## TWO DAYS' PROGRAM

Fair Association Directors Met Saturday and Arranged Purses for the Spring Race Meet.

The Fair Association directors met last Saturday to receive the reports of the program committee and the finance committee, and to arrange the purses for the races. The splendid encouragement given the finance committee on every hand, and the interest taken in the holding of the meet encouraged the directors to put out an elaborate program, with purses amounting to close to \$1000.

The usual rules governing the meet were adopted, viz: Entrance fee ten per cent of purse; money divided 60, 30 and 10 per cent; five to enter and three to start; all harness races best two in three heats.

### J. A. Snider.

The death of J. A. Snider occurred last Saturday morning at 7:30 o'clock. The deceased had been sick for about a week previously with an attack of slow fever, but his condition was not thought to be serious, and the news of his death came unexpectedly to his many friends. Heart failure was the immediate cause of his demise.

Mr. Snider was 49 years of age, and had been in McCulloch county for the past twenty years, coming here with his family from Collin county, where his father was one of the early pioneers, and where many of his immediate relatives, as well as those of his widow, still live.

For the past year Mr. Snider had been engaged in the grain and feed business in Brady, being associated with O. S. Macy & Co. Previous to this he had been engaged in the dairy business.

Mr. Snider was a man of sunny and jovial disposition, making friends with everyone, and possessing that further rare attribute of holding his friends. He was one of our most substantial business men, a man of strictest integrity, and his death removes from our midst a useful and respected citizen.

The funeral took place last Sunday at 12:30 o'clock, Rev. T. P. Grant conducting services. Interment was made in Brady cemetery.

Three of his brothers, A. H. Snider, of McKinney, C. P. and Cordie Snider, of Lucas, attended the funeral services, besides whom deceased is survived by widow and seven children, four girls and three boys, the oldest of the boys, Clarence, being employed with the Brady National bank; also another brother, Rev. J. B. Snider, of McKinney, and two sisters, Mrs. J. D. Morrow and Mrs. W. A. Kerby, of Lucas.

You are hereby commanded to summon J. O. Hinsley by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 35th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 35th Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the Justice's Court of Precinct No. 5, McCulloch County, to be held at the office of W. P. Burleson, Justice of the Peace, in the town of Mercury in said Precinct No. 5, on the 4th Monday in April A. D. 1911, the same being the 24th day of April A. D. 1911, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 24th day of March A. D. 1911, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 62, wherein R. W. Scoggin is Plaintiff, and J. O. Hinsley and J. M. Egger are Defendants, and said petition alleging that on March 9, 1909, the defendant J. O. Hinsley executed to the plaintiff his promissory note in writing for the sum of \$93.15, due October 1st, 1909, payable at Mercury, Texas, to the order of R. W. Scoggin & Co., with ten per cent interest from date until paid and ten per cent attorney's fees if not paid at maturity and placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, signed by defendant J. O. Hinsley; that to secure the payment of said note said defendant Hinsley, executed and delivered to plaintiff, his chattel mortgage lien in writing, of even date with the execution of said note, on one double side spring buggy, one black cow about nine years old branded 31 on left side; one red two year old heifer unbranded, also increase of said cattle; one mouse colored mare mule five years old and branded 32 on left thigh, about 14 1/2 hands high; also the third bale of cotton raised by said defendant during the year 1909. That at the date of said note and mortgage plaintiff was doing business in the name of R. W. Scoggin & Co., but plaintiff was the sole owner of said business and plaintiff is the sole owner of said note and mortgage lien, aforesaid. That the defendant J. M. Egger has secured possession of said mortgaged property above described and is asserting some character of claim thereto. Said note credited with a payment of \$34.00 paid on December 14, 1909. Plaintiff sues for his debt as provided for in said note, principal, interest and attorney's fees, for foreclosure of said mortgage on all of said property, and order of sale, for all costs of suit, and for general and special relief, in law and equity.

## Commercial Corner

In this article I wish to say something about the Commercial organizations of Texas, and incidentally refer to their use in all the industrial enterprises that concern us. We will take the liberty to quote from the Special News Service a few of the things the clubs are doing.

"The Texas Commercial Secretaries Association besides being a most useful organization to the state at large, is also helpful to the individual clubs and chambers of commerce throughout the state. The organization provides the clubs of the state with a list of names of persons desiring to locate and to make investments in Texas, and is of material benefit to local clubs in advertising their towns and sections."

