ANTIS ARE VICTORIOUS

PROS CONCEDE ELECTION BY LESS THAN 5,000.

Chairman Ball Declares Issue Will Be Fought Out in the Courts or Before People.

After a period of suspense during which first the hopes of one side and then the other went a-glimmering, the great prohibition election has at last been declared in favor of the antis, by the narrow margin of somewhere in the neighborhood of 5,000 votes.

Figures compiled by the Star Telegram show that the antis have a majority of 4,387. The returns totaled 230,136 for the antis and 225,749 for the pros. There are six counties wholly missing in the list and the returns from thirty-six counties are incomplete. The final returns from these thirty counties will increase the anti lead somewhat, it is believed, as many of them are South and Southwest Texas counties, known to be anti, while the greater number of the large counties are in. The vote of the outstanding counties are not sufficient to affect the result in the least.

The election returns were eagerly awaited by a large crowd of citizens Saturday night, the bulletin boards at both the Central Drug store and the one put out jointly by the Palace Drug store and J. V. Searcy holding the crowds until midnight. The returns came in slowly, but however anxious the crowd was, they preserved their good humor and passed the time between reports in good natured raillery. The first reports indicated a lead for the pros, and when at midnight the Dallas News was reported out with a statement that the pros had won by a majority of 2,500, everyone was content to take it as a matter of fact, and the crowds soon dispersed. Up until Monday afternoon the belief still maintained that final results would show a pro victory, reports from Chairman Ball claiming a pro majority of from 25,000 to 65,000, while Chairman Wolters' largest claim for the antis was 7,500.

Monday afternoon, however, the tide turned in favor of the antis and during the afternoon Chairman Ball, of the pros, issued a statement conceding the election to the opposition.

BALL'S STATEMENT.

Houston, July 24.—The following official statement was given out by Chairman Ball of the statewidens at 11:30 o'clock this morning:

"The complete returns likely will show an anti majority of less than 5,000 votes.

"The law passed by the last legislature provides for a contest of the election by either side if dissatisfied with the result on account of illegal voting of irregularities that would affect the result.

"Of course I am not in a position to say whether or not the pros will contest. That can only be determined by a conference by friends of the cause. I am sure, however, that the question will be taken either to the courts or back to the people as soon as can again be submitted, which can be done at any regular session of the legislature.

"It appears from the reports received that large numbers of negroes and Mexicans and a large element who do not usually pay their poll tax have used poll tax receipt paid by themselves or paid for them and that the election result thereby has been determined adverse to statewide prohibition.

"The local prohibitionists have voted larger majorities for statewide than for local prohibition, just as we claimed.

"I advise deliberation and calm action and that prohibitionists consider and proceed to solve the great question of

how constitutions should be made, with patriotic and thoughtful purpose.

WOLTERS' STATEMENT.

Houston, July 24.—Col. Jake F. Wolters, of the antis at noon claimed 6,500 majority, with several counties to hear from, as his final estimate. It is said that they lack complete returns from about forty counties which are not expected to greatly change the result.

Locally the election passed off very quietly, although the voting was lively and a good vote was polled, Brady precinct polling 555 votes out of a total of 670. For the county there was a total of 1,492 votes polled out of 1,837.

MEETING OPENS.

Great Union Revival Now in Progress.

As announced in our last issue, the great union revival meeting opened Sunday morning at 10 o'clock. The meeting was largely attended, and the best of attention given the revivalist, Lockett Adair. Interest is manifest at every meeting and indications point to one of the most successful revivals ever held in Brady.

The singing is a feature of the service, and no city can boast of a better chorus than is had at each meeting. The prayer meetings will take place each afternoon of this week and next, as previously announced, the city being divided into four districts for this purpose.

The morning services have been set for 10 o'clock and all are requested to be on hand promptly at the hour named. Provision has been made for seats for everyone, and every effort will be made for the comfort of those who attend.

THREE STRAIGHTS.

Fort Worth Armours Take All of Brady Series.

The Fort Worth Armours gave the Brady Stars a run for their money last week, and the locals failed to get any scalps. However, they put up some good ball playing and showed themselves game throughout the series. Nor did the Fort Worth aggregation find them "easy pickings", on the contrary at no time did they have a walk-away in the games.

The Armours are a crack lot of players and, including the Brady series, have lost but two games out of twenty played. The first game with Brady on Thursday was won by a score of 8 to 1; the second, 7 to 4; while the third resulted 3 to 1.

From here the Armours went to Menard for four games. Of the two played so far, the Armours won both, shutting out Menard in both games, the score Sunday being 16 to 0, and Monday 7 to 0.

