## WATER BONDS UP AGAIN

City Council Sends Judge Newman to Austin to Interview Attorney-General. Claims Issue Legal.

The City Council met in called session Wednesday afternoon to consider the water bond issue, and it was decided to send Judge Newman to Austin to again present the issue to the Attorney-General's department and see if they could not get the issue approved.

It is the contention of Judge Newman that the issue is legal and cannot be turned down for the reasons advanced by the Attorney-General's department, viz: that the tax rate is insufficient to cover the interest and sinking funds of both the water bonds and the street improvement bonds. The Judge contends that while a 25c tax on the \$100 valuation was all that could be levied up to 1909, the legislature in that year divided the tax rate into two separate funds, one of 15c on the \$100 valuation for street improvement, and one of 25c on the \$100 valuation for water and light and general purposes.

A tax of 20c on the \$100 valuation is at present being levied to cover the interest and sinking fund of the street improvement bonds, which would leave a 20c tax that could be levied to cover the interest and sinking fund of the water bonds, and for all other purposes.

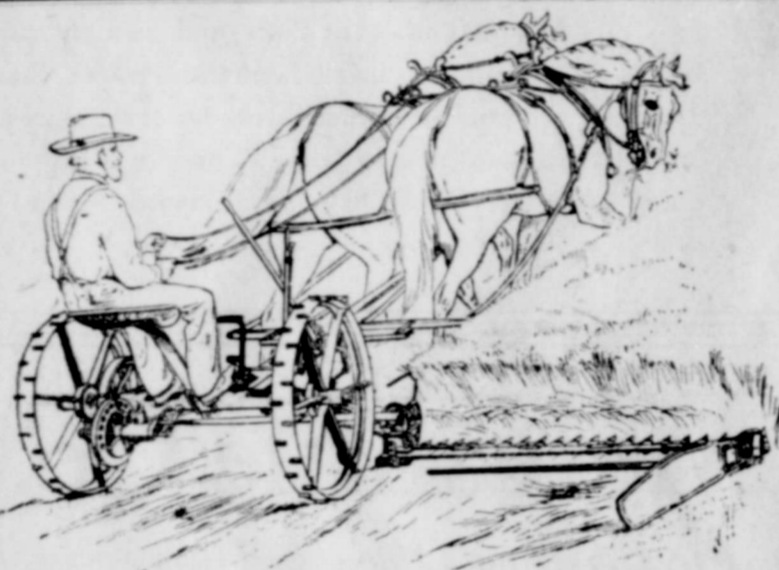

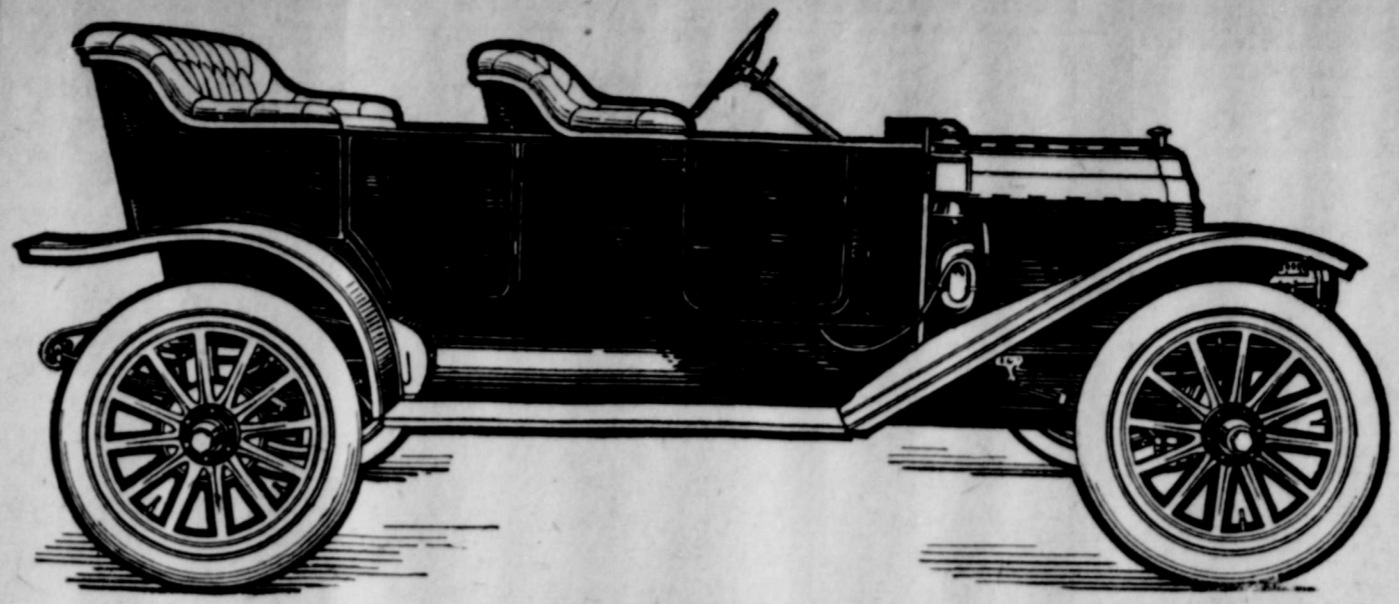

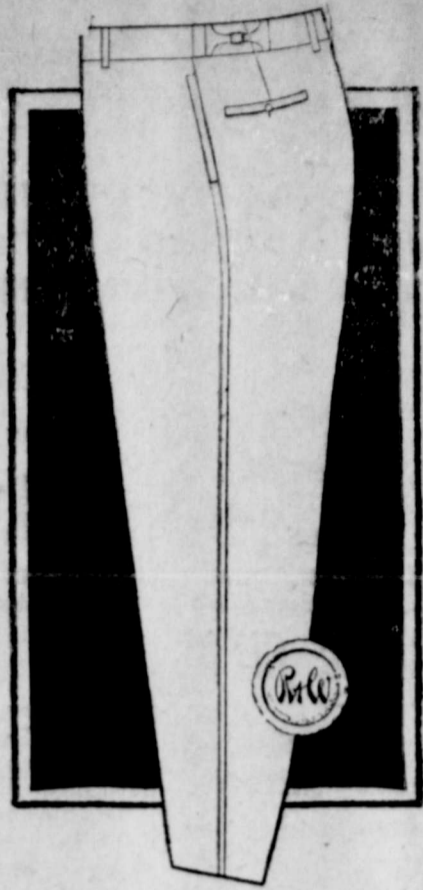

## CANNOT ASSIST CITY

Judge Walker receives Ruling from Attorney General's Department on Power of Commissioners to Aid City.

County Judge Harvey Walker is in receipt of the following copy of a letter addressed to the county judge of Nolan county, in response to an inquiry regarding the power of the Commissioners court to assist the city in building bridges within the city limits. As will be noted the letter covers the ground thoroughly, and specifically repudiates the authority of a Commissioners court to construct or improve the streets and alleys of duly incorporated cities and towns. Of course this applies as well to the bridges within the corporate limits.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your favor of July 18th, 1910, we advised you that the Act of the 31st Legislature conferring authority upon municipal corporations to assess the cost of street improvements upon abutting property owners had no application to the county and public property owned by the county. We advised you further that the county commissioner's court would be without any power or authority to expend the funds of the county for the purpose of constructing and improving the streets of the city of Sweetwater.

