PRINTER SHOTS WIFE WALKER-SMITH BUILD

Jim Stevens, Once at Brady, in Jail in Oklahoma—Wife is Shot in Face and Shoulder.

Jimmie Stevens, an Altus printer, who lived in Quanah eight years ago, and was known by the name of Pete, tried to kill his wife last Tuesday.

Two months ago Stevens passed through here, and called upon acquaintances for money to enable him to reach the sanitarium at San Antonio, as he was a consumptive. Instead of going there, he remained at Crowell and Chillicothe.

Last week he came back to Altus, and upon his wife's refusal to live with him, he emptied his sixshooter at her. Mrs. Stevens was shot in the cheek and shoulder, but grappled with her husband, and in the scuffle he received a bullet in the forearm.

Stevens is in jail to await the outcome of his wife's injuries. Insanity will probably be his defense, as he has always been considered a little off.—Quanah Tribune-Chief.

Stevens will be remembered by a good many Brady people as a printer employed on The Standard last winter for a few weeks. He attempted to hold the foremanship of the office, but on account of lack of capability for the position was displaced. This made him mad, and the following night he entered the office by a rear window, "queered" the gasoline engine, and pulled out that night for Coleman, leaving his wife and baby here for a time.

Mrs. Stevens was very young and was a handsome and attractive woman, who made a good many friends during her short stay in Brady.

Big Wholesale Concern Evidences Faith in Brady by Planning for a Big Modern Business House.

J. R. Stone, manager for the local branch of the Walker-Smith wholesale grocery house, was in Brownwood last week and while there was informed by headquarters that the firm would proceed at once with the work of constructing a modern business house on the lots recently acquired by the firm just opposite the proposed Santa Fe freight depot on the north side. Work will begin in the near future and the building will be ready for occupancy by the time the Santa Fe gets into Brady, probably sooner.

The house will have trackage facilities. It will be 80x100 feet in size and will consist of a basement, one story and double deck. The walls will be built extra high, and to all practical intents the building will be equal to a two-story and basement affair. The basement will be the full size of the house, and all modern conveniences will be arranged to carry on the business of the firm. The building will be constructed of either brick or stone.

Mr. Stone is authority for the statement that the local branch will be in a position to greatly increase its stock, and will probably carry \$75,000 worth of goods when they get into the new building.

There is also a rumor that the Waples-Platter people are considering a branch house in Brady. The Standard did not long ago of the purchase of lots on the Santa Fe trackage by a Llano concern who expected to establish a wholesale grocery business here, so it would seem that Brady is to take some important steps forward in the wholesale line within the next six or eight months.

The farmer gets the same price for a bale of cotton hauled over good roads as he gets for a bale of cotton hauled over bad roads. The farmer is the man who profits by good roads and he likewise pays the penalty for bad roads. Build roads and reduce expenses of marketing farm products.

We note a clipping from a Michigan paper giving some figures on big loads of sugar beets which the farmers haul in Bay county over good roads. With two horses loads have been hauled aggregating nearly 13,000 pounds. An average taken on 28 loads received in one day showed three and three-quarter tons. Such loads are only possible where permanent roads have been constructed. The farmer is the beneficiary.

Government Standard Cotton Grades.

The last congress passed a bill establishing a standard for grading American cotton and authorized and instructed the agricultural department to prepare the grades, and said grades were to be prepared on same basis, the Liverpool grades.

With the aid of Liverpool, New Orleans, Memphis and other leading cotton exchanges, the department announces they now have ready for distribution nine (9) grades which are put up in glass covered boxes, 20 inches square, with the photograph of each grade and the grade of same and its relative price to middling cotton stamped on each photograph.

The bill providing for standard grades instructed the department to make a charge for them to cover the expense of preparing them, which is \$35.00, and anyone who will send exchange or post office money order for this amount can procure said grades from the agricultural department at Washington. Farmers and all other business men who desire to examine these grades can see them by calling at Henry's Commercial School room in Brady.

Fire at Voce.

The town of Voce in the southern portion of the county, was the scene of a disastrous fire Saturday night, the general merchandise establishments of Spiller & Spiller and J. F. Sellman & Co. both going up in smoke.

The fire originated in the Spiller & Spiller store and spread rapidly to the Sellman house. The origin is not known.

Spiller & Spiller estimate their loss at \$6000, and carried insurance to the amount of \$2500. Their loss was complete except for some farming implements stored outside the building. J. F. Sellman & Co. carried insurance to the amount of \$1500 and a small portion of their stock was saved. The Standard is not informed as to an estimate of their loss.

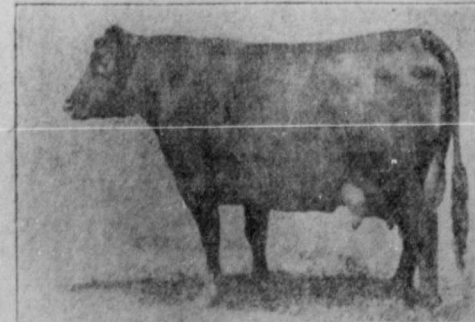

TWO'S AT \$30 ROUND

Big Deals at San Angelo in Which Fancy Prices are Paid for Cattle and Mules.

