COUNTY VOTE IS LIGHT

Only About One-Fourth of the Voters of McCulloch County Went to the Polls Tuesday.

The total vote for McCulloch county in Tuesday's general election was only 630, a little more than one-fourth the voting strength of the county. Three boxes failed to hold an election; to-wit: Stacy, Camp San Saba and Mt. Tabor.

In the governor's race Colquitt received 456 votes, Terrell 30, Houston 18, Andrews 114, Schmidt 12. Three boxes in the county—Rochelle, Cow Boy and Pear Valley—gave Andrews, the socialist candidate, majorities.

There were 408 votes for the constitutional amendment and 50 against.

In the Brady box 242 votes were polled, which was not a great deal more than half the number polled in the bridge bond election last month.

To Begin Work on Yards.

W. F. Barbour has the contract to construct the Santa Fe's yards in Brady and will move his camp to town and begin the work within the next few days. He will reconstruct the grade for the main line track, level the depot grounds and lay out the side tracks—in fact will put the entire yards in shape for business.

DEPOT CONTRACT LET

Frisco Lets Contracts for Four Handsome Structures on Brady and Menard Extension.

The following item was printed in the local railroad column of Tuesday's Fort Worth Record:

It is announced that the passenger depots which the Frisco will erect at Whiteland, Henderson, Callan and Menard on the new Brady-Menard branch, will be of concrete and stone, and each will represent a cost of several thousand dollars. The contract for the erection of depots, stockyards and other structures between Brady and Menard has been let to the Jarret Construction Company of Springfield.

Work begins within the next month.

Tomatoes \$320 Per Acre.

D. H. Henderson, the Lost Creek farmer, was in town Wednesday and paid the Standard a pleasant call. Mr. Henderson is naturally quite proud of his artesian well, and gave us an illustration of its worth in irrigation.

He planted a quarter-acre in tomatoes, irrigating the patch from his well. He sold \$60 worth of ripe fruit from these vines and estimates that his family consumed and gave away to neighbors fully \$20 worth more, making \$80 worth of tomatoes from the quarter-acre. This is \$320 per acre for tomatoes, and serves to show what that section of McCulloch county will do with proper effort.

Mr. Henderson says that this patch was planted in the way of an experiment, and that no attempt was made to care for the vines as they should have been cared for and that as a consequence fully half of the fruit the vines put on rotted or were wasted.

Roosevelt in a recent address to
a church conference.

Rightly spoken. He feels at
home among the Baptists, Catho-
lics, Jews, Mormons and Holy
Rollers. He feels at home in the
jungles of Africa; in a fight with
the vatican; in a political con-
vention; in the bowels of the
earth; in the depths as a passen-
ger on a submarine, or above the
earth in an aeroplane. He feels
at home hobnobbing with the
crowned heads of Europe and in
the humble homes of the Penn-
sylvania miners. He feels at
home at Osawatomie and at Sara-
toga; on one side of the trust or
the tariff question and on the
other. He feels at home in a
muck-raking political campaign
and in a dangerous correspon-
dence with Dear Maria or Dear
Harriman. He feels at home at
a prize fight or a church bazar.
He feels very much at home in
the White House and would not
feel out of place on a throne.

The only place or function un-
der the sun in which he does not
feel at home is in the modest do-
ing of a day's work without mak-
ing a noise, or in wearing the
dignity of a former President of
the United States with the sober
reflection that somebody else in
the world has sense and virtue.

THE ROAD BOND ISSUE.

At the meeting of the directors
of the Brady Commercial Club
Monday it was determined to
bring the matter of issuing road
bonds in the Brady precinct to
an immediate head, and the com-
mittee previously appointed was
instructed to go ahead at once
and complete their labors.

This action meets with the ap-
proval of The Standard. We
have consistently preached a road
bond issue for the past year, and
we are glad to know that some-
thing is now due to come to pass.
The experience of the Brown-
wood precinct and other districts
in the state proves the efficacy
of the plan, and it is an undeni-
able fact that McCulloch county
needs good roads worse than any
other one thing.

