COST OF ROAD BONDS

Commercial Secretary Hardison Gives Figures—Less Than \$2.00 on \$1,000 Assessed Valuation.

Last week a party of 13 McCulloch county citizens went over to Brownwood to look at her road system and make some inquiry as to the cost of grading etc. They report a time and seem to be well pleased that they went over, Secretary, D. F. Johnson met them with automobiles and saw them over the roads in good shape.

This office has been receiving quite a deal of literature from our national capitol on the road matter and the bond method of road construction. Also from College Station a number of folders and circulars. So it seems that our government is deeply interested in the good and welfare of its citizens. We learn from the literature that in every state and county where this method of road construction has been tried that it has been successful. This satisfaction has given rise to the people in adjoining districts creating more road bond districts and pushing the roads to greater lengths. If our bonds carry the same results will follow.

We stated in last week's article that we would give the approximate cost to the taxpayer on the thousand dollars valuation. The aggregate tax on the 1910 assessment without the railroad grades, beds etc. in the road district amounts to a little less than \$3,000,000. One of the school districts we could not get exactly, and putting it down to half the average valuation it would amount to the above figure. So therefore to create a sinking fund and pay the interest each year, it will be less than \$2. on \$1000 assessed valuation. For instance, a man pays tax on \$15,000 of property his annual road tax will be less than \$3. I mention the \$1500 basis, for I am told that is about the average assessment. This small amount that the taxpayer will be asked to pay will not be favorably compared to the tax or toll that our eastern farmers pay for similar roads. My own experience in Tennessee showed that we payed on average of at least \$15 per year.

Another matter, while we are paying five per cent interest, one of the banks in Brady is paying 6-14 cents for the county funds on daily balances. With that rate of interest at the end of ten years we can pay more than half the principal with the interest accumulated from year to year.

It is the purpose of the Commercial Club, with the consent and co-operation of the commissioners court to see that the money is judiciously spent. We can secure a government engineer at a nominal cost whose business will be to construct according to specifications. Then with no spirit of graft allowed, it seems that this is an opportune time to what McCulloch needs as much as anything in the world.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP

All But Thirty-Eight Cities Having Population of 100,000 at Beginning of 1907 Own Waterworks.

An exhaustive investigation into waterworks, gas works and electric light plants was made by the bureau of labor some time ago, and it was found that there were 1787 municipal water works in the United States as against 1539 private plants. But there were only fourteen municipal gas works as against 651 private. There were 460 municipal electric plants as against 1572 private. Municipal ownership is thus shown to apply much more frequently to water works than to other public utilities. Since the report of the bureau of labor much data has been collected by the government on cities. The trend of this, so far as municipal ownership is concerned, is to show that it is becoming more common, especially in the large cities. All but thirty-eight cities having 100,000 population owned their own water plants at the beginning of 1907.

At first blush, one might pronounce municipal ownership a modern development. As a matter of fact, the origin of it is lost in the mazes of history. Numerous cities of hoary antiquity owned their own aqueducts for furnishing the water supply. Ownership of lands, harbor improvements, docks and the like was not uncommon in ancient cities. One of the great pioneers in the matter of municipal ownership was Rome. Over 2200 years ago, that city built the Aqua Appia, named after Appius Claudius. It was a great aqueduct for furnishing water to the city from eleven miles distant.

Eventually, nine great aqueducts were in use. The city owned them and the water system of Rome was a marvelous institution, having a capacity of no less than 38,000,000 gallons a day. One of the aqueducts drew water from a point sixty-two miles remote and two of them are still in use, so perfect were they in construction. The water system of Rome was administered most carefully and it would tax many a modern city to improve on it. Augustus, who tackled many problems, did not omit the Roman water system and he improved its organization decidedly, putting the bureau in charge of a superintendent of water works, whom he called

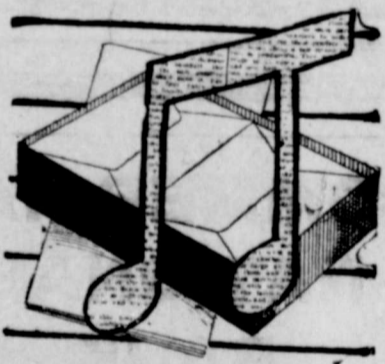

VALUE OF GOOD ROADS

Brady's Good Roads Movement Features in Special to Dallas News—Improved Highways Increase Valuations.

