Post Card Day.

Don't forget that Saturday is "post card day" in Brady. The commercial club has distributed thousands of cards among the various dealers of the city, and every citizen is expected to buy these cards liberally and mail them out Saturday. The cards show a variety of local views, are nicely printed and will prove a good advertisement for Brady and McCulloch county. They are being sold uniformly by the dealers at one-half cent each or ten for a nickel. It is hoped and desired that the entire 25,000 may be mailed out on this one day—Saturday, Nov. 12.

In this connection The Standard would call attention to a notice in this issue from Postmaster Doole. Mr. Doole calls attention to several points which will greatly facilitate the prompt handling of this vast number of cards. If his instructions are followed the entire 25,000 cards may be mailed and promptly handled by the postoffice force in addition to the regular mail for the day without any great inconvenience. The cancelling machine at the postoffice is set to cancel stamps in the upper right

hand corner only, so it is important that all stamps be properly affixed. Again, if you mail as many as ten cards, face them all the same way and hand the package in at the general delivery window. By doing this much time can be saved in handling the cards.

Buy your cards early; don't wait till Saturday; buy them now and stamp and address them and have them ready for mailing. Mail them early Saturday. Above all, buy them liberally and don't fail to mail out all you buy. Send everybody a card you can think of, and think of all the friends and acquaintances you ever had.

Dr. Jones was driving slowly, and at the time was carefully swerving to one side of the street to avoid frightening Mr. Harryman's team. Mr. Harryman was on the opposite side of the street from his team, and glanced around just in time to note that possibly the horses were becoming restless. Without taking note of the approaching auto he started to run to his team and sprang right in front of the machine which struck him and knocked him down. Dr. Jones stopped his car immediately and helped convey the injured man to a nearby residence. Dr. A. S. Holley was summoned and found Mr. Harryman painfully injured about the back, but states this morning that he does not think the injuries will prove serious though Mr. Harryman will probably be confined to his room for several days.

No blame attaches to Dr. Jones for the accident. He is one of the most careful drivers in the city, and was proceeding with his usual caution at the time of the accident.

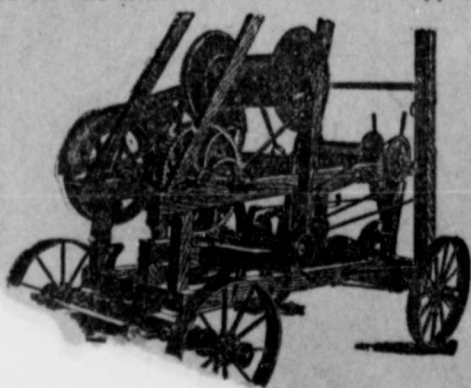

Observations at State Fair.

Every Texan and every visitor from other States admits that the exhibits, attractions, etc., of the Texas State Fair were the best that have ever been made in the State. A great many people who have attended National exhibitions state that it was equal to some of the greatest expositions they had ever seen. It not only attracted people from every part of the greatest State in the Union, but from everywhere in the United States came visitors to marvel at the wonders of our great people.

There are always lessons to learn under these conditions: One, who is vitally interested in the development of his country, could not afford to be only an admirer of the displays, exhibits, etc., but should be a student and carefully study the circumstances and environments that make it possible for such development.

I notice, with pleasure, the enterprise of certain localities. Wide awake citizens who have faith in the future of their country and large enough to invest in any legitimate measure to place their particular section to the notice of the world. No county is good enough to push itself into the hands of the investor; no city has such attractions and inducements as to force itself upon the attention of the public, without exploiting its virtues. Therefore the necessity of organization and judicious advertising. The Dallas fair offers annually the greatest opportunity for the most effective advertising that can possibly be secured. You can hear or read of the possibilities and attractions of any county for years, yet one display of the products of that same territory brought to your notice will have a greater effect than any other.

