RULES AGAINST BONDS

Attorney General's Department States
25c Tax Insufficient for Issuance of
Full Amount of Water Bonds.

W. D. Crothers, who has had the matter of presenting the water bond issue to the Attorney General's department in hand, is in receipt of a letter stating that the bonds had failed to be approved because of the fact that the amount of money that can be raised by a tax of 25c on the \$100.00 valuation is insufficient to cover the interest and sinking fund upon the bonds which have been previously issued and also the interest and sinking fund upon the water bond issue.

We quote the letter to Mr. Crothers:

Austin, May 8, 1911.

Mr. W. D. Crothers,
Brady, Texas.

Dear Sir:

We are unable to approve the above record for the following reason:

It appears from this record that it will require \$2,471 for the purpose of paying interest and sinking fund upon bonds heretofore issued against the 25 cent taxing power covering the power you seek to exercise in the issuance of the proposed bonds. It will take \$3,000 to carry your proposed bonds which gives a total of \$5,471.00. Your full taxing power for these purposes is \$3,386.59, which results in your not having authority or power to issue the full amount of these bonds. In other words, you are limited in the amount of bonds that you can issue to such an amount including the outstanding bonds chargeable against this twenty-five cents tax as may be provided for in interest and sinking fund with the amount of money that can be raised at the rate of twenty-five cents tax on the \$100 valuation of property in your city as determined by the last approved assessed valuation.

I hand you this record.

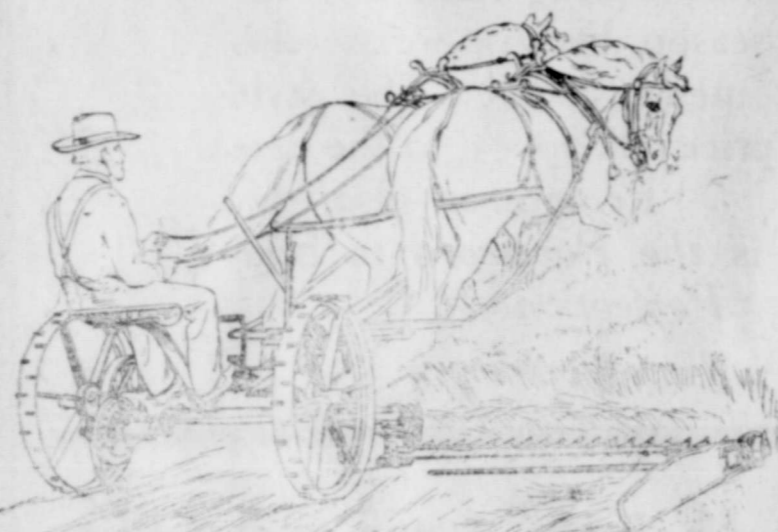

The Frisco Agricultural and Horticultural car was worth more to see than any sort of show. Farmers, business men of all classes, and boys and girls enjoyed the exhibit by Mr. White. Heard Mr. Ganzer both made fine addresses to a large crowd composed of school children and all kinds of business men at the court house last Wednesday.

Messrs. White and Ganzer both visited the experimental farm while here and expressed themselves in very favorable terms as to crops already up, and as to the seed beds for the coming vegetables and farm products.

The large number of new seeds that are being planted in Texas this season is an interesting study to all agriculturists and horticulturists. We predict that we are upon the avenue of wonderful changes and evolutions in the way of farm products. The old stereotyped routine of corn, maize and cotton from year to year will be broken up. In addition to the old staple products, there are other good things for the farmers.

THE COLONEL PLACES THE BLAME.

Colonel Roosevelt has published an article in the Outlook in which he condemns the parties charged with dynamiting the Times building in San Francisco. The publication of this article is very much like the Colonel. It is Roosevelt repeating himself. It will be remembered that at the time of the arrest of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, the Colonel made his ill-advised reference to them as "undesirables," and after a trial by a court, where there was admitted prejudice, and by a hostile judge, these men were acquitted by a jury after hearing the evidence against them. Such expressions before trial are a direct effort to prejudice the public and to deprive the defendants of the full right of a fair and impartial trial, by attempting to remove the presumption of innocence which rightfully goes with the defendant from his arrest until he is found guilty after a fair and impartial trial.

