Col. F. S. White, Commissioner of Agriculture and Horticulture for the Frisco, will be here tomorrow with his car, and it is hoped that every farmer and citizen who can possibly do so will attend his lectures at the courthouse both in the afternoon at 1:30 and at night at 7:30, and also visit the car and inspect the seeds and plants demonstrated there.

DEDICATION OF CHURCH

Impressive Services Sunday Mark Dedication of the West Sweden M. E. Church—Large Attendance

A large delegation of Brady citizens attended the dedication of the West Sweden church last Sunday, and speak in highest praise of the services and of their reception and entertainment by the people of the community.

The membership has just completed the interior decoration and furnishing of the building, and have one of the prettiest and neatest places of worship to be found anywhere, a church that would be a credit to any city. The dedication Sunday marked the occasion in a most fitting manner. There was a large attendance of visiting pastors, and throughout the day splendid addresses were had. Rev. T. J. King preached the dedication sermon in the afternoon at 3:00 o'clock.

A collection was taken to raise the debt on the church, and met with a hearty and liberal response, nearly twice the sum asked for being subscribed. About \$670 was raised Sunday and this amount was supplemented Monday by additional subscriptions, bringing the total up to \$720, not only wiping out the original debt but leaving a handsome balance on hand. This sum will be expended in painting the exterior of the church and other improvements, any balance remaining going toward a fund to build a school house.

The visitors were entertained in a most lavish manner, the dinner being especially noteworthy, and one that will long be spoken of by all who participated.

Cider Analyzed.

Samples of cider secured from local dealers and sent to Brownwood for analysis are reported by the chemist as containing a larger per cent of alcohol than the strongest beer upon the market, one of the samples testing out 4 1-2 per cent, and the other 8 per cent per volume.

Act 411 of the Penal Code, Acts of 1909, reads as follows: Intoxicating liquors defined: liberal construction.—The term "intoxicating liquor" shall be construed to mean fermented, vinous or spirituous liquors of any composition of which fermented, vinous or spirituous liquors is a part; and all of the provisions of Act of 1909, p. 293, shall be liberally construed as remedial in character.

Inasmuch as the analysis shows that the sale of this cider is direct violation of the local option law, the local officers have sent out warnings to the dealers to cease the sale of these goods, and are preparing to vigorously prosecute all who fail to comply.

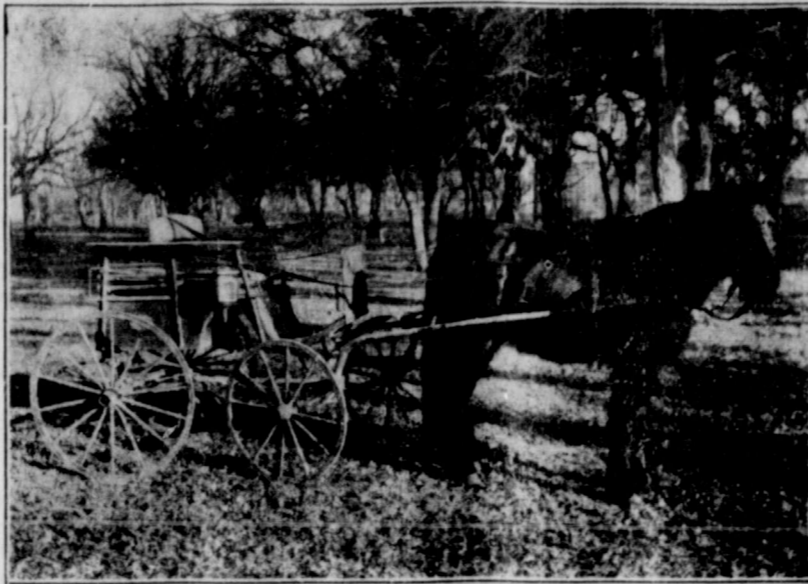
