Chairman Thos. Bell, of the good roads committee of the commercial club, informs us that the petition for the issuance of bonds will be presented to the commissioners court at this term. The locations picked out for the passenger and freight depots by the Santa Fe necessitates much additional work in the way of grading and filling. **WORTH PAYING FOR.**

"Our cities are growing faster than the country districts," B. F. Yoakum told Oklahoma farmers the other day, "because money is poured into them to make them grow. Our farming industry is not developing as it should because not enough money is expended for the farm life to enable it to keep pace with the town life."

Farmers constitute nearly a third of the country's population and farm products make up nearly a third of the country's commerce; but of the money that the country spends on public improvements what proportion goes directly to the bettering of the farm? Contrast the amount borrowed by cities for street improvements with the amount borrowed to improve country roads.

To make farm life more attractive by quoting from Mr. Wordsworth's appreciations of Nature and by distributing domestic-science literature, that shows how to nourish the hired man without pie, is an amiable and praiseworthy ambition; but the sordid fact is that making the farm more attractive is going to take money. Rural mail delivery, telephones and automobiles have added to the attractiveness of country life; and they have cost something too. How would the city man enjoy an annual appropriation of thirty-seven dollars a mile for street improvements and a recommendation to read Wordsworth?

Good country roads will add more to the farm economically and socially than almost any other one thing. If a city were in like position it would, as a matter of course, borrow the money and make the improvements. Farmers are entitled to use about a third of the country's credit. Whatever amount of credit they use for intelligent road improvement will prove a good investment.—Saturday Evening Post.

THE Brownwood precinct voted four to one for the issuance of an additional \$50,000 road bonds Monday. They voted \$100,000 about a year ago, and spent the money. The results were so pleasing that they decided to call an election for \$50,000 more with which to complete the work. The vote of four to one shows that where once tried the bond issue is proven the only means of getting good roads. Let this be an object lesson to McCulloch county—to every county in Texas.

THAT road bond issue is coming. Watch for it, then work for it.

**Broom Corn Figures.**

J. D. Moody, the Eden broom factory man, was here Thursday with a load of brooms which found ready sale. Mr. Moody says the broom corn crop in the Brady country turned out much better than he anticipated and that he has bought practically all the brush raised, which will be sufficient to run his factory for some months.

As an illustration of how this crop pays the farmer he gives us the following figures: Jim Price, of Menard, planted 12 3-4 acres, three acres of which was poor stand. It was under irrigation and produced two crops. The first crop was 3 1-2 tons which Mr. Moody bought at \$80 per ton. The second crop was two tons and brought the same price. His first crop of fodder sold for \$80 and the seed brought \$50, and Mr. Price has his second crop of fodder yet on hand. Total revenue from the twelve acres, \$570.

Of course a second crop is not possible except under irrigation, but Mr. Moody contends that any dry land farmer can raise broom corn in the Brady country and make it pay better than cotton. He would like to see more of the brush raised and promises to buy at market price all that can be raised, and if necessary will enlarge his factory in order to be able to handle the product.

## KEEP WATER PLENTIFUL DURING HOT SUMMER

Just as Essential as Ration and Should Be Constantly Watched.

Keep plenty of water where the pigs can readily get at it as through the summer. This is often not done, and the pigs do not do so well as a consequence. Water should be given at all times in rear of hogs in order that they may do their best.

There are a number of hog raisers who make a practice of watering their hogs three a day and seem to be of the opinion that this is sufficient, but it is far from it. A hog does not drink a great deal of water at any one time, but will drink little at a large number of times if it is handy. If a supply of water is kept where hogs can readily get at it at any time it will be noticed that the young pigs will go to the drinking place every few minutes through the day. To supply water so this can be done an automatic waterer of some kind should be provided. There are a number of these on the market, and they are not expensive.

The man who is fortunate enough to have an artesian well, or a spring on his farm, has had the question of watering his stock solved for him and is extremely fortunate. Many hog men keep their hogs along the banks of some running stream, but this is neither satisfactory nor safe, as many cases of hog cholera and other contagious diseases can be traced to some such source, as it seems the germs of such diseases are very easily carried in the water. When the weather is at its hottest, a man who is working has occasion to drink very frequently, and the general health and growth of his swine herd will be materially increased if they are allowed the same privilege.

## STAG FATTENING, PIG AND SHOAT FEEDING

Stimulate Appetite by Giving Variety of Feeds—Don't Feed Too Heavily.

