## ENROUTE TO ST. LOUIS

MASON RAILROAD COMMITTEE  
TO MEET WINCHELL.

Have Acceded to Practically All Demands Made of Them and Want Definite Assurance.

Mason is dead in earnest about wanting the Frisco extension, and her citizens are prepared to take advantage of the opportunity that has been presented to them. The gentlemen composing the Mason railroad committee were in Brady Tuesday afternoon enroute to St. Louis where they have an appointment Thursday to meet Pres. Winchell, of the Frisco, and at which time they hope to be given some definite assurance that the road will be built at once. The gentlemen composing the delegation were: Wm Hofman, Charles Bierschwale, E. J. Lemburg, A. N. Mour-sund, Elgin Kothmann and J. W. White. They were joined here by W. D. Crothers, who accompanied them on the trip.

The committee has acceded to practically every demand made upon them in the tentative offer of Chairman Yoakum, of the Frisco board, at Fort Worth recently, and now will endeavor to get some definite proposition from Pres. Winchell in order that they may put the matter up to the citizens of Mason in concrete form. The committee will make Pres. Winchell an offer of \$40,000 bonus, right-of-way through Mason county, depot grounds and ground for stock pens and yards. About ten days ago the Frisco officials amended their first offer by extending the time limit of their reaching Mason, in case they decide to build, six months, which would mean that the first passenger train would be due to reach Mason in June, 1913. This change in the original proposition worked a considerable hardship on the committee, inasmuch as they had all the subscribers to the bonus make their notes due on January 1913, which required them to do the work all over and extend the notes six months. However, they agreed to this demand as well, and now have everything in shape where they believe it is up to the Frisco to make good.