Experience has proven that
there is only one way to build
good, permanent roads, and that
way is by bond issue. It is the
only way in which sufficient
money can be procured for the
purpose, and it is the only way
which gives equal and exact jus-
tice to all the citizens. A bond
issue means that a man pays pro-
portionately what he should pay.
It means that railroads and other
corporations pay their portion of
the cost—which is no inconsid-
erable item in itself.

But the biggest item in favor
of the road bonds at this time is
the fact that the construction of
the road will give employment to
McCulloch county men and teams

just at a time when that employ-
ment is most needed. The county
has suffered the hardest year,
agriculturally, it has ever had,
and money conditions are such
that the turning loose of \$100,000
road money at this time would
prove a blessing to many farmers
and laborers. The work can
nearly all be done by home peo-
ple, and on an issue of \$100,000
it is safe to say that 75 per cent
(possibly more) of this amount
would find its way into the pock-
ets of home people—and the very
people who most need it. All
this money would be kept at
home and placed in local circula-
tion.

By all means, let us have the
bond issue—and good roads.

If you want a vehicle remem-
ber your home dealer. He is
here twelve months in the year,
ready to correct any mistake that
has been made in the making of
the vehicle, and is anxious to do
so. He wants your trade for
years and does not feel content to
make one sale but wants to sell
you again and again.—Childress
Index.

No matter what you want, buy
it at home: it's cheaper in the
long run to deal with home peo-
ple who stand behind their goods
and give you assistance in many
ways when necessary. This ap-
plies also to the home printer,
and the business man who sends
away for printing which he could
have procured at home has no
kick when his patrons send away
for something which he could
have supplied them with.

A feature brought out by the
Federal census in favor of Texas
is the large increase of her rural
population. In most States in
the Union the figures show that
the towns and cities have in-
creased at the expense of the
rural districts, but in Texas this
condition is reversed, and while
practically all Texas towns and
cities have made remarkable
strides in population, the rural
communities have also kept pace,
proving conclusively that farm
life in Texas has its attractions
and that the "back to the farm
movement" is having its effect
in the Lone Star State.—Brady
Standard.

An even and symmetrical de-
velopment is all that Texas needs
to hold the lead, and this the
State enjoys. In many of the
States the soil is worn out, or
has been washed off by the rains.
The soil of Texas is, as a rule, a
sort of soil that will not wash off
and that will last always if pro-
perly cared for.—Dallas News.

HEARSE IN CONNECTION

CLUB DIRECTORS MEET

Commercial Club Held Meeting Monday at Which the Road Bond Issue for this Precinct is Revived.

A very interesting meeting of the directors of the Brady Commercial Club was held at the club rooms Monday morning and a number of things of interest were discussed.

Secretary Hardison made his report of the McCulloch county exhibit at the Dallas fair. He told of the difficulties encountered, the success attained, the number of pieces of literature distributed, in fact made a detailed report of his stewardship in the matter. The total expense of the exhibit was only \$130, which is without doubt the cheapest agricultural exhibit ever had at the state fair. In spite of the small amount of money spent and the short time in which the exhibit was prepared, McCulloch county made an excellent showing in comparison with other counties which spent thousands of dollars and months of time in preparation and exploitation.

After hearing the report a vote of thanks was given Mr. Hardison for the part he played, and in recognition of his unceasing efforts and tireless energy he was voluntarily and unanimously granted a week's vacation.

Members of the finance committee were present at the meeting, and to their attention was called the absolute necessity for this committee getting back into the harness again. Many of the club members have "backslid" in regard to paying their dues, and the committee was instructed to get busy and round up the delinquents and add all the new names possible. The club is doing a great work, and it is the duty of every citizen to help.

C. A. Trigg was duly elected to a place on the directorate to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of R. A. Rutherford, Jr. Mr. Trigg was present and accepted the responsibilities like the good citizen that he is.

It was suggested that a day be soon set apart on which the commercial club, with the assistance of the business people in general, should entertain the farmers of the Brady country. The idea met with general favor, and a committee was appointed to map out a plan of procedure.

The "good roads" committee was resuscitated, and a big dose of rejuvenating fluid was injected into the chairman thereof, who was present. This gentleman, Mr. Bell, stated that the preliminary work looking to a road bond issue for the Brady precinct, was all but completed, and he would immediately have his committee get to work. Director Crothers pointed out the many great advantages which a bond issue for road work would bring forth to the farmers of the county just at this time, and it was determined that no further time should be lost in putting the move on foot and having the election called.

