\$58,000 LAND DEAL

Mann Bros. Buy 6,794 Acres of Davis Ranch—All But 2,000 of Original Tract Sold.

Meers Bros. closed a big deal last Thursday, selling 6,794 acres of the E. A. Davis ranch to Jim and Duke Mann for a total consideration of \$57,750. The tract is a splendid piece of property, located 5 miles from town, containing both agricultural and grazing land and is well watered, having on it an inexhaustible supply of water, 400 gallons a minute being pumped from a well, water standing at

40 ft. depth. Messrs. Mann will place part of the tract upon the market immediately, and the remainder will most likely be stocked by them.

The Davis ranch, comprising 10,000 acres, was put on the market by Meers Bros. about 16 months ago, and in that length of time they have disposed of all but 2,000 acres of the tract. The ranch is located but 5 miles from town and contains both splendid farming and pasture land, all of which combined make it a most desirable property.

CONTENTION CORRECT

Judge Newman's Position With Reference to Water Bond Issue Correct. May Approve Bonds.

A telegram Saturday afternoon from Judge Newman at Austin, conveyed the news that the Attorney-General's department had acknowledged his position with reference to the water bond issue to be correct, and that if there was no other irregularity or objection to be found the issue would be approved.

The Judge returned Sunday, and at a meeting of the City Council Monday morning his verbal report was accepted and the council tendered him a vote of thanks for his service.

Judge Newman's contention was that while a 25c tax on the \$100 valuation was all that could be levied up to 1909, the legislature in that year divided the tax rate into two separate funds, one of 15c on the \$100 valuation for street improvement, and one of 25c on the \$100 valuation for water and light and general purposes.

A tax of 20c on the \$100 valuation is at present being levied to cover the interest and sinking fund of the street improvement bonds, which would leave a 20c tax that could be levied to cover the interest and sinking fund of the water bonds, and for all other purposes.

ROAD BOND ISSUE.

For the second time the voters of Road Precinct No. 1, will have an opportunity to add to the prosperity of the community, increase property values and improve their surroundings by the simple exercise of their right of franchise Saturday—by voting FOR the bonds.

There is no need to dwell upon the importance of voting for the bonds. Prior to the first election this matter was so thoroughly explained and every phase of the benefits accruing so fully presented that no one could possibly misunderstand the issue. The very fact that both State and Federal aid is at our command for the proper distribution of the money upon our roads should alone be sufficient to recommend the road bond issue to every thinking voter.

The greatest need at this time is rather the precaution against indifference. Don't let pass this opportunity of expressing yourself upon the question, no matter how business may be crowding you. It is comparatively a small loss of time in the accomplishment of good that will endure throughout future generations.

Vote your sentiments in the matter, and vote next Saturday.

Not satisfied with the population figures accredited to it by the last Federal census, Comanche has taken a census of its own. The Federal census gave it a population of 2,756, whereupon the Chamber of Commerce made arrangement with the man taking the scholastic census to also take the complete census of the town, with the result that Comanche now claims a population of 3,227. The scholastic census showed 732 scholastics, which is not far from the ratio of 5 citizens to 1 scholastic.

ROAD BONDS SATURDAY

Voters in Precinct 1 Have Another Opportunity to Express Themselves Upon Issuance of \$75,000 Bonds.

Next Saturday, June 3d, the voters of Road Precinct No. 1 will for the second time express themselves upon the issuance of \$75,000 road bonds for the improvement of roads within this precinct. The first election carried by a vote in the ratio of 5 to 1. The Attorney-General's department failed to approve the issue because of a number of technicalities, chief among which was the fact that the field notes did not correspond with the map of the district.

This time every precaution has been exerted, and there is no possibility of the bonds being turned down because of error. It remains for the voters to make the bonds a reality. Every voter in the district is vitally interested, and should not fail to express himself on this matter. It makes no difference how busy you are or what urgent business you may have next Saturday, drop everything and vote—and VOTE FOR THE BONDS.

