PRIZES TO CHILDREN

Supt. Long Inaugurates Unique Plan to Interest School Children in Raising Flowers, Poultry, Pigs, etc.

In order to encourage thrift and energy and to stimulate diversification and industry and to bring the school activities into closer touch with the realities of practical life, those pupils in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades, whose parents interpose no objections, will be given a chance at diversification in connection with school work. The scheme will embrace poultry, vegetables, pigs, flowers, fancy stitching and cooking.

Each one will be required to keep an accurate note of the attention given to these different lines, so as to encourage systematic work and to be in condition for those who fail to be benefited by the instructions of those who succeed. It is the intention to have something like an exhibit, sometime during the latter part of May or the first of June, at which specimens of cooking and fancy stitch work will be exhibited in connection with the flowers, vegetables, poultry and pigs.

Disinterested parties will be appointed to judge the exhibit and award first, second and third prizes.

Those who have to do with pigs, will weigh them accurately when they are put in the pen, measure or weigh the feed, make a note in their book when and how much its feed is reduced or increased. The age and breed of the pig will also be written down in the book.

Those who have poultry, will make a note as to how the nest is prepared, observe when and how long the hen feeds; keep a sharp lookout for insects and make a note of the method adopted in eradicating them if they occur; make a note as to when the first chirp of the chick is heard; when the first chick is out and when the last one, how many chicks; the care taken of them; how fed and with what and how often; their ailments and remedies.

Memoranda will be made in connection with the flowers and vegetables.

From all this data, problems in fractions, percentage and general combination of numbers will be evolved in the class room to supplement the text book.

The girls—and I am very glad that there are some boys who have registered for cooking and fancy stitch work—will have ample time to learn how and prepare excellent specimens for exhibition in cooking and fancy stitch work. This may embrace doilies, center pieces, sofa pillows, collars, cuffs, handkerchiefs, laces, embroideries, darning, etc; biscuits, loaf-bread, pies, cakes, dough nuts, candies, etc.

I am expecting some valuable results from this trial and hope that no one will discourage the pupils in the matter.

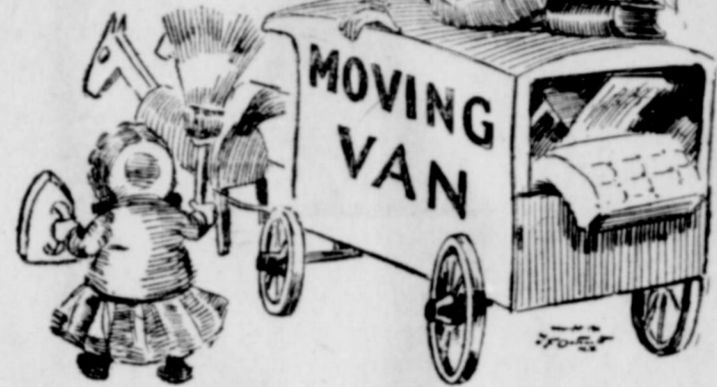

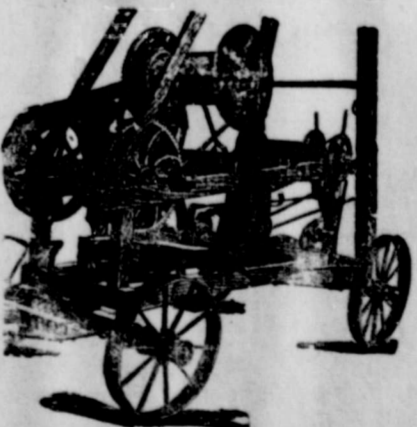

Commercial Corner

Saturday we cast our ballots for a forward or backward move. We are where the roads turn. Let us do what we know is best for all. Remember, that everything that is of any benefit at this time has a commercial value. The road and water bonds will cost something. But that cost is rightfully and justly distributed so that no one will be burdened. Not only will all property owners be directly and indirectly benefitted by a just expenditure of these funds, but there will also be a vast deal of pleasure in the thought that there is plenty of water and that we have good roads. We know approximately what the whole thing will cost to each man. As property increases in value the annual tax will grow less. Can you afford for the small amount you will be called on to pay vote against the interests of your home and your city and your farmers' interests?