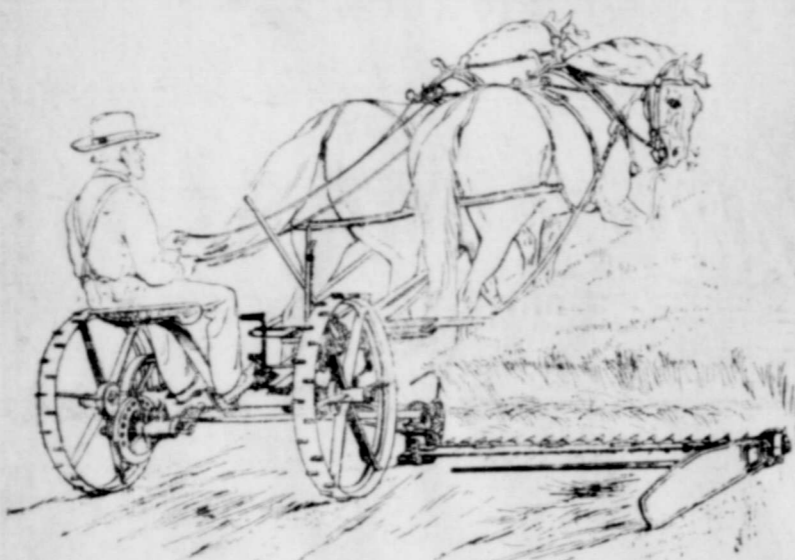

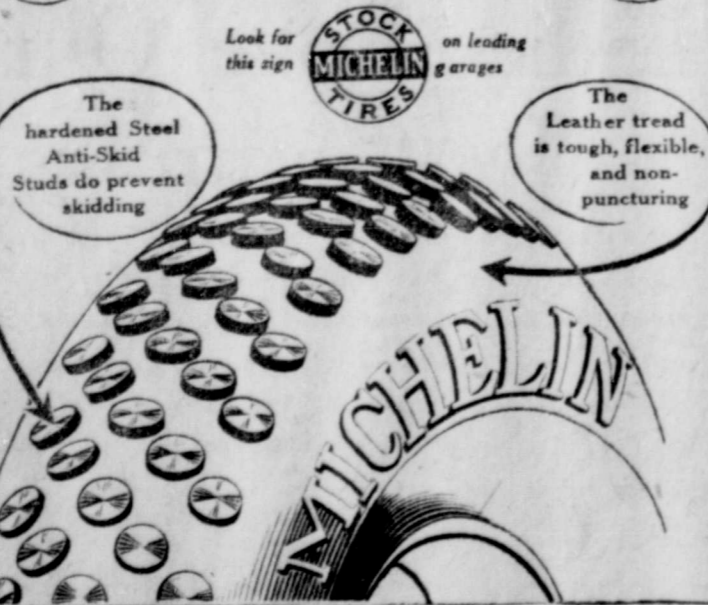

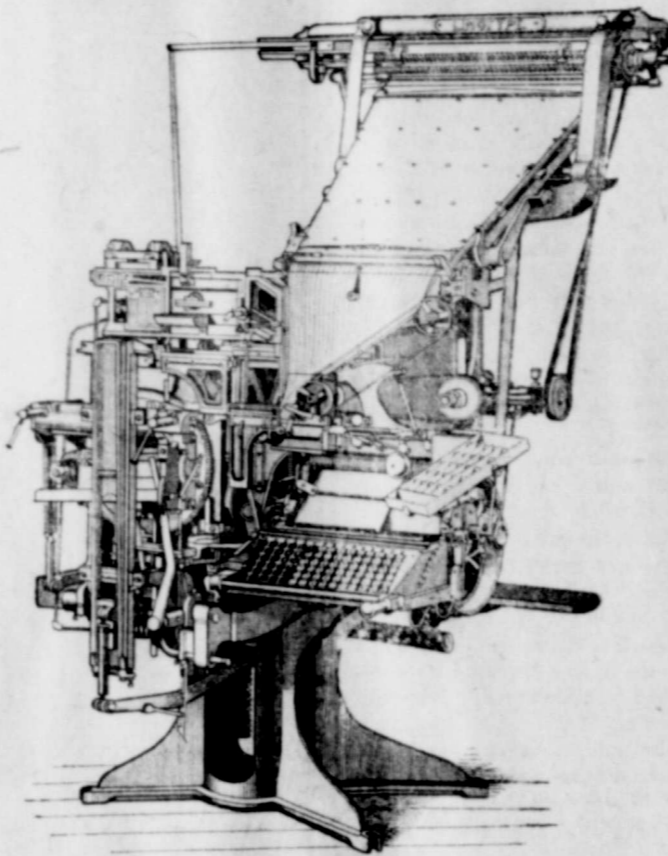
## ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

Mergenthaler Linotype Added to Our Equipment  
In Commemoration of Birth of The  
Greater Brady Standard

### A WONDERFUL EXAMPLE OF HUMAN INGENUITY

Recognized as the Greatest Invention Ever Conceived  
by the Human Mind--Twenty Years Ago  
First Machine Installed in Texas.

On the 2nd of May, one year ago, the consolidation of three of Brady's weekly papers took place, signaling the birth of The Greater Brady Standard. The Brady Standard was, at that time, but little more than one year old, but had enjoyed a phenomenal growth and development and was recognized as the representative paper of McCulloch county. Shortly after the consolidation, the semi-weekly edition was launched, which met with instant favor and is today meeting with the greatest of success. From the very beginning The Brady Standard was designed to be a paper for the people of all of McCulloch



county, and its mission has always been to boost for Brady and McCulloch county, and tell the world of its great and unlimited resources and opportunities.

In commemoration of our first anniversary we present to our readers The Brady Standard dressed in a bright new face of type cast from our own Mergenthaler linotype machine, a new equipment now in active service in our office.

This type-setting marvel is recognized as the greatest invention ever conceived by the human mind. So perfect is it in all its parts, so accurate in all its operation, and so life-like in its movements that it seems more human than mechanical.

It is rare that machines of this character are found in the smaller towns. Being expensive, the editor of the small paper generally feels that he cannot afford to tie up so much capital in one piece of machinery, and he leaves to his city brother the labor savers and continues on his way in the same rut that has marked the path of country printers for generations.

But The Standard is not content to follow in the old beaten path. We believe that this is a growing field, and that Brady is destined to grow into a thriving city. We have confidence in the future of Brady, and we propose to help along that future by putting in a modern printing plant and furnishing our readers an up-to-date paper. This our new machine will enable us to do.

Twenty years ago the first linotype was installed in Texas in the office of the Houston Post. The then manager of that paper was laughed at when he announced that the iron typesetter would do the work formerly done by human fingers and many had misgivings as to the prompt delivery of their favorite paper if the manager persisted in such pipe dreams as the typesetting machines. But the wisdom of that particular manager has long ago been recognized, and no city paper today could live and compete with its rivals if it had to resort to the old hand-set way.

