TEXAS has 122,000 births annually, which is a birth every four minutes, according to the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association, which keeps close tab on the work of the stork in the state. This is a splendid record but even at this rate it will take the stork sixty-five years to double our population. The stork is a valuable bird but entirely too slow for empire building. We need people from other states and countries.

SOME boy or girl will receive \$1,000 in cash next fall for the best yields from four acres of corn and cotton, and the crop will sell at a big premium for seed. Letter from State Superintendent Conveys Approval of Application for Holding Summer Normal in Brady.

Brady usually gets what she goes after, and one of the most important things we have landed in some time is the first series of the Summer Normal. This matter has been in the hands of Supt. R. H. Long and Sec. D. R. Hardison, and to them belongs the credit, by reason of their untiring efforts, of securing this important institution.

The letter to Supt. Long is as follows:

The application for a Summer Normal to be held at Brady from June 5 to July 8, 1911 has been carefully examined and is hereby approved by the State Department of Education. You will permit me to suggest that special emphasis be given the subjects of primary methods and agriculture.