The very fact that the accused men were kidnapped and spirited away without the privilege of conferring with attorneys, is in itself enough to impress the public with a fixed belief that the accused were undeniably guilty of the crime which, when followed by the making public of a multiplicity of indictments found by a sworn grand jury, adds weight enough to offset the legal presumption of innocence, without condemnation through the press by such men as Col. Roosevelt. All men are equal under the law, and the men charged with this crime are entitled to every consideration and as strong presumption of innocence as would be Col. Roosevelt himself if the charge rested against him. Yet who will say that the same treatment would have been accorded this man who, like the officers of the law in France, attempts to establish the guilt of the accused before he is arraigned for trial.

Col. Roosevelt favors the recall of judges in California, and doubtless would recall any judge before whom these men were tried, unless a verdict of guilty was rendered, because he has a fixed opinion which evidence would not remove.

We occasionally hear people say that some enterprise or other would be a good thing for Brady but that it is out of our reach. Such argument is the best asset of the knocker, as it masks his face with apparent sincerity and rumors the odium of the open knocker. Brady can secure every kind of enterprise or institution really needed, and such things as are too large to be secured are too large to be handled if secured.

NEWS NOTES OF TEXAS

Compiled by Texas Commercial Secretaries Association

San Patricio County is preparing to spend \$100,000 in the next few months in road improvements. The County Commissioners in that county are considering a proposition to macadamize the highways with mud shells.

The election for a bond issue of \$100,000 in Austin county was carried by a large majority and construction of good roads in that county will begin at once.

Ellis County will spend \$550,000 in building and improving the county roads. One hundred miles of good roads have already been built in this county.

Upshur County has purchased mules, scrapers, plows and graders to put in execution a good roads movement in that county.

The citizens of San Angelo are considering the construction of a re-inforced concrete bridge across the Concho river at an expense of \$40,000.

Longview has voted bonds to the amount of \$90,000 for street improvements.

The City Council of Greenville has let the contract for twenty miles of concrete walks in that city.

The gobble of the Texas turkey echoes in every market of the world. During the last season there were approximately 1600 car loads shipped from Texas to the markets of the country, while ten years ago less than 250 car loads went out from the state.

A good road is worth maintaining. It costs little to maintain but a great deal to rebuild. There is little use building new roads unless they are kept in good condition.

To make the surface of a road waterproof costs more, but saves in benefit to the user, as well as in the less cost of maintaining.

The farmers of McCulloch County are taking an active interest in the farm demonstration work and one hundred and forty-five farmers are doing special work this year in that county. There is an experimental farm near Brady, the land for which was donated by the president of the Brady Commercial Club, for the purpose of encouraging better agricultural production. This farm is being operated with success and is doing much to stimulate the agricultural industry in that section. Texas needs more experimental and demonstration farms and commercial clubs should encourage the establishment of these farms in their communities.

The present forest area of Texas is 30,000,000 acres and we cut 2,099,000,000 feet during 1910. Texas lumber is found all over the world.

Governor Colquitt has announced his intention of encouraging Boys Corn Clubs by giving rewards of merit to boys who raise 75 bushels to 125 bushels of corn per acre. It is certainly commendable of the Governor to encourage agriculture, and if the legislature would follow his example and raise more corn and less sand, Texas will soon come into her own.

There is no use spending money for a road surface if the sub-base is not well drained. A road surface can be destroyed from beneath just as easily as from above.