Only a few weeks ago it was definitely determined by the Brady Commercial Club to make an effort at the Dallas fair to place on exhibition some of the products of McCulloch county. Not enough time was taken, nor enough interest and enterprise manifested by our citizens to make it just what we wanted it to be, still some of our people got busy and the result was such as to prevent our stall from looking like a failure—especially when we compare it with others that cost several thousand dollars and months of hard work, carefully selecting the best the community could possibly raise. I found the county exhibitors had been carefully selected by the people who sent them with the products of the county. Each man was well supplied with literature, post card scenes, placards, in fact everything that could be relied upon to touch the psychological spot of the investor and homeseeeker. I found that I was among the vanguard of the best advertisers in the world. That, so far as workers go, there were congregated in Dallas the liveliest bunch in all the West. I am proud to say, that we were treated with every courtesy due us. There was no bitterness, envy and abuse. Each fellow allowed the other man the perfect right to think that he represented the "Garden of the Gods"—the long lost paradise. When I would state with all frankness that I represented a county where the possibilities were the greatest for the investor or homeseeeker, the next man with equal candor and the same faith in his county would say practically the same thing about his county. Therefore, the exhibits would have to say something in evidence of the assertions made. In view of the fact that we did not have a large quantity for exhibition, we carefully selected and en-

deavored to place as attractively as possible the products that do well in this county. We were supplied plentifully with post cards, hundreds of folders, real estate facts and one thousand of as neat and attractive booklets as we saw in the entire agricultural building.

We had the pleasure of giving each exhibit a careful investigation. We made it a point to study conditions in each county represented there. After all, we came away with greater faith in the possibilities and opportunities of McCulloch county and in the integrity of her citizens than we had before.

Now, there may be a few of our citizens who do not think the Commercial Club a necessary factor in the development of our country and city, and give it no moral or financial support. We will make the assertion that no one can visit a state or county fair and long be of that opinion. However, we may have a few growlers, discouragers, among us. Every place of any prominence has such unnecessary ballast to carry. We suppose they serve some purpose in the physical world, like fleas on a dog or ticks on cattle, but we endeavor by severe methods to eliminate these pests from our live stock, and about the only method we can adopt for the average discourager is to place in his position a man who manifests a pushing, progressive spirit.

To the active directors of the Brady Commercial Club, much praise is due for the public spirit they have displayed in placing upon the map our county and its growing capital.

They have done their best with the limited means provided, and the work is one that will live.

To the farmers of the county who so generously and nobly responded to our plea for aid is due the warmest thanks of every public spirited citizen. Had it not been for these farmers our exhibit would have been a failure. As it was, we are proud of the showing made and the results already beginning to show.

About Post Cards.

It is anticipated that our citizens will enter heartily into the spirit of post card day advertised by our Commercial Club for Nov. 12th, 1910, and, as it is always desirable to give the best service, and further, as a matter of local pride, in order that all cards may be properly routed and dispatched on the same day received, we respectfully ask the co-operation of our patrons to that end and ask that the following rules be observed in mailing your post cards:

1st. Be very sure that each card you mail is legibly addressed (preferably in ink) with a one cent stamp in the upper right hand corner.

2nd. Face all your cards one way; that is so that it will not be necessary for the clerk to arrange them before stamping. This will save one half the time.

3rd. For this one day we will receive your cards in bulk (when you have as many as ten to mail at one time) at the stamp window, and prefer to do this than to have them put in the letter drops.

4th. Mail your cards as early in the day as possible. The mails for all points served by hack lines close upon the arrival of the train from Fort Worth and the mails for all points to be dispatched by the train, close at 8.00 p. m.

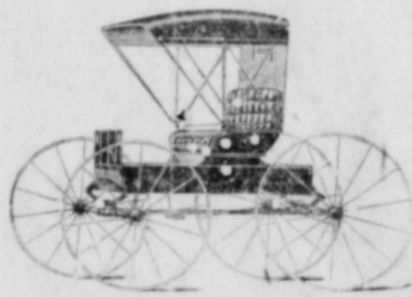

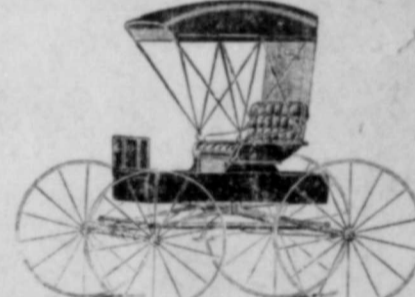
