WATER IMPROVEMENTS FAVORS ROAD BONDS

Brady Water & Light Company Make Deal for Increased Water Supply--Work is Now Under Way.

The hiatus which has existed in the local water supply for the past several weeks bids fair to come to an end within a few days, and the company promises its patrons plenty of water for all purposes.

A deal was made Wednesday by which the company buys from W. D. Crothers a tract of land on Live Oak Creek, about one mile from the courthouse, including a big natural hole of good water sufficient to supply the town for three months without any more rain. Superintendent A. M. Martin left Wednesday night for Dallas where he will buy a complete new electrical pumping apparatus and other material necessary for the installation of a power house on the new site. A large force of workmen went to work yesterday morning laying a string of pipe to the site, and this part of the work will be completed by Saturday night. Within a week's time, so The Standard is informed, the new water supply will be available and will be turned into the mains. Together with the amount supplied by the company's wells the water question will then be solved for the present.

The plans of the company for the future include the construction of a big reservoir on Live Oak, and the impounding of a sufficient quantity of water to forever settle the water question. However, that portion of the plan is yet to be worked out. The company intends to secure an ample supply of water for the needs of the city, and will spend much money to that end.

McCulloch County Farmer Gives Views on the Subject of Good Roads and Their Benefit.

EDITOR STANDARD:

As the good roads subject is being agitated almost everywhere, and as this writer is an advocate of good roads we will keep the subject ringing in the people's ears.

Now we are separated, say ten to sixteen miles from Brady, our county site, market and trading point, with every bad class of roads. What should we do, sit idle and wait for our section of the country to develop itself? No, for if we do we will find ourselves bent with age and our grand, good country just the same as it is today, in an undeveloped condition. If we want to see this country become famous as it should be and as it can be made, just give us a system of good roads and you will see the effect at once, it will shorten our roads by the saving of time. It will decrease the expense of marketing our farm products by being able to double the loads. One team can easily pull a load over a good road that it would take two to pull over a bad road. Can't you see?

Let us build good roads and you will see people admire the ambition of our people, and see them come to our fertile section to settle. And with the rest of us reach out the hand of welcome to everything that would tend to develop our grand resources and soon our desert places would blossom like the rose. Good houses, good farms, good people, good truck farms, good orchards, good stock and a net work of telephone wires all over grand old McCulloch county. All these and many more would soon be the result of a system of good roads.

And I believe that a road bond issue is the fairest and all around the best way to build and improve our public roads, and it should be looked after. If some parts of the county don't want good roads let those precincts that do want them take up the matter and vote precinct bonds.

The Brady and Austin road is the one that should receive our particular attention from this part at present as it belongs to all of us and the public in general. The Brady precinct will soon vote road bonds and, of course, will meet us six or seven miles from Brady. That will leave only thirteen or fourteen miles to the county line, and it would be a shame on us to leave our part of the road in its present condition. Now if we are too narrow between the eyes to vote road bonds to make better roads, I would like to suggest that we subscribe money, labor and teams to the amount of five or six hundred dollars or more and take one mile of our worst road and make it as good as we can

REMOVES MINNIE BALL

Confederate Soldier Carries Bullet in Head 47 Years—Incident Vouched for by Local Parties.

The following clipping is from the Victoria Advocate: Lucas DuBois, a well known ranchman of Refugio county, lately removed a bullet from the top of his head which had been there for 47 years. DuBois enlisted in Company E., Waller's Battalion, at Goliad at the outbreak of the Civil War, and was struck by the leaden missile in a skirmish at Holmes' Plantation in Louisiana in June 1863. The bullet buried itself deeply in Mr. DuBois' skull, and the wound was so dangerous that physicians feared to extract it. After these many years, a fall DuBois sustained from a horse loosened the missile sufficiently for him to remove it himself without any ill effects. He says of late years it occasionally caused him much pain and since its removal on October 27 he has not suffered any.

The truth of the foregoing is vouched for by several old Confederate soldiers in Brady who served through the war with Veteran DuBois. John Duke, Sr., informs The Standard that he was a member of the same command, company and mess with Mr. DuBois, and was with him in the skirmish in which he was wounded. He saw him when he received the wound, and saw DuBois' horse fall, throwing him into a rail fence. The command was in hasty retreat at the time, and the wounded soldier got to his feet and was assisted to escape by his comrades.

The wound, while very serious, only kept Comrade DuBois out of the army a few weeks, and he was soon back in active service. This is only another chapter from the unwritten history of the Civil War, and serves to illustrate the oft repeated claim that the most interesting of the happenings of that troublous time have never been put in print.

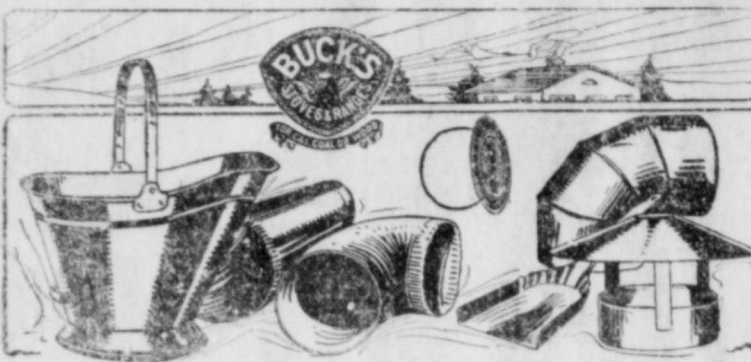