Up to a few years ago the U. S. Government scoffed at the idea of linotypes, and even the printers themselves declared that the work in the big government shop was so technical and diversified that a machine could not handle it. That they were wrong

is evidenced by the battery of 79 machines, said to be the biggest battery of machines in the world. Every language, save Chinese is set on them, and the most difficult and technical documents and reports handled expeditiously. A French work relating to treaties, comprising over 400 pages, was set, bound and delivered in less than three days.

The linotype is a versatile machine, as well as a time saver, and is capable of handling the work quickly. Its type is always new and clear cut, and the printed page is easily read and presents a pleasing appearance. The Standard is thus prepared to

handle work which heretofore has gone to the city offices, to handle it with ease and dispatch. The larger the job of printing, or the more complicated it is, the more easily can it be handled on the machine, compared with the old hand set method. There is no possibility of running short of letters, for we cast our own type, and there is no chance for our type to become worn out, for every job is printed from new type.

If you believe in encouraging enterprise; in building up a greater town and community; in patronizing a paper that is working for a bigger and better Brady, we have no fear but what we will be given preference over the outside printer. It is all we ask—a fair consideration. Commercial printing, catalogue printing, booklets, brief and legal printing is our forte. First class work always.

As stated a week ago, this machine will do the work of five men, will do the work more uniformly and accurately than the hand set work. It symbolizes the triumph of improved machinery over the old hand methods. As the reaper to the sickle, so compares the linotype to the hand compositor.

Load these products on wagons and they will form a procession 320 miles long and our annual production on its way to the foreign factory will form a gigantic parade that will reach around the world three times and it will require eleven years to pass a given point. It is a golden stream of prosperity flowing out of the state and on its bosom floats factories, cities and millions of happy homes. It is laden with opportunities destined for the people of the whole world and it furnishes life giving substances to the withering veins of European nations.

The parade costs \$200,000 per day and \$75,000,000 per annum and is paid for by the sweat of those who till the soil. Our public servants who desire to do something more than swim around undevoured in the waters of public life should watch the parade. Our raw material on its journey to the foreign factory forms one of the most colossal pageants in the history of the human race and is the commercial tragedy of the Twentieth century. Watch it!

### Road Building

### The Texas Hog

The dinner bell of the nation rings out the praises of the Texas hog and he is diligently sought after by the consumers of both continents.

No domestic animal has ever made such sacrifices to meet the demands of progress as the hog. He has given half of his life and fifty-six pounds of flesh to meet the market demand for young stock. Certainly the human race has made no such sacrifice for success as this dumb brute.

According to the census reports of the Federal department of agriculture the average weight of the hog has decreased from 275 pounds to 213 pounds during the past thirty years and he is now going to the market one year earlier than formerly.

As a revenue producer he undoubtedly excels any other animal on the globe and enjoys the distinction of being the only animal that can swell a bank account by emptying a swill barrel. The hog is the most prolific of all domestic animals.

As a rule the hog is not troubled with competitors, although King Cotton has made an effort to imitate his by-products by putting on the market a compound substitute for lard, but wherever the fat of the hog can supply the market his counterfeit quickly disappears.

The hog has thickly populated the rural districts of Texas and his rapid approach has so alarmed city councils that numerous ordinances have been passed prohibiting him from entering the city limits, but when properly dressed and cooked he quickly wins the favor of both aldermen and citizens.

The Texas swine is the most prosperous of all hogs in the United States. According to the census reports of the Federal department of agriculture on Jan. 1, 1911, the average value of hogs of all ages in Texas was \$7.70, which is an increase of 373 per cent since 1870. No state in the Union can compare with us in increase in value per head of hogs. The total value of all hogs of all ages at the present time is approximately \$25,000,000. We have shown an increase of \$59,000 in number and \$17,000,000 in value during the past decade.

Texas is one of the best hog countries on the globe and the animal fattens economically under natural conditions.

## THE HESSIANS.

They Were Good Soldiers, and Some Became Good Americans.

There is a popular belief among some people that the Hessian mercenaries brought here by the British government to fight the Americans remained here after the war was over and that their descendants constitute a considerable element of the Pennsylvania Germans of today. Comparatively few remained here after the war, because the British government was under contract to return such as escaped the casualties of the war after it was over. The few that remained made good citizens, as they made the very best soldiers against the Americans, and whenever it was practical to do so they were put in the most responsible places by the British commanders.