The secretary reported business picking up materially in the correspondence line since the fair, and that calls for the new booklets were coming in by every mail. The Santa Fe people have asked for as many as a thousand. This booklet is said to have been the best piece of literature in the agricultural building at the fair.

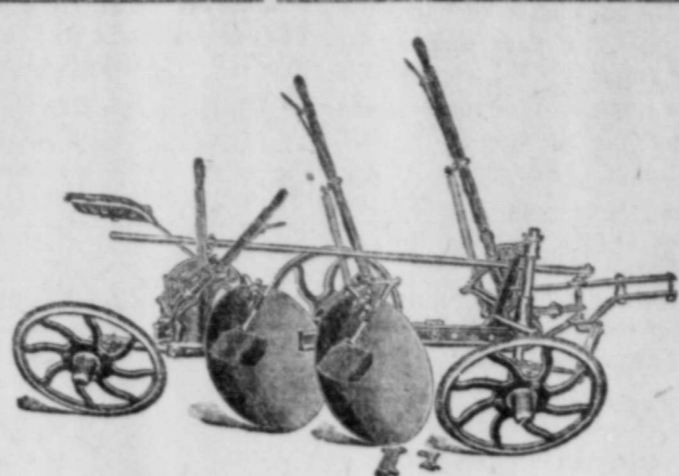

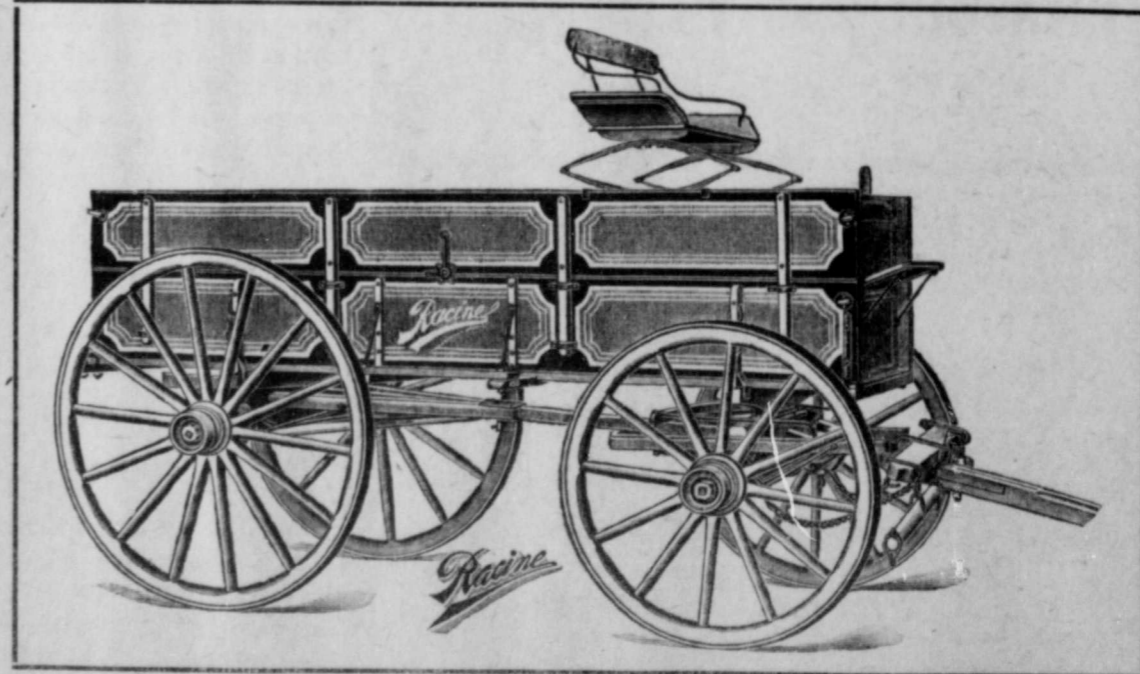

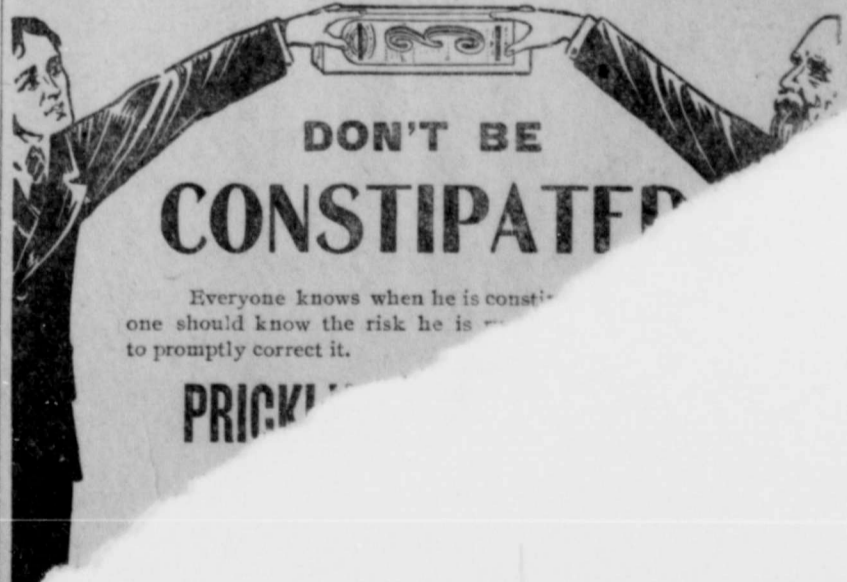

TO PRISON WITH MEN

Transfer Agent Takes Four, Chained Together With Chains About Their Necks to Insure Safety.

Constable Bud Russell of Blum, Texas, who is also assistant State transfer agent, spent last night in Brownwood with four prisoners enroute to Huntsville. When he left over the Santa Fe this morning he had the four men chained together with chains about their necks and the dejected looks of the quartette did not fail to gain the