City Council Has Called a Mass Meeting of Brady Citizens to Consider Perplexing Problem.

At a recent meeting of the city council a committee consisting of Mayor Conley and Alderman Reagan was appointed to confer with the Brady Water & Light Company relative to securing from the company a statement regarding its plans and expectations in the matter of supplying Brady with an unlimited quantity of water. This committee has completed its labors and is ready to report, and Mayor Conley has called a mass meeting of the citizens to convene at the courthouse tomorrow (Wednesday) night at 7:30 o'clock, at which time the report will be heard and the views of the people heard regarding what is to be done.

The Standard is informed by the committee that the report they have to make is far from satisfactory to the council, and lacks much of being reassuring regarding the probability of another water famine. The council is very desirous that this mass meeting be largely attended, that a full, frank and free discussion of the situation may be had, and that peace and harmony will prevail, all to the end that means may be arrived at whereby Brady's water prob'em will receive a start on its long road to a successful solution. road to a successful solution. SANTA FE WANTS BIDS

Understood That Eight New Passenger Stations Are to be Built on San Saba Extension.

Galveston, Tex., Dec. 10. With the completion of the San Saba extension of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe, as the line is known that starts in Lometa, Lampasas county, runs through San Saba and McCulloch counties and terminates for the present at Eden in Concho county, it is understood on good authority in the near future the Santa Fe will call for bids for the construction of eight passenger stations along the line. These stations, it is said, have not as yet been promised to the people of the various towns along the railroad, and as yet no official announcement has been made, but definite action on the part of the road is expected shortly. Six of the stations will be, it

is understood, of what is known as the standard type, costing from \$2,500 to \$3,500 each. It is said, however, that the towns of San Saba and Brady will have tations of a special type, costing between \$8,000 and \$10,000 each. The official announcement in regard to this addition to the towns along the extension will, it is understood, be made within a week or two from the present. The new line is approximately 100 miles in length, runs through a country that is rich in the production of corn, cotton and milo maize, and promises a future heavy tonnage of agricultural products.



COAL TAR IN ROADMAKING.

Similar to Asphalt Pavement, but of a More Resilient Character.

Revolution in highway construction is predicted by many road engineers, but many others believe the successful only innovation. In that event the tar sidered. A property tarred road is swept and washed in much the same manner as an asphalt pavement.




A Long Day In the Life of an English Lady In 1791.

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

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



If broken stone is to form the wearing surface, then some means must be found to hold the binding particles so firmly that they cannot be sucked out, and sufficient strength must be given to the mass to enable it to withstand the sliding action of the wheels at bends and turns. Several kinds of tar macadam answer fairly well, but they are expensive. It would seem that the most promis-

ing kind of road for heavy automobile traffic is what is called durax in England. It is a pavement of three inch irregular cubes of hard stone laid in small segments of circles. These stones can be cut by machin-

ery and are comparatively inexpensive. They are laid without grout. but there seems to be no reason for its omission except the cost. Great



Unique Roadmaking Plan.

Judge William E. Porter of Lawrence county, Pa., has a unique idea for improving the roads. His plan is a jail on wheels-that is, a place where prisoners can be locked up at night and transported from place to place and employed in roadmaking during the day. He put his idea to a test, and the results were eminently satisfactory. The prisoners graded away a high hill on the West Pittsburg road near Newcastle and constructed a cement bridge over a culvert eighty feet long. The only expense to the county from this bridge that would ordinarily have cost thousands of dollars was for the material and the services of an engineer. The men employed were sentenced from ten to the sentence would be materially lessened if they would work on the roads and not attempt to escape, and they worked.
