CHANGE IN SCHEDULE

Two Trains a Day for Brady Announced by the Frisco—Arriving at 8:00 A. M. and 4:00 P. M.

From semi-official sources we learn that the new schedule for the Frisco trains has been completed and both trains out of Fort Worth will run into Brady, one arriving in the morning and the other in the afternoon. The change, it is said, will take place on the 25th inst.

According to the new schedule, train No. 5 will leave Fort Worth at 11:00 p. m., arriving at Brady at 8:00 a. m., and Menard at 10:00 a. m. Returning train No. 6 will leave Menard at 7:00 p. m., arriving at Brady at 9:00 p. m. and Fort Worth at 6:40 a. m., the same as at present.

Train No. 3 will leave Fort Worth at 8:00 a. m. arriving at Brady at 4:00 p. m. Returning train No. 4 will leave Brady at 9:00 a. m. reaching Fort Worth at 5:00 p. m.

stock raising business there and had prospered. He was unmarried. Besides his parents, three brothers, Albert, Jesse and Steve, all of Brady, and three sisters, Miss Alice, of Brady, Mrs. Holmesly, of Comanche, and Mrs. Draper, of Del Rio, survive him.

Mrs. Ballou, Miss Alice and Mrs. Holmesly, who have been in Del Rio attending the children of Mrs. Draper who have been quite sick, one with pneumonia and the other with spinal meningitis, returned to Brady upon learning the news. Mrs. Draper was unable to accompany them on account of her children still being seriously ill.

Boosting.

Since the City Council ordered an election to vote bonds for a water works system, two articles have been published, both seemingly against it, or rather they want to know what the city is going to do with the water after the dams are built and good rains have filled these lakes with water. Now if you will stop and think, the Brady Water & Light Company's greatest trouble has been to get the water, and that is the greatest problem the people of Brady have to solve, and when they solve that the water question will be settled.

When a man digs a well and strikes plenty of water he always manages to get the water. So will the city of Brady in this instance.

Now, according to the report of the expert, Mr. Hawley, we can add these dams as we need them, and his estimate as well as many others, I have heard, was that two dams at a cost of \$8,000.00 each would hold sufficient water to supply Brady with her present population, which would leave a balance of \$24,000.00 to distribute this water. Further than that, I believe the system would be self-supporting, besides adding more dams as the population increased.

Other towns have profited by such a method. Brownwood, for instance, with a similar water supply is making money with the system, and they always have plenty of water too.

Now some people might draw the conclusion that I am antagonistic to the Brady Water & Light Company, but I am not. What I want to see is Brady with the plenty of water, and I mean plenty for all purposes. Not just enough to take a bath occasionally and for kitchen use, but water to make some pretty lawns, yards, etc., and show Brady up in the column she belongs in. I have no property in Brady except my home, but I am not so selfish that I don't want to see people who have property reap the benefits they deserve, but the advancement of Brady will help every man in Brady, and a man doesn't have to own property to reap the benefits.

I helped all I could, (took money from my salary) to help bring the Santa Fe railroad here, which we can get and ought to have, but listen; we must have a water works system on a rock foundation, so when prospectors come among us they will not see distributed on our streets the notices, "Water at 6 p. m. and 7 a. m. only."

I do not want to see anyone injured, but I do want Brady to have plenty of water. This is a cold-blooded business proposition that should concern everybody in Brady. Here's for bonds and plenty of water in Brady.

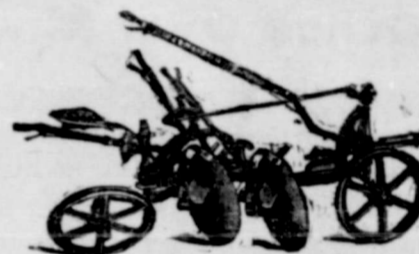