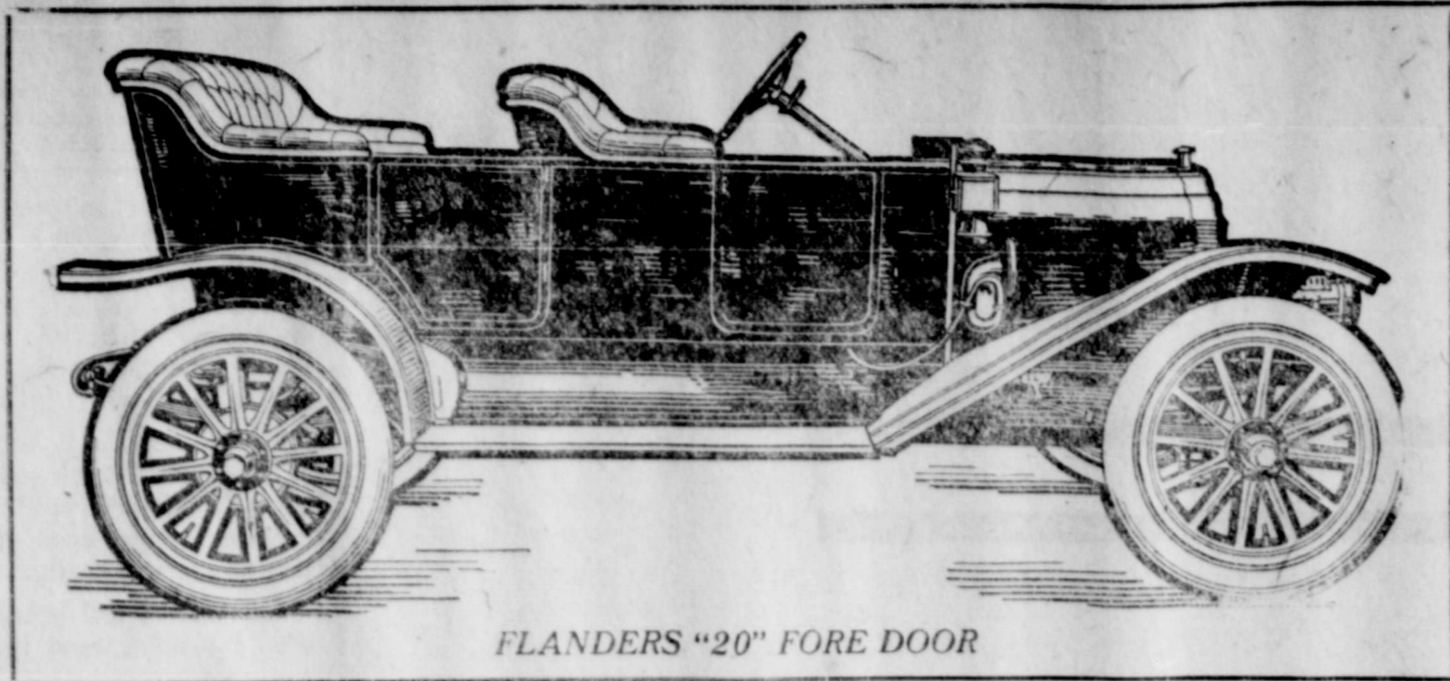

Uncovers Spanish Mining Camp.

L. D. Morris, of the East Gansel community, about 30 miles northwest of Brady, made The Standard a pleasant call Wednesday and gave us some interesting particulars concerning a discovery made by him on his farm recently.

Mr. Morris is an old timer in this section of Texas, and has long been assured of the presence of buried treasure somewhere in the Brady Country. He obtained his first information concerning same from an old treasure hunter in Menard county in 1878, and since that time has had his eye open at all times for discoveries.

Several months ago by the aid

of a "switch and quarter" he located a spot on his farm which indicated to him that something of interest and possibly of value lay buried there. He proceeded to dig and had not gone more than eighteen inches when he discovered a rock wall. Further digging disclosed an underground chamber, which on being still further investigated proved to be of considerable proportions.