The intense hatred at one time against the so-called Hessian soldiers, some of which still lingers with the present generation, is very unjust, because they did not volunteer to fight against the Americans, but they were forced into the British service by the impetuous German princes who sold them to the British like so many slaves. The Hessian soldiers would sometimes take a notion to desert, and they invariably would find refuge among some of the German colonists. A considerable number of them were left behind from time to time on marches, on account of sickness or wounds. These always found a ready welcome among German settlers; few of them ever found the way back to their native land.—"Pennsylvania Germans," by William Beidelman.

## LIBERTY BELL.

Its Connection With the Declaration of Independence.

The famous Liberty bell was cast in London in 1752, brought to America and subsequently recast in Philadelphia. It bears the inscription, "Proclaim Liberty Throughout the World and to All the Inhabitants Thereof." It was cracked while being tolled after the death of Chief Justice John Marshall in 1835. It is kept on exhibition in Independence hall, Philadelphia. It has had a fictitious importance owing to the popular belief that its ringing proclaimed the adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. Concerning this belief, however, Friedewald in his "Declaration of Independence" (1904) says:

"There is no shadow of authority even for associating the ringing of the bell with the announcement of the agreement upon independence. The mythical legend of the blue eyed boy waiting outside the door to give the signal to the man in the bell tower is the product of the fertile imagination of one of Philadelphia's early romancers, George Lippard, who first gave currency to it in his appropriately called 'Legends of the Revolution.' This book was published in 1847."—New York American.

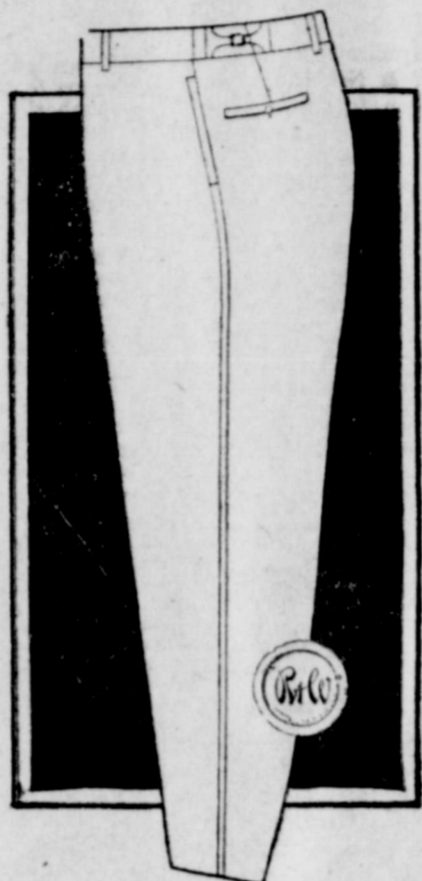

Eden, Texas Boy Goes 125 Yards in Twelve and One-Fifth Seconds.

New York, May 30.—In the Irish-Celtic Park this afternoon, Gwynn Henry of Eden, Texas, unattached, made a new American record in the special invitation dash for 125 yards. His time was 12 1-5 seconds. The former record of 12 2-5 seconds was made in 1889 by Charles A. Sherrill.

Henry was for years in Howard Payne College at Brownwood, and has helped to carry the Orange and Blue colors to victory in many an athletic meet. Some few years ago Henry met Fred Ramsdell at Waco and asked for a try-out with the big fellow, but was refused the privilege. He said upon his return that he would some day meet Ramsdell if the big Texan remained on the track. He went to New York some weeks ago and attached himself to the Irish-American club, but on account of having been there only a short time, was not allowed to enter as a member of the club. He then entered unattached and clipped off a fifth of a second from the world's record that has stood since 1889. Dispatches received by Texas papers do not state whether or not Henry was opposed in the dash by Ramsdell, Clowan and Rosenberg, but it was previously announced that the "Big Four" would run a distance of 125 yards on Decoration Day.

