

San Francisco Captures House.

In the contest between New Orleans and San Francisco for recognition from the government as the exposition site for the holding of an exposition to celebrate the opening of the Panama canal, the House of Representatives favored San Francisco by a vote of 188 to 159. On the final vote the San Francisco resolution was passed by a vote of 259 to 43.

San Francisco won by capturing the Republican vote in the House. New Orleans' support came from the Democrats. Only thirty Republicans voted for New Orleans. Thirty-six Democrats voted for San Francisco.

The San Francisco resolution does not ask for Government aid in any form. It simply authorizes the President of the United States to invite foreign nations to participate in the fair.

The New Orleans bill called for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for a Government exhibit and the creation of a Government commission.

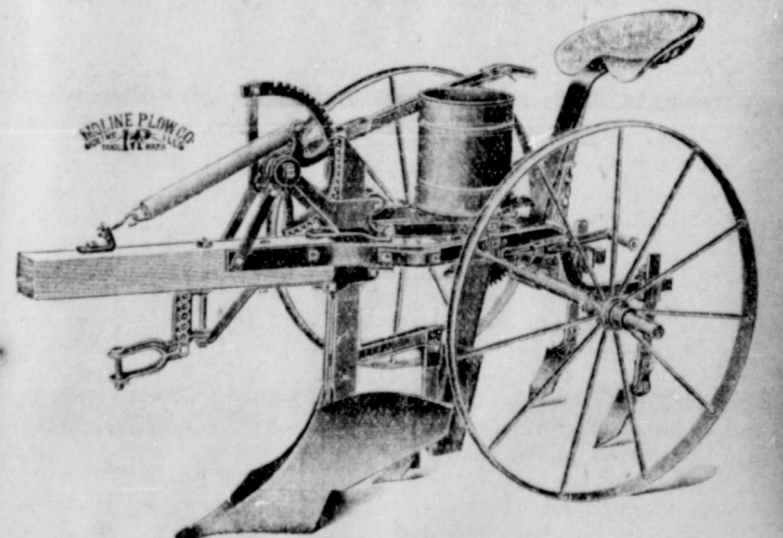