The commercial secretaries have prepared and issued in pamphlet form a treatise on State Taxation, giving a complete analysis of the operation of our present tax system and giving it in such shape that it is easily comprehended by the average citizen.

The association has under consideration a novel plan of advertising Texas throughout the North and East by moving picture shows. The plan as outlined, contemplates that the charts used by the association in its lecture course on Industrial Texas, will be thrown on the canvas of the moving picture circuit to tell of the marvelous advantages of our state. This will be experimental, of course, but the Picture syndicate has made us a flattering proposition, thus demonstrating their faith in the results.

The secretary at all places stands ready to help the farmer in any way, aiding him to procure the best seed, holding agricultural and live stock exhibits, farmers' institutes, boys' corn clubs, etc. The secretaries have asked both State and Federal aid by way of appropriations for farm demonstration work, experimental farms, and other material assistance.

These are some of the few things for which the commercial secretary stands. In fact, the existence of a well organized club in any city is synonymous of aggressiveness and the ultimate prosperity of that section.

## TRICKHAM OIL FIELD

Developments Are No Longer Experimental. Oil Bearing Sands Struck at Depth of 985 Feet.

Santa Anna, Texas, April 21.—Yesterday afternoon oil sand was struck in the well of the Trickham Oil & Gas Company near Trickham, at a depth of 985. This well is located about 1200 feet southeast of the well of the Santa Anna Industrial Co., which was producing oil about a year ago. The oil is of the same splendid quality as that found in the Santa Anna Industrial well. The drill in the new well was stopped as soon as it was ascertained that the sand had been struck; but it is the intention of the company to drill into the sand as soon as the necessary casing arrives to take care of the well. Tanks are being placed at the well today. The well is down with an eight inch hole to the sand and is in splendid shape to be taken care of to the best advantage. Fred W. Turner of this place is the organizer and president of the Trickham Oil & Gas Company, and feels certain that they have struck a very fine well and is also well pleased with the condition of the new well. Mr. Turner has been at the well all this week watching developments and expecting the sands to be reached between nine and ten hundred feet. He has spent a great deal of time, thought and money on this field and now feels certain that both the wells in the field can be made producers and that there will be more wells drilled in this field in the near future. The splendid quality of the oil and its nearness to two railroads ought to start work that will develop this field quickly.

The drilling time on the new well has been about thirty days and the formation is ideal for drilling. Mr. Turner states that these two wells will give a line on the field and that it will be no trouble to locate producing wells now, in the field.—Brownwood Bulletin.

## SWINDLER CAPTURED

Cashes Many Worthless Check While Impersonating J. L. Smith of Walker-Smith Co.—Smith to New York.

Washington, April 19.—James L. Smith, president of the National Bank of Commerce of Amarillo, was in Washington today en route to New York where he will appear in the prosecution against a swindler who has been impersonating him in New York and forging his name to checks aggregating several thousand dollars.

The scheme worked by the swindler was to call at the wholesale houses and manufacturers with whom Mr. Smith, as a member of the Walker-Smith company, with stores at Brownwood, San Angelo, Dublin, Brady, Abilene and Sweetwater, has extensive dealings and personal acquaintances. Having given a large order, the man would explain that he was a little short of money and he would appreciate the cashing of a check for a small amount. There was only one instance in which there was trouble about getting the money and that was where the manager was temporarily absent and the secretary had no acquaintance with Mr. Smith. For two weeks the impostor worked the New York houses, carrying his operations on from wholesale grocers and manufacturers to the wholesale notion and ribbon dealers, though the Walker-Smith stores do not handle dry goods.

The first intimation of the fraud reached Texas through the New York office of a baking powder firm which has Texas offices in Waco. The manager in New York wrote asking the Texas manager to take up with the Walker-Smith offices in Brownwood the matter of Mr. Smith being denied money on his personal check, explaining that the manager himself had been absent from New York at the time Mr. Smith called and the secretary had no acquaintance with Mr. Smith, hence the refusal of the money. Within a few days thereafter large shipments of goods began to arrive at the several Walker-Smith stores. Telegrams were exchanged and the swindle was uncovered.

The swindler has just been arrested in Battle Creek, Mich., and Mr. Smith has come East in response to a telegram, though when seen today he had no information concerning the identity of the man, nor where he hails from.

The swindler, it is believed, bears a strong personal resemblance to Mr. Smith, else he would not have been able to carry out his rather clumsy imposture. He had cards printed reading "J. G. Smith," whereas Mr. Smith's initials are "J. L." and he had the firm name read Smith & Walker, the correct form being Walker-Smith Company.