Without the bond issue our values will go down and insurance go up. With the present conditions we cannot induce factories to locate here. It has been said that railroads leaving Brady would injure the city. We must put some other industry here to take the place of all that we lose. That will cost us the small amount of tax we are called upon to pay. Some have asked me about the width of the road beds. The roads will be graded or bedded the limit of the road, but the sand or broken stone will not be over 16 ft. We have not sufficient funds to make roads as wide as the present public roads. Still, a road 16 ft. wide will allow wagons, etc., to pass on the macadam bed without running off. If the bonds carry, it is the intention to get a road expert to manage the grading, etc., and grade the roads to the district limits first. This will allow the roads to settle before the sand or broken stone is placed.

Let us vote for the interest of ourselves, our children and our neighbors.

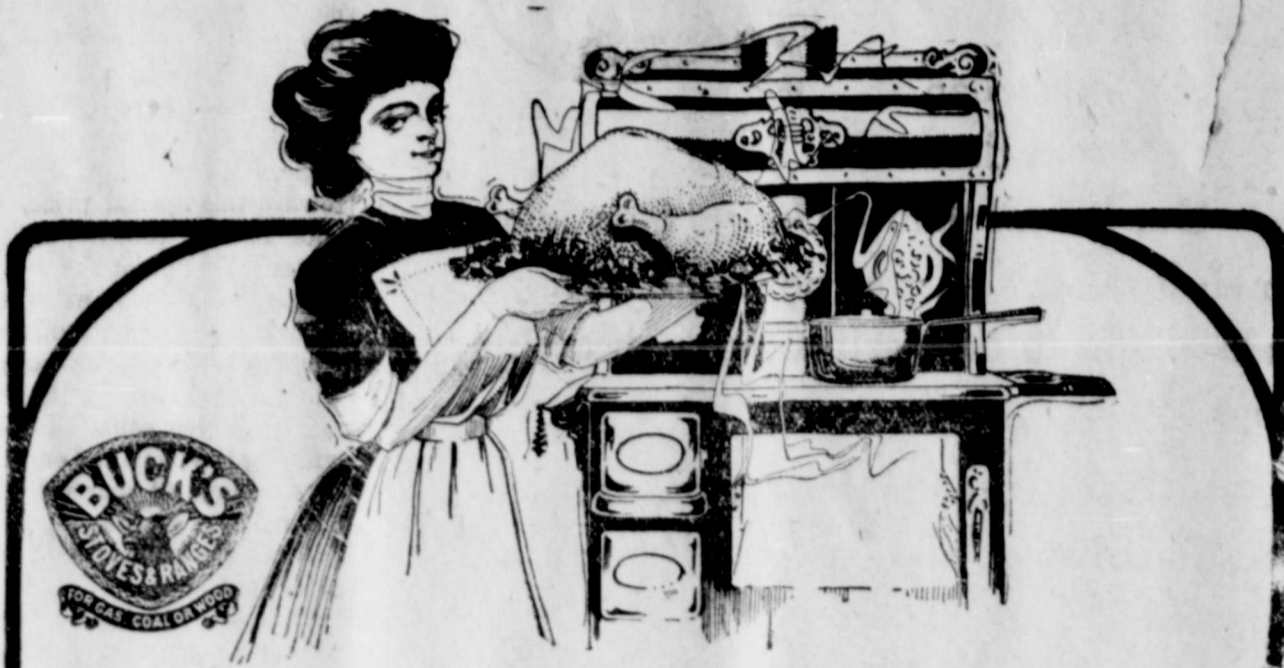