How to fatten a stag hog and how to feed pig and shoats is briefly and clearly told by William Dietrich, who has just issued a book on hog breeding and hog raising, in answer to questions put to him by an Ohio hog raiser. The book is sold by Jones Drug Co., and to Mr. Dietrich, and the answer follows:

"How would you feed a stag weighing 500 or 600 pounds that is able to make and carry 900 or 1,000 pounds? Would you rather give him a ration of corn or a ration of corn and hay? I think a good thing in addition to the corn he is fed? Would this improve his appetite? He is now eating from ten to twelve ears of corn at a feed and would like to eat for more. Would it be a more profitable policy to sell barley and buy middlings to feed pigs and shoats, or have the barley ground and fed exclusively? Barley sells for 50 cents, middlings in ton quantities can be bought for \$25 per ton."

In order to stimulate the appetite of a pig he should be given a variety of feeds and put in the form of a slop. Furthermore, if a hog is fed in the same pen with another hog, he will sometimes eat more and do better. This is not always true, especially in the case of a boar, but is usually true with sows and barrows. While a fattening hog does not need a great deal of protein, a little tankage or some other nitrogenous concentrate in connection with barley and corn will be a good thing, one part of tankage to fifteen or twenty parts of barley and corn combined would be sufficient. It would be better to grind the barley fine rather than to feed it in the form of barley chop, and then mix the tankage and barley together with water into a slop. In order to make the stag eat the largest quantity of food he should be given all he will eat, but always feed so that he is still a little hungry when he has eaten everything that was put before him.

At the prices given it would be better to feed the barley rather than to sell it and buy middlings. The barley, however, should be ground into a fine meal and put in the form of a slop. It is well to remember that a variety of feeds is better than a ration made up of one or two feeds, and with this in view it might prove advantageous to sell some of the barley and get a little middlings so as to have a ration made up of corn, barley and middlings together with the necessary nitrogenous concentrate. The best way to feed a pig is to sell some of the barley and get a ration made up simply of corn and barley.

### ADVISE TO GET BUSY

Farmers Should Increase Their Stock and Breed Better Strains.

Get busy and raise hogs is about as good advice as this paper can give to its farmer readers, and it therefore advises such action. There are not enough hogs in the country to supply demands, and the demand is increasing so rapidly that it will require more than a year of lively breeding to put the hog supply of the country on a level with the demand for pork products. That being true, it follows that hog prices will continue so high that there will be money in the business.

Illinois is short on hogs this year. Indiana is short. Iowa is short and Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Ohio and Minnesota are all short the number of hogs in some of the states, amounting nearly 50 per cent less than at this time a year ago, and this is in the face of increased population and an increased demand for pork products.

Do not attempt to raise more pigs than you can handle well, else they will eat up all the profit. Care of the hogs does not mean feeding alone, but it means giving them attention necessary to keep them in good health.

The hog lot should be changed and plowed up frequently, as disease germs are likely to be deposited in the ground and plowing sweetens the soil.

It is a bad practice to take all the pigs from the sow at once. She should be dried up gradually. Sudden weaning of a large litter from a heavy milking sow very often produces caked udder and other troubles.

### Chemical Engine Shipped.

The city council has received the bill lading for the chemical fire engine recently purchased. It was shipped from Elmira, N. Y., on the 6th, and will arrive about the 20th.

This is a fine machine, and of the same pattern as is used in Dallas. In fact, Mayor Conley asserts that he was informed by the Dallas Chief, that this engine extinguishes two-thirds of the fires in Dallas. This will be a great addition to Brady's fire department, and will give protection to the residence districts as well as the business portion of town. Arrangements have been made to keep the machine at the garage of the Brady Auto Co., and this company will pull it by auto to fires.