Frank A. Briggs, Staff Correspondent for the Dallas News, one of the brainiest writers in Texas, visited the Brownwood-Brady-Menard country at the time of the Menard celebration to gather data for a series of articles in the Dallas News featuring this country. The following is an excerpt of an article appearing in the News March 6th: "Until Feb. 25, 1911 Brady was prominent as the only railroad station in a territory covering nearly 3,000 square miles, drawing trade for many miles around. Even with the extension of the railroad, which will ultimately cut off a large slice of territory from the south, this progressive city has a trade territory ten times greater than a city of its size could handle if it were developed. Therefore, as railroads connect up new territory and create new towns, these cities, which have practically had a monopoly of a territory larger than Rhode Island, will of necessity develop the lands nearer home. Some twelve miles south of Brady is the new town of Whiteland. This is an admirably located town with a most excellent territory developed far more than could be expected under conditions which have existed. Going south along the Frisco one finds the new town of Callan, which will also bid for the trade of a large territory. Yet Brady can go half way and farther at present, to Whiteland and reach out many miles east and west.

"An important feature in connection with this development nearer home is the construction of good roads. Following the lead of Brownwood, Brady is talking bond issue and it is believed that the citizens will vote \$75,000 in good roads bonds in the near future. This is not a county project, but a precinct project. It is planned to build good roads in all directions from Brady, thus developing the country and attracting new settlers. Judging from the experience of other cities, no better way to make Brady grow could be devised.

"Road conditions around Brownwood and Brady are similar, except Brownwood has built nearly 100 miles of good roads and Brady has none. Material is close at hand. The hills are full of it and the cost of road building is cut to a minimum. Brownwood has issued \$150,000 in good road bonds. About 100 miles will have been constructed when contracts are completed. The roads cost them \$1,500 per mile, the first work costing \$1,000 per mile it taking \$500 per mile to round them into shape. With a portion of the roads around Brady at a fair grade the \$75,000 to be derived from the bonds will construct between sixty and seventy miles of road equally as good as the Brownwood roads. This will be a good start towards gridironing McCulloch County with paved highways and bringing many thousands of settlers to develop the idle lands, which will increase the valuations more than enough to pay for the roads.

"At Brownwood the writer was told the people were so well satisfied with their good roads that other precincts were preparing to issue good road bonds and that before many years the entire county would be supplied. Although the roads have been constructed but a few months, their effects on valuation, due to the demand for lands adjacent, has proved the wisdom of the bond issues. Brownwood has also felt the impulse of prosperity due to good roads and is becoming a better city every day."

A SERIOUS PROBLEM.

At this time our city faces a crisis. No place needs the solution of the water problem more than Brady. If the water bonds fail to carry, we are lost—it is the only practical solution of the water question that has been offered—it is the last resort. Can we vote the issue down? Can we afford to let our property values drop toward zero, our fire insurance rates jump skyward out of reach of the man with the small purse? Can we afford to vote down an issue that means an abundance of pure water—a thing as essential as pure air? We are practically out of water—out of good water now!

All eyes in Texas are upon us, and we must not fail. Grand old McCulloch has always been a leader in the progress of the state, and Bully Brady has been in the van always among the cities of McCulloch. With present conditions as critical as they are, surely no one can be against the interests of the city, of his neighbors, of his own family.

We hear objection, but no

as he pleases, but he should be broader than his own private interests. If you have a good well or a good cistern on your place, it is no reason why you should vote a hardship upon your poorer neighbor. Good water supply will add to the value of your property. It will bring new industries here; it will bring new settlers—in other words it will make the town a city.

We urge you against indifference or neglect. Talk the bonds to your neighbors, and above all VOTE FOR THE BONDS.

McCULLOCH COUNTY TODAY

McCulloch county is in Central Texas, although popularly known as "West Texas." Recent surveys have established the geographical center of Texas in McCulloch county, near the town of Waldrip.

The county is bounded on the north by the Colorado river; on the west by Concho and Menard counties; on the south by Mason county and on the east by San Saba county. The San Saba river, one of the finest running streams in the State, runs across the southeast corner of the county, while Brady Creek, a watercourse of great importance, splits the county through the center from west to east. The population of the county is 14,405.

SOILS

There are three types of soil—black waxy, chocolate loam, and a rich sandy loam—all very productive. South of the San Saba river the soil is mostly sandy loam, and there is no better land anywhere for fruits and vegetables, cotton, corn or other field crops. The central and northern portions of the county have the rich black waxy and the chocolate loam soils—a world beater for COTTON. All other crops, including Milo Maize, Kaffir Corn, Indian Corn, Wheat, Oats, Millet, Etc., are raised in plenty, but COTTON is the crop in this section, and this land will match up against any land in the world for the production of the fleecy staple.