At the request of Mr. J. W. McDugald we have re-examined this question, but have concluded that the advice previously given you is correct.

The county commissioner's court is not given general authority over the county business, but merely such special powers as are specifically conferred by the Constitution and laws of this state. See Mills Co. vs. Lampasas County, 90 Texas, 603; Lamb vs. Orr, 90 Texas, 492. The circumstances under which the county commissioner's court may assume control and authority over the streets of cities and towns are defined by Article 4673 Revised Statutes. It will be observed that this statute only confers such authority and control in cases where there is no municipal government in control. This, of course, would not apply to the City of Sweetwater. Under the statutes the commissioner's court may exercise general control and superintendence over all roads, highways, ferries and bridges in their county without the corporate limits of cities and towns. It also has authority to provide and keep in repair the courthouse, jail and all necessary public buildings of the county. See Revised Statutes Article 1537. The powers enumerated in this statute, however, would not authorize the streets adjoining or surrounding the courthouse, jail or other public property of a county.

It has been held by the Supreme Court of this State in at least two cases that the commissioner's court of a county have no authority to construct or to improve the streets and alleys of cities and towns incorporated under the law. See State vs. Jones, 18 Texas, 874; and Norwood vs. Gonzales County, 79 Texas, 222.

### Will Prosecute Violations.

The Texas State Board of Health is determined to enforce the provisions of the Sanitary Code Law recently enacted, and especially that part relating to the reporting of births and deaths.

City Health Officer, Dr. J. B. Granville, is in receipt of a letter from John E. Rosser, State Registrar, to this effect and we quote the following paragraph:

"You are respectfully asked to note one specific case of violation of the law, a case about which you have no doubt, and one where proof that will stand in any court can be had, and then to notify your county attorney as the Attorney General's Department advises us to have you do. There is no desire on our part to 'persecute' anyone, or to single out some offender for any reason save that his guilt is apparent and easily to be proven. All cases of violation of the law should be prosecuted, of course, but the present plan is to indict one offender in each county, to the end that others may take warning and save themselves certain, future embarrassment."