The question has been raised as to the legality of holding the election on Saturday, it being a legal holiday, a number of citizens advanced the opinion that it would not. Judge Walker maintained that the statutes read that an election could be held on any day, legal holiday or not with the single exception of Sunday which it proscribes. To make doubly sure that he was correct in his position the Judge sent a telegram to the Attorney-General's department at Austin for advice upon the question, receiving the following reply from C. E. Mead, Asst. Attorney-General: "An election held June 3d, Jefferson Davis' birthday, would be legal."

With the assurance of both State and Federal aid in the building of roads, there can be no reasonable objection made to the bond issue. With such privileges granted us, there can be but one way to vote—VOTE FOR THE BONDS.

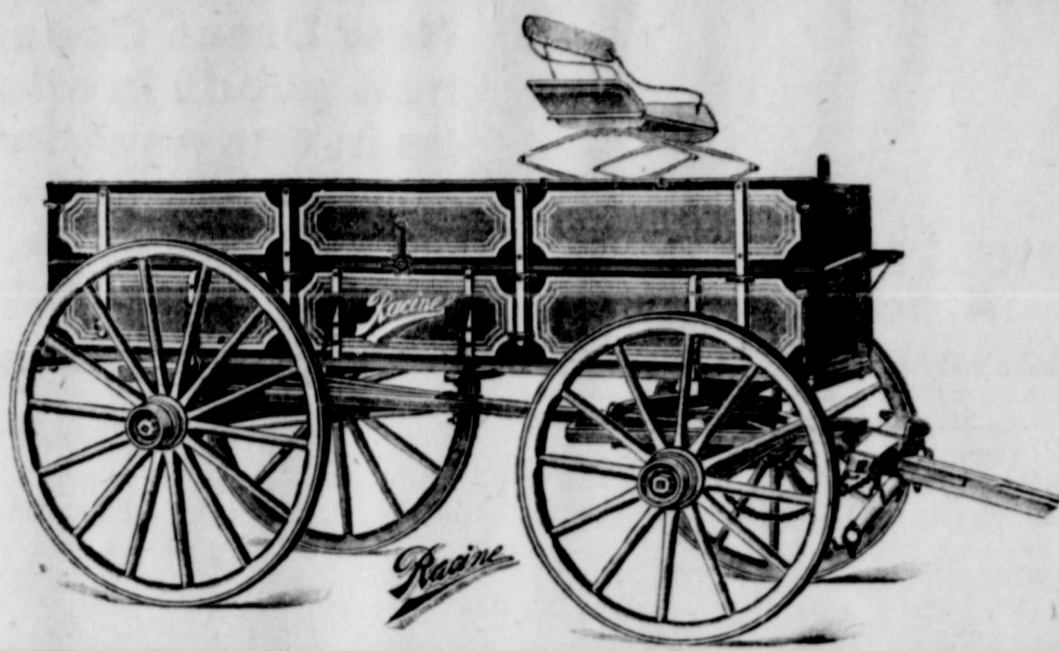

MELVIN BOOSTER.

GIRL WITH A SLENDER WAIST

Can Wear a Flower Girdle But Her Stouter Sister Should Shun This Adornment.

The girl with the slender waist should make herself a flower girdle. These are attractive on the slim young girl, but let her stouter sister beware!

Choose soft satin or messaline ribbon, four inches wide, and cut off enough to make a soft crush belt. If you wish it to droop slightly in front, cut it longer.

Make the rest of ribbon into a huge many-looped rosette like a full blown rose, as large as a giant chrysanthemum. The smaller flowers are six inches in diameter, the others eight inches.

Make the loop 2 1/2 and three inches long, and make for the smaller ones 16 to a flower, 20 for the larger. There are also two ends, one to the bottom and front and the other quite short at back.

The loops are tied in double tiers on each side of the center, which is tightly tied with a cross piece. They are then turned back and curled to resemble flower petals and made into round shape.

A bunch of yellow stamens, such as are used in millinery, is tied through the central piece, standing out in both directions. A few sprays of green leaves are added at the back to peep from beneath the ribbon.