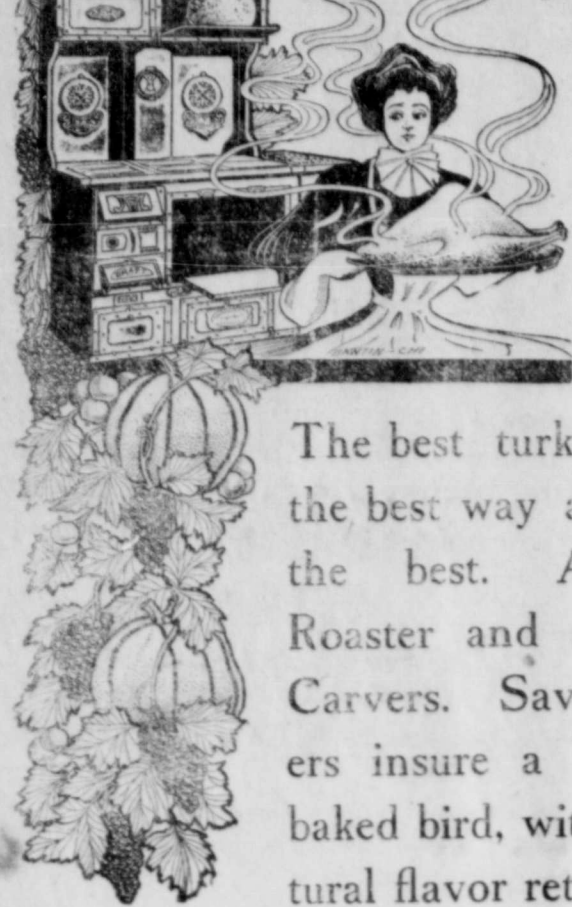

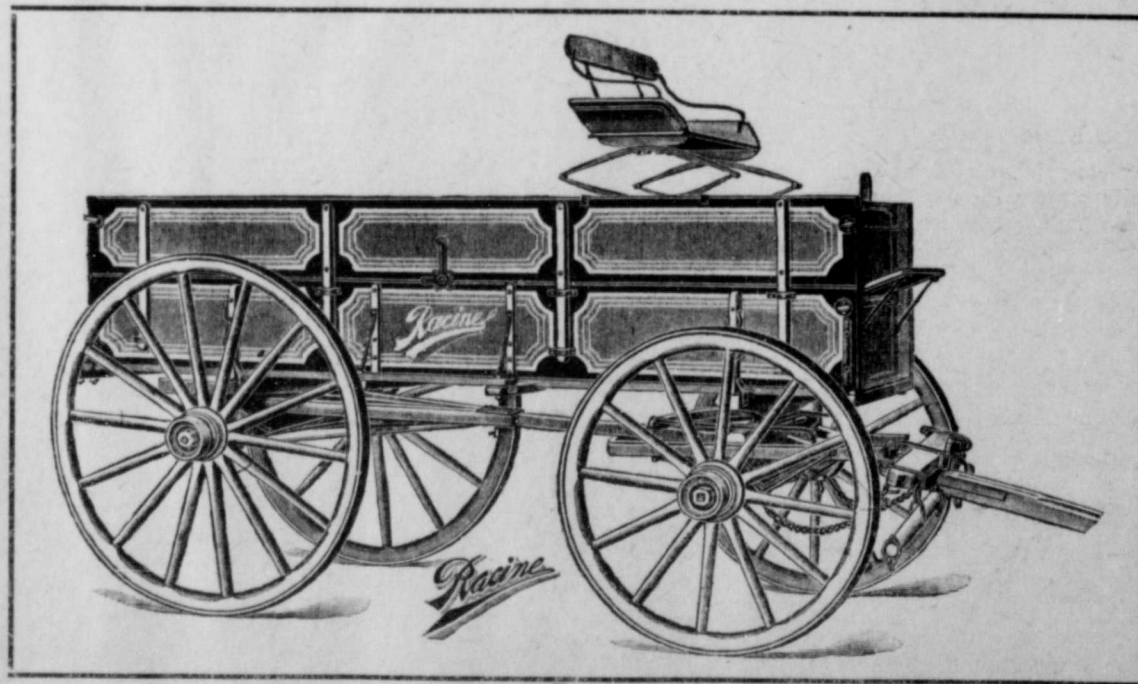

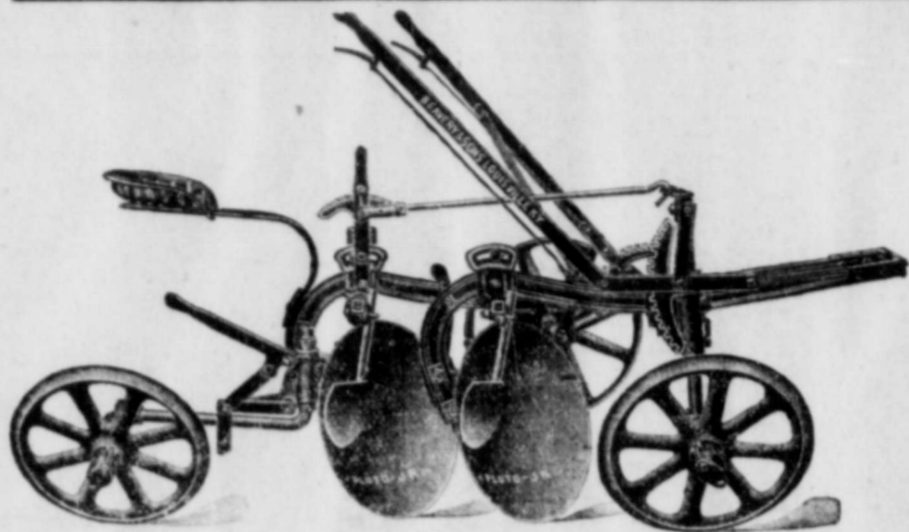