COTTON

The Brady Country is a world beater for cotton. The crop is freer here from boll weevil and other pests than in the older sections of the State. Cotton is notoriously a "hard labor" crop, but it is a fact that one man can cultivate two or three times the number of acres here that he can "back east," and a cotton crop is made here with less expense and greater yield than there. Brady affords one of the best markets in the State for the staple, as high as 50,000 bales having been bought on the streets of Brady from wagons in one season. Two oil mills, four gins and a compress aid in establishing Brady as a splendid cotton center.

OTHER CROPS

Other crops besides cotton are raised. Corn, especially in the valleys and in the sandy soil, produces abundantly. Milo maize and kaffir corn are grown everywhere. Oats, wheat, millet, sorghum, Johnson grass, alfalfa—in short, all the staple field crops yield well and are universally grown. On the rich, sandy soils in the south part of the county are raised every kind of fruit and vegetable. Here is the natural home of the watermelon, cantaloupe, onions, beans, peas, beets, potatoes, both sweet and Irish, and fruits of all kinds. Here also is the artesian belt of the county, and within the past two years some half a dozen fine flowing artesian wells have been brought in at very shallow depths. This water is being used for irrigating garden truck and alfalfa, and splendid results are being attained. The truck industry is growing to large proportions in the Voca and Camp San Saba country, and it will only be a few years until that section will be shipping such products by the carload.

FRUIT

The hills and slopes of McCulloch county are especially adapted to fruit growing, and the list of fruits is long, the principal items being peaches, pears, apricots, apples, plums and grapes. Some very fine orchards are to be seen all over the county. J. H. Huey, one mile from Brady, has as fine a peach orchard as

can be found in Texas. R. B. McCarty, of Mercury, has an immense apple orchard which yields him a handsome profit each year. Mr. McCarty is now installing a canning plant on his farm to take care of his surplus fruit. He had the finest apples at the Texas State Fair at Dallas last fall, and was only prevented from taking first prize by reason of the fact that the entry was not accompanied by the necessary affidavit.

ALFALFA

Alfalfa is a coming crop in this county. Already it has proven a success, and just as soon as the farmers get thoroughly acquainted with the crop and give it the proper attention alfalfa will begin to show up among the staple crops of the county. Three years ago Louis Brook planted an experimental patch of alfalfa on his farm near Camp San Saba. There were eight acres and it was planted in March and was cut twice that first year. The following year he brought in a large artesian well and irrigated the field. The result was five cuttings, averaging a ton to the acre for the first three cuttings, and half a ton to the acre for the last two. Needless to say he has increased his acreage since that time. He has the largest artesian well in the county.

LAND PAYS ITSELF OUT

It is a well known fact that those who have bought farm lands in McCulloch county have paid for it in a few years—sometimes in one year—with the crops raised thereon. Many of our farmers who came here seven or eight years ago are now independently wealthy. They have not only made money from their crops, but they have profited by the increase in land values.

J. P. Baze, who owns a valuable farm twelve miles south of Brady in the artesian belt, is one of those farmers who specialize in vegetables, melons, etc. His sandy land has produced watermelons weighing as much as 100 pounds, and cabbage heads which have tipped the scales at twenty pounds. Mr. Baze is from one of the best fruit and truck counties in Missouri. He says the farmer can come nearer raising everything in McCulloch county than anywhere else he knows of. One of his pecan trees produced \$13 worth of nuts last season.