To date Mr. Morris has uncovered a room 14x35 feet and 8 feet deep, built with a solid rock wall, laid well with lime mortar. This chamber is apparently ten feet longer yet. An ell about 14x15 has also been uncovered on the north, and a side room on the south is about 10x20 feet. One

hundred feet to the south another room 10 1-2 feet in width has been uncovered.

All the rooms were substantially constructed with well laid rock floors and smooth finished walls. They had been filled up with rock and dirt and covered over with soil to a depth of 18 inches.

Mr. Morris is convinced that he has discovered an old Spanish mining camp which must have been abandoned and hidden in the 17th century. He feels sure that buried treasure will eventually be discovered, and will continue the search as time and opportunity permits.

Vote for the issuance of \$8700 bonds to run 40 years, in Melvin Common School District No. 18 was canvassed and declared as 39 for and 9 against. The court accordingly ordered the bonds issued and tax levied sufficient to pay the interest and create a sinking fund to pay the bonds.

Willie Priest was appointed constable in Justice Precinct No. 8, and P. A. Rainbolt constable in Justice Precinct No. 4, both filling vacancies.

Bonds of C. R. Bailey, as Justice of the Peace, and J. E. McDonald, as constable Precinct 3, were approved.

Report of S. H. Mayo, County Tax Collector, for March and April examined and approved.

Quarterly reports of N. G. Lyle, J. P., Precinct No. 1, together with treasurer's receipt for fines collected, was examined and approved, as were also similar reports of J. J. Armor, Prec. 2; S. A. Newton, Prec. 4; and W. F. Burleson, Prec. No. 5.

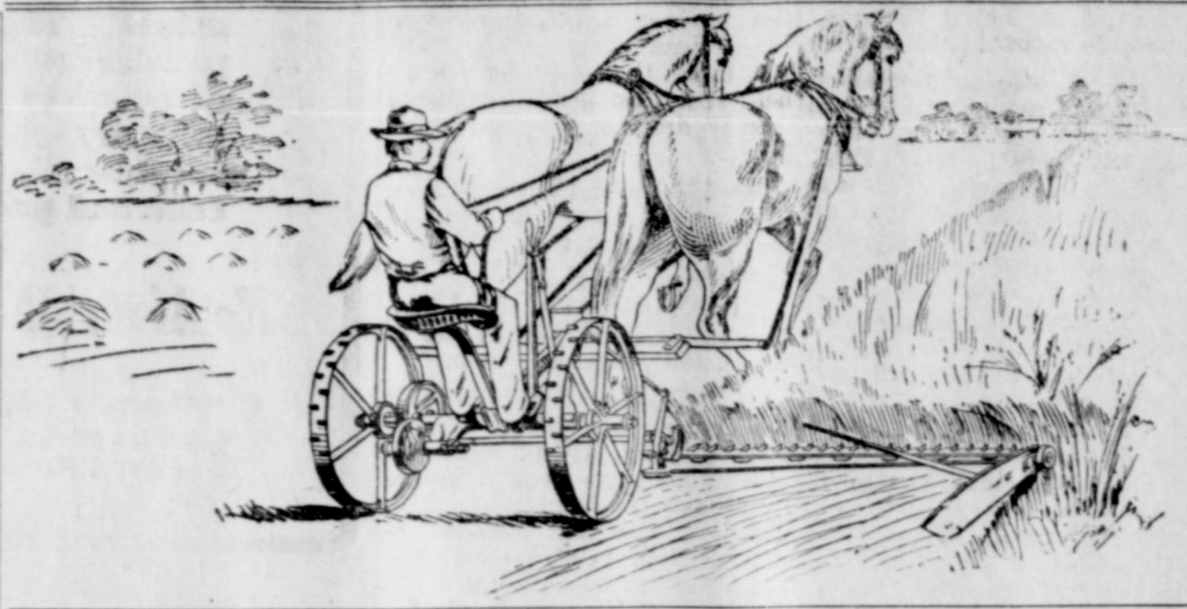
