weather. The feed  
is the same as in the spring until Nov.  
1, then the slop is warmed and the ear  
corn cut down a little. The whole  
drove of fall pigs are farrowed during  
the first week of September and arrive  
at this time. For shelter the pigs have  
a well-bedded dry shed fenced off so  
the cattle cannot enter. The steers  
are sold in January and February and  
the hogs finished off on corn and  
warm milk slop about the last of  
March. Among our fall pigs we have  
a little lack of uniformity and some  
loss due to cold weather, but even with  
such losses about 130 finish off, weigh-  
ing 275 pounds.  
"The sows bred for March litters  
are wintered on corn and tankage  
about 10 to 1 with a feed of alfalfa,  
corn meal and tankage scalded once a  
week. The tankage that is fed daily  
is fed mixed in warm water about 9  
o'clock. Then about 4 p. m. they are  
given cold water. Ear corn is fed  
twice a day. From year to year some  
sows become old or prove unprofitable.  
These must be replaced, so the most  
promising young sows are selected  
from each drove, and in this way the  
herd is kept up to twenty sows. The  
young sows are bred when fourteen  
months old. They are usually able to  
produce two litters a year from this  
time on.  
"The only reason for extra care and  
labor on the farm is that it will bring  
us some desired returns. This system  
has yielded a good profit in cash. It  
has returned us more money than the  
extra expense involved. The cost of  
keeping a sow to raise one litter to  
weaning time was \$16; when two are  
reared the extra time and feed re-  
quired raises the expense to \$32.50. The  
pigs are actually produced 75 cents a  
head cheaper, besides the fact that  
there are 130 extra hogs marketing  
corn at \$1.15 per bushel."

It is best to begin feeding as soon  
as the growing period of pig should grow  
rather than fatten. When the pigs in  
kept too fat while young, he does not  
develop a good bone and muscular sys-  
tem and does not prove a good feeder  
when he reaches the age to feed.

## PRESIDING ELDER

Popular Brady Pastor Assigned Presiding  
Elder of San Angelo District by  
Conference at Austin.

Rev. L. C. Matthis, pastor of  
the Brady Methodist church was  
assigned to the Presiding Elder-  
ship of this, the San Angelo dis-  
trict, by the West Texas Confer-  
ence in session at Austin the past  
week. Rev. J. T. King, for the  
past three years pastor of the  
church at Llano, will come to  
Brady in Bro. Matthis' place.

Rev. Matthis has been pastor  
of the local church for three  
years, which indicates his popu-  
larity with the people and the  
character of the work accomplish-  
ed in his charge, as Methodist  
preachers are supposed to be as-  
signed to a different charge each  
year. He has made friends of  
all Brady people with whom he  
has come in contact, and these  
friends regret to lose him, yet  
wish him God speed in his new  
work. As Presiding Elder of the  
District Rev. Matthis will have  
a much harder work, yet one  
which the Bishop feels he is  
fully competent to successfully  
handle. He will leave next Tues-  
day for San Angelo, which point  
will be his home, and the best  
wishes of many friends will ac-  
company him and his most excel-  
lent family.

Rev. King, who comes from  
Llano, is said to be a very fine  
preacher and a good man. He  
will assume his duties next week.  
Bro. Matthis will hold the usual  
service Sunday, which will be his  
last as pastor of the church.

## BIGGER LITTERS; LARGER PROFITS

More Eggs and Two Farrowes  
Per Year Swell Bank  
Account

### PURE BLOODS ARE BEST

Improved Breeds and Careful  
Feeding Secret to Success  
to Beginners

It is a fact not generally known that  
about one-half the pork consumed in  
the South is shipped in from other  
states north of Mason and Dixon's line,  
and this too in the face of the fact  
that the South is better adapted to  
profitable hog raising than any other  
section of the country. The South  
with its facilities for producing cheap  
food should be an exporter of hog  
products instead of an importer.  
There are some things in hog raising  
that should appeal strongly to ev-  
ery farmer in the South. No other  
meat producing animal is capable of  
producing so many young in a year. In  
our climate, where suitable pastures  
can be provided for nearly every month  
in the year, the sow should farrow  
twice annually, producing one litter  
in early spring, which can easily be  
made ready for the late fall or early  
winter market, and another litter in  
early fall to be made ready for the  
spring market.

The small amount of capital re-  
quired to begin the hog business and  
the quick returns on the investment  
should make hog raising especially at-  
tractive to the small farmer of limited  
means, especially in the South. The  
hog well cared for will make a pound  
of gain on less food than most live-  
stock and will profitably utilize the  
waste products around the farm, dairy  
and kitchen.

No man, however, should attempt to  
raise hogs without adequate pastures.  
For pastures woven wire is the best  
fencing material, all things considered.  
Around the field to be used for pas-  
ture run a woven wire fence thirty  
inches high with three strands of  
barbed wire above. This fence will not  
only turn hogs but other livestock.

The convenience in preparing the  
land and planting the crops, it is best  
not to divide the pasture up with per-  
manent fences. When the crops are  
ready for the hogs to be turned in on,  
by using a portable fence the field  
may be divided into lots of any size.  
The hurdle fence is simple and can be  
cheaply made, and when it is not in  
use it can be taken down and stored  
under a shed until needed again.

There is a mistake idea held by  
some that alfalfa, red clover, rape and  
similar crops will produce profitable  
gains when pastured without grain.  
The practical trials made at many ex-  
periment stations prove this not true.  
Of the many forage plants, alfalfa is  
one of the most satisfactory for hogs,  
since it can be made a permanent pas-  
ture and is rich in protein, making an  
excellent combination with corn. The  
leaves are tender and the stem small,  
which makes it easily masticated, and  
it is very much relished.

