Butcher, the government farm agent for the San Angelo country, says that some complaint has reached him that grasshoppers are damaging cotton; and to prevent further inuse branmash, scattering it around and over the field. To make the branmash mix one pound of paris green or arsenic with five pounds of wheat bran, with a quart of molasses. Find late Charley Stephens. out where the grasshoppers enter the cotton field and there Brady Monday. sprinkle plenty of the mash late in the afternoon, as the insects do most of their work at night. 