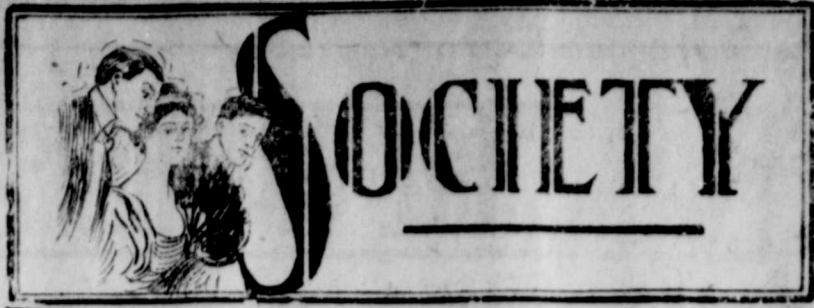

**HOW TO KILL FLIES.**

Four Recipes Claimed to Be Efficacious for Pest Destruction.

In the agitation to kill flies the fact that a great many are without a reliable remedy to aid the work, of the solution in shallow dishes and outside of the usual fly paper and patent articles, seems to have been overlooked.

Flies are inordinately thirsty. Dissolve one drachm of bichromate of potash in two ounces of water and add a little sugar. Put some of the solution in shallow dishes and distribute about your room.

Here is another: A spoonful of formaldehyde put into four ounces of water and exposed in a room will kill all the flies.

This is a good one also: Burning pyrethrum powder in a room will stupefy the flies immediately, when they may be swept out and burned. Still another: Drop twelve drops of carbolic acid on a heated stove, and the vapor will kill the flies.

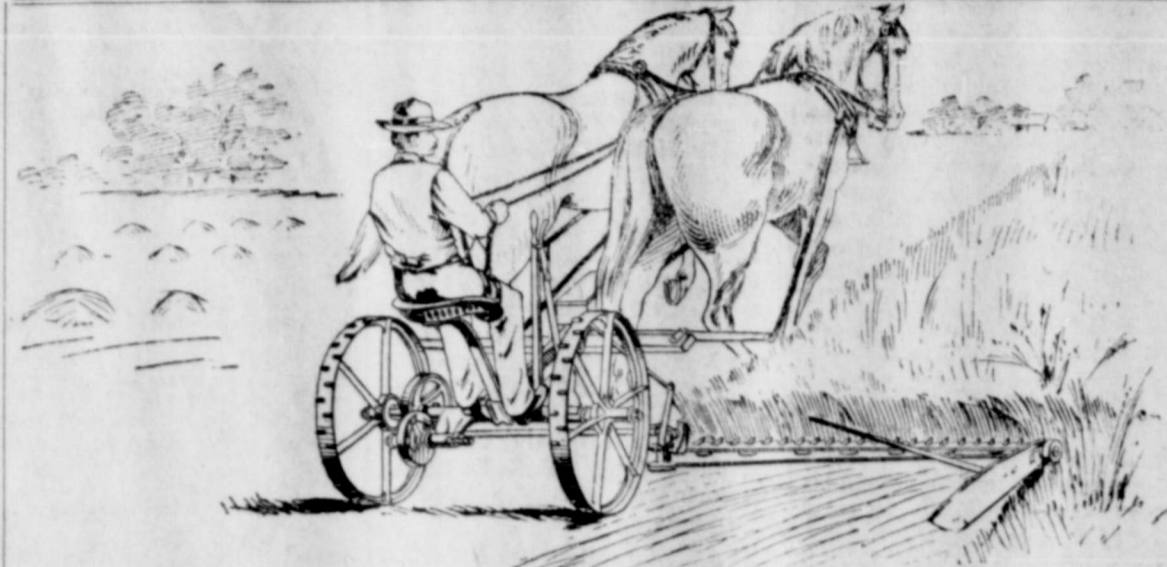

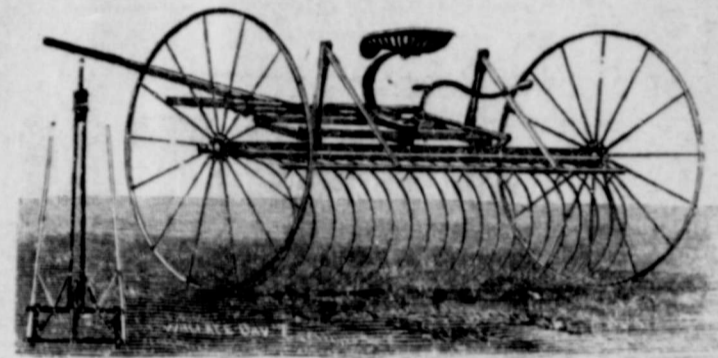