At the Mississippi station careful  
tests have been made to determine the  
value of alfalfa pasture without grain  
for hogs. Pigs ranging in age from  
3 to 24 months have been used, and the  
results of two years' work show that  
alfalfa is little more than a main-  
tenance ration for growing hogs without  
grain. Satisfactory gains have always  
been secured from alfalfa pastures by  
supplementing the pasture with from  
1 to 2 per cent of the weight of the  
hogs in corn or other grain.

Cowpeas without grain so far has  
given better results than any other  
crop for hog pasture. In one test the  
crop was grown on thin hill land  
where one acre of cowpeas produced  
100 pounds of pork. In another test  
on rich valley land one acre of cow-  
peas produced 483 pounds of pork.  
The hogs were put into the field when  
the peas were about ripe.

### POLAND-CHINA IS PURELY AMERICAN

Different claims have been made for  
the origin of the Poland-China breed  
of hogs, and with some breeders it is  
an open question yet. One man will  
give credit to some particular man for  
creating the Poland-China and some-  
times will give the credit to an-  
other man.

Coburn in his book "Swine in Amer-  
ica" says: "The truth is no one man  
can say he had more to do with the  
formation of the Poland-China breed  
than any other. It grew out of the  
production of the China hogs by the  
Shakers of the Union Village, Ohio,  
their crossing with the Russian and  
other breeds, and the subsequent crossing  
with the Berkshire and Irish Croziers."

"After 1841 or 1842, these breeds  
ceased to exist in either Butler or  
Warren counties, Ohio, and have had  
nothing whatever to do with the Pol-  
land-China breed for the last thirty-  
four years."

Contraverted as to the precise  
crosses and by whom and under what  
particular circumstances they were  
made, prior to the middle of the last  
century, to form the breed, may in-  
terest a few; but what is vastly more  
important is the fact that there was  
produced a race of swine now bearing  
the name of Poland-China that has  
been able to hold its own for three-  
fifths of a century as the most popu-  
lar and most widely distributed por-  
k-making machine in the foremost pork-  
producing region of the world.

Celery Without Fertilizer.  
"Can celery be raised without ferti-  
lizer?" asks an Oklahoma reader. It de-  
pends on the character of the soil. If  
that is very rich, like virgin soil, a good  
growth may be secured without either  
manure or chemical fertilizers. How-  
ever, growing celery without manure is  
not the practice of the good gardener.  
Good stable manure or compost is the  
best and safest of the plant foods for  
celery, and we add to this wood ashes,  
poultry manure or anything we have in  
this line. Sometimes the sweepings of a  
near blacksmith shop are available  
or street sweepings from a near city.  
It is optional with us whether to use  
commercial fertilizer; also. We can do  
very well with stable manure alone, but  
the others help.

**EXPERIMENTAL FARM**

Brady Commercial Club Lands Another Nice Plum--Both Santa Fe and Frisco Roads Interested

Secretary Hardison, of the Brady Commercial Club, this week received advices from Vice President Drake of the Frisco, to the effect that the Santa Fe management had agreed to go in with the Frisco and the Brady Commercial Club on the experimental farm proposition, negotiations for which have been under way for some time.

By the terms arrived at the total expense of installing the farm--about \$1,000--will be borne equally by the two roads and the commercial club. The club agreed in the beginning to secure the land--20 acres--and procure the proper tenant for same. The land has already been secured--20 acres of the S. S. Graham farm, two miles north of town, and the club stands ready to carry out the balance of its contract.

In the conduct of this experimental farm the commercial club will have the assistance and advice of H. H. Harrington, Director of the Texas Agricultural Experimental Stations. He will assist in the selection of seed, supply necessary governmental instruction, and render all other assistance possible.

The directors of the commercial club feel that they have done something worthy of notice in securing this experimental farm in addition to having secured a special agent for the U. S. Farmers Co-Operative Demonstration work. The two propositions have no connection whatever, yet both are of vital interest and importance to Brady and surrounding territory.

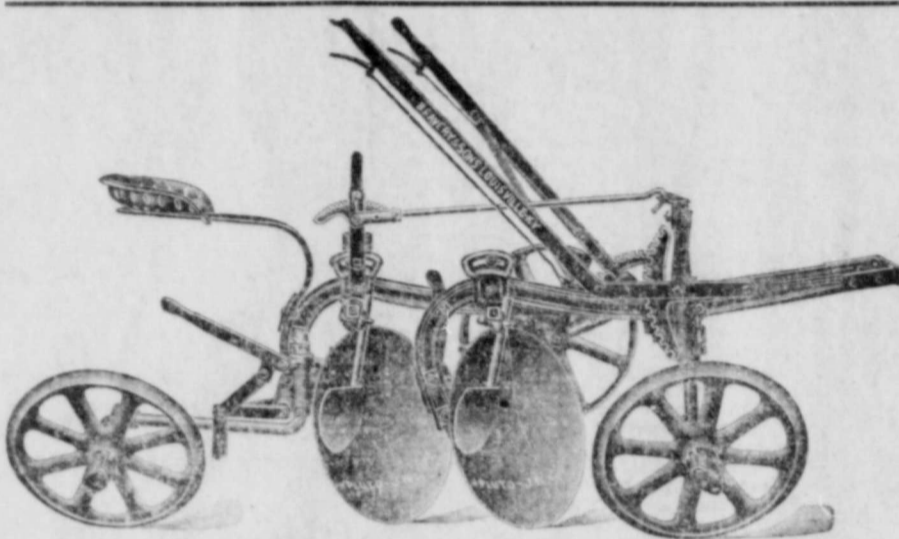