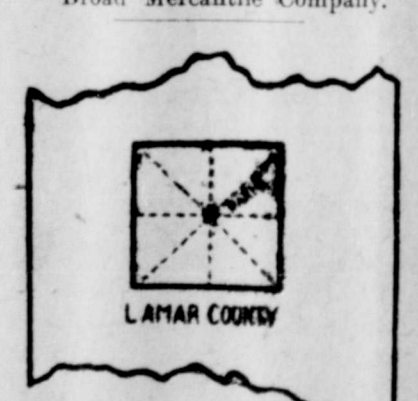

The above cut of Lamar county shows the district which has recently voted a bond issue of \$300,000 carried by a vote of 1179 in favor of the issue to 91 votes against it. The district is shown by a square in the center of the county and the dotted line in the map indicates the roads that are to be permanently improved. There are eight roads in all and the cost per mile will be \$5,000. The bonds run 40 years in series of \$10,000 drawing five per cent interest and are retired by a sinking fund of 2 1/2 cents on the \$100 valuation to be taken from the regular tax levy and set aside annually for that purpose.

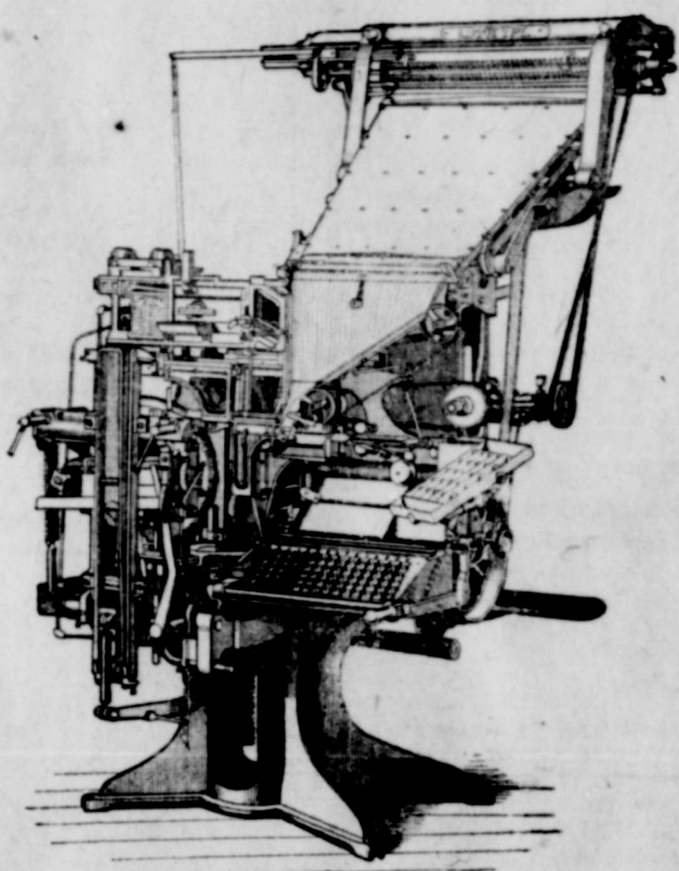

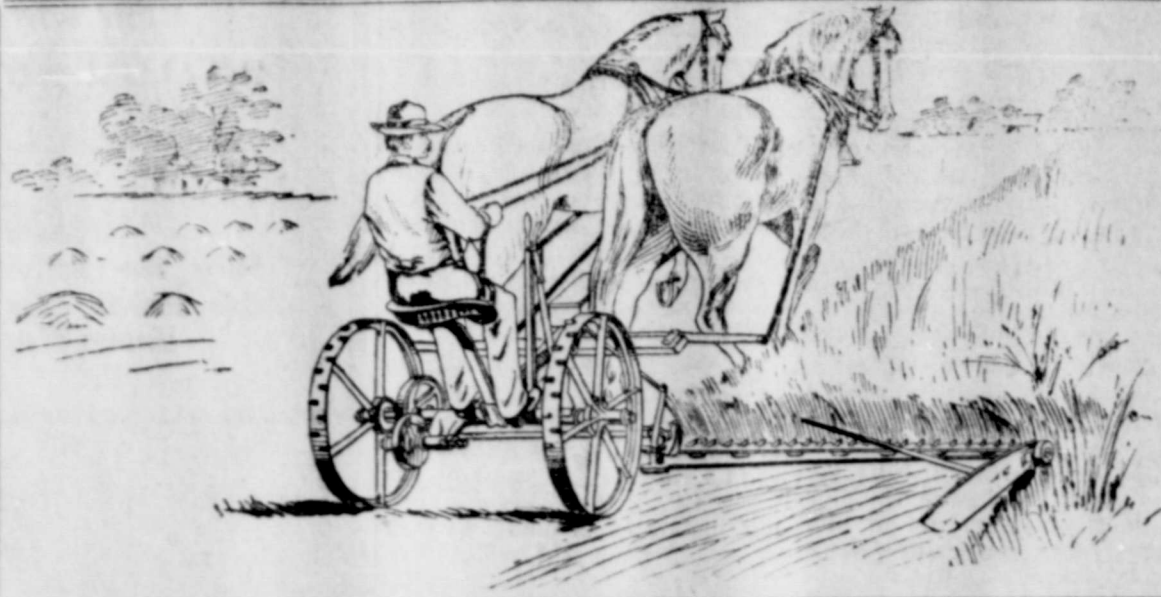