sympathy of the on-lookers. The men are J. W. Beasley, Walter Lewis, J. A. Ferguson and Roy Sexton. Ferguson and Lewis were convicted at Ballinger on charges of forgery and Roy Sexton was convicted of disposing of mortgaged property. Beasley was sent up from Gatesville for burglary and last March escaped from one of the farms after having been there but little more than a week. He was captured a few days ago by Sheriff T. L. Sanson of Brady. Beasley was accompanied by his wife and baby who were enroute to Gatesville to stay with relatives while the father was serving the remainder of the two years for which he was sentenced. It was indeed a pitiable sight to witness the little 2-year-old son toying with the heavy brace chain about his father's neck. The men were all reasonably young and neat in appearance. — Brownwood Bulletin.

Lion Feeds a Child.

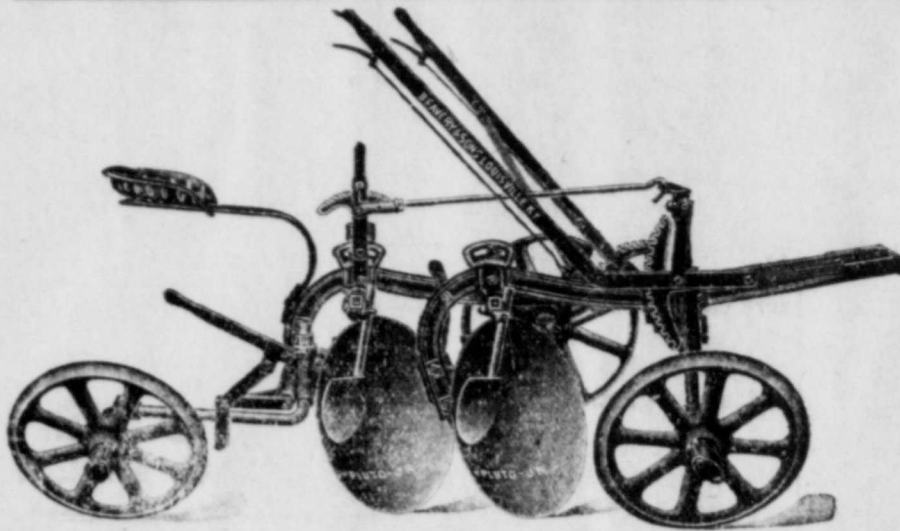