With cattle deals aggregating \$24,900 and mule deals aggregating \$32,000 closed up, Monday was the busiest day of the season in the live stock circles. A number of buyers were here all of the day and deals were numerous.

Frank Douglas realized the best price of the season for 2-year-old steers when he sold 350 head to J. E. Boog-Scott, of Coleman, at \$80 around, making a total amount involved of \$10,500. Bob Russell sold 600 head of 2-year-old steers to Caleb Burton at \$24 per head. This deal aggregated \$14,400.

J. Boykin was the big trafficker in mules Monday. He bought and sold 194 head. From J. E. Fenderson, Jr. he purchased 1 head of mule colts. From T. n. Hunt he secured 30 head of mule colts. He bought 19 head of mule colts from J. S. Dabney, 25 head from Sam Martin and 50 head from Sam Henderson. He paid \$50 per head for these colts, making a total of \$9,700.

Mr. Boykin found a ready market for all of his purchases. He immediately sold 70 head to Oscar Cain at \$55 per head, totaling up \$3,850. To Waco parties he sold 124 head, at \$55 around, making in all \$9,500. The other 19 he kept for himself.

Oscar Cain and Logan Mims sold 22 head of yearling mules to Oklahoma parties at \$100 per head, making a total of \$2,200.

R. C. DeLong purchased 30 head of mares and 17 head of horse colts from Hall Bros. at private terms.

Bob Russell sold to Jessie Cargile 3 head of mule colts for December delivery and 30 head of horse colts at private terms.

S. H. Cook purchased one car of mares from local parties at private terms.

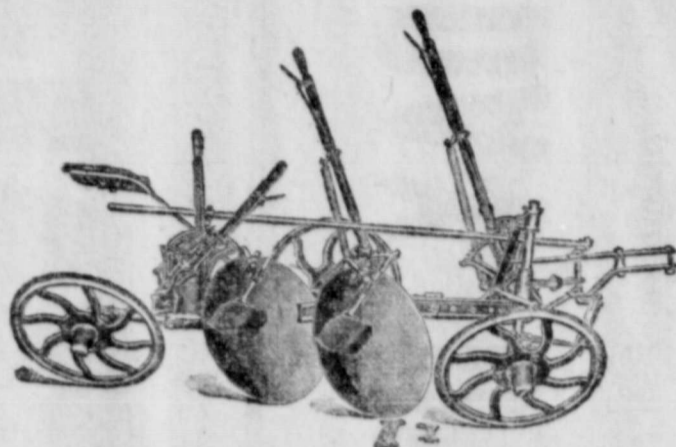

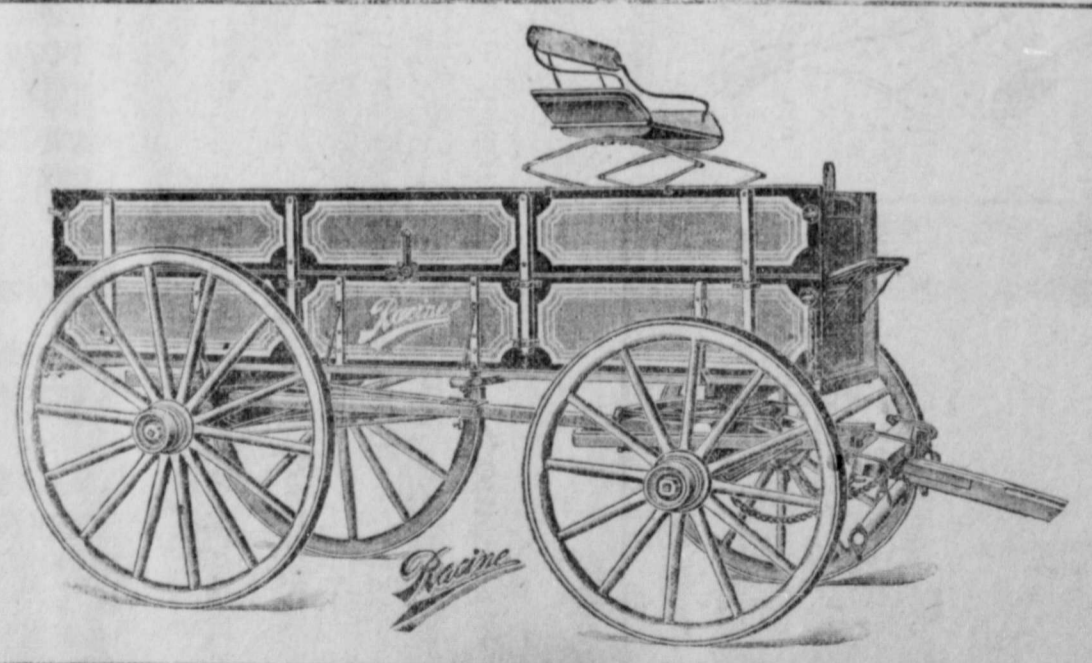

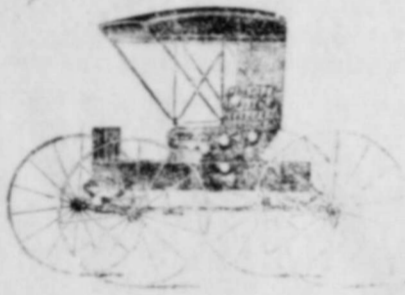