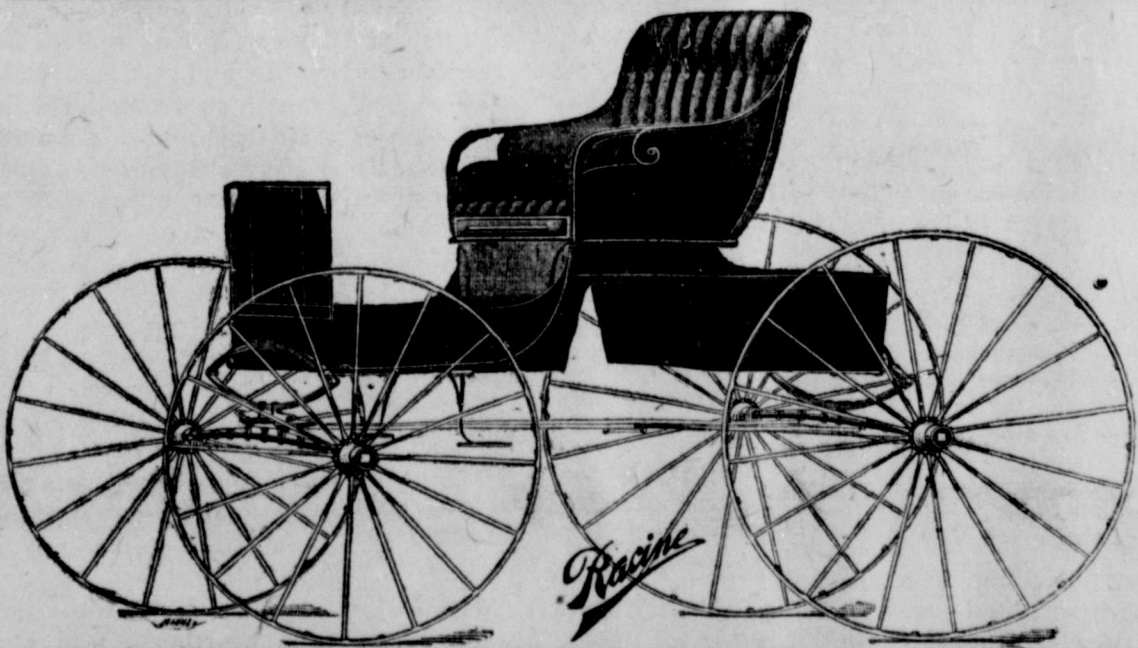

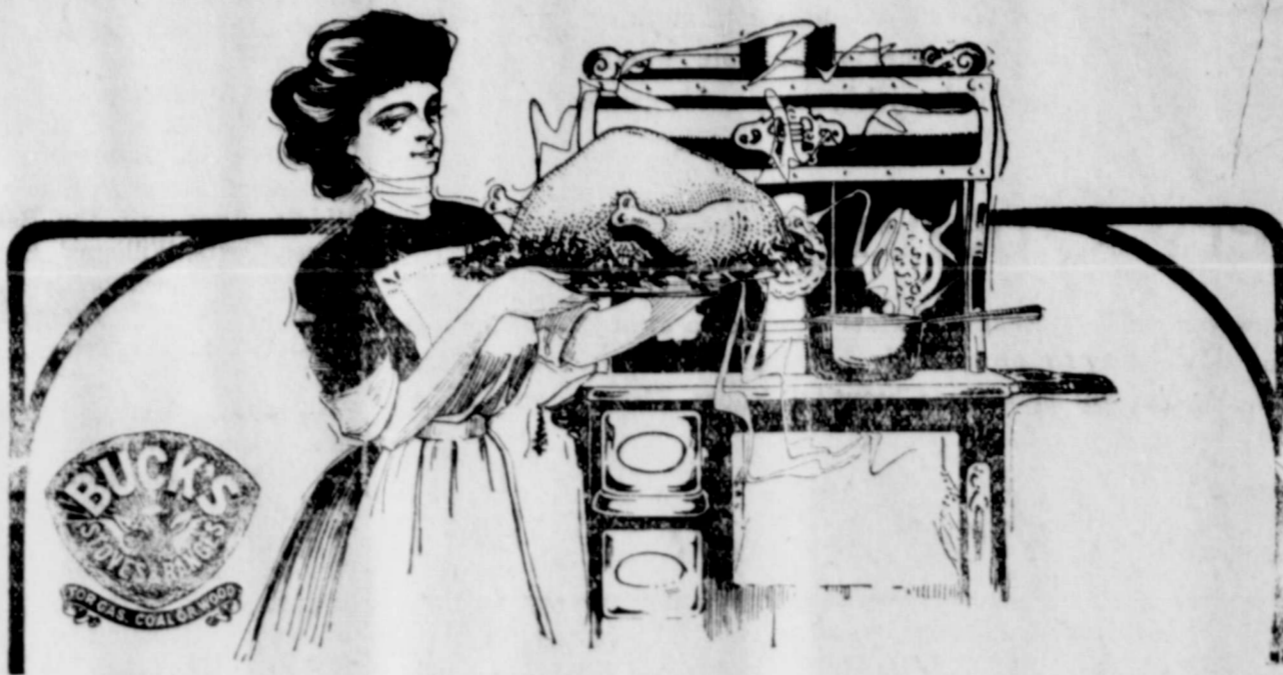