FIVE CARS MATERIAL.

For Construction on Brownwood North & South.

The deal transferring the Brownwood North & South property to the Frisco has been completed, and today there arrived five cars of material, which will be used in the construction of the new line. This new material of course will go into the material yards, but nevertheless it is for use on the new line, for the line could not be built without first constructing material yards. These yards are located on the right-of-way of the Frisco at the intersection of the Brownwood North & South and are convenient to town. Engineer in charge, Kates, was in town today and reports that he has a force of men at work on the yards and will soon have them in shape for unloading other material.

Bids on the repair work on the dump, bridges and culverts, were forwarded to St. Louis today, where they will be passed upon and within a very short time the contract will be awarded. A shipment of rails will be forwarded to Brownwood Aug. 15. This first car of rails will build the line ten miles and on September 20th another shipment of rails will be made. This last shipment will complete the line to May, which it is hoped will be ready by October 1st. However, the railroad company has until January to complete the line to that point.

Messrs. Lee Watson, Brooke Smith and D. F. Johnson were at Rising Star this week to submit to the people of that town a proposition to complete the line to that place, when once the construction work is started. The proposition is to build to Rising Star for the consideration of right-of-way from May to the Star and \$25,000 bonus. This proposition was put up to the people of the Star and they have been given until September 1st to determine whether they will accept. If they accept the proposal, the Frisco is compelled, under its contract with Brownwood, to complete the line to Rising Star. It is thought by Mr. Smith that the Rising Star people will accept.

Anyway, Brownwood will have railway connection with May about the time the cotton season is well under way, and if the Star does what she ought to do by the proposal, it will go on to that point and reach there by the first of the year.

The five cars of material which arrived today consists of two cars of rails and three cars of ties. This material was had at Menardville and was hurried here so the material yards could be put in shape for the beginning of construction work.—Brownwood Bulletin.

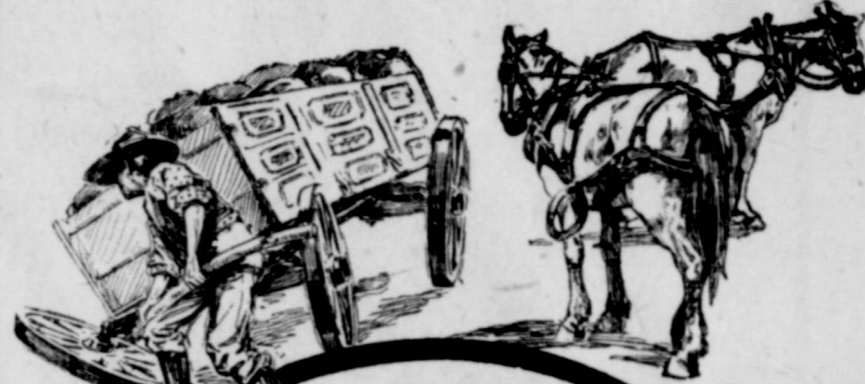

MCCULLOCH GOES WET

NORTHERN PORTION THOROUGHLY SOAKED.

Extreme Heat of Saturday and Sunday Followed by Showers Monday—Much Cooler

Heavy rains fell from Brownwood to San Angelo Monday morning is the report received here yesterday. In Brownwood the rain was accompanied by a storm, and the residence of a Mr. White was struck by lightning. It was not learned how much damage was done. Brownwood reported that the rain extended as far south as Brooksmith. Towards the west the rain seems to have covered quite a scope of country. Fife, Waldrip, Stacy, Ballinger and San Angelo are reported as having been flooded with rains. At Stacy rain fell both Sunday night and Monday morning, and the river was reported up and booming.

Later reports are that at Winchell it had rained all day yesterday, and that Rochelle had also received a good rain. Melvin, Lohn, Eden, Menard and Fredonia also enjoyed a good downpour. At Brady the rain began falling shortly before daylight, and continued until about noon. The rain was scarcely more than a good shower, but fell so slowly that practically every bit of it went into the ground.

The rains followed two as hot days as have been recorded in

many moons. Saturday was a scorcher itself, but did not compare with Sunday, when the heat was so intense that the wind blew as if off a red hot furnace. 104 and 105 degrees in the shade were registered Sunday. According to the government weather bureau, a temperature of 68½ degrees was recorded last evening at 7 o'clock, a drop of 36½ degrees since Sunday afternoon. A total precipitation of .25 inches was recorded.

The rains following cooled off the atmosphere remarkably, and were appreciated all the more after the unusual heat.

casting the largest proportion for prohibition. Five out of eighteen boxes gave the antis a majority.

The ladies showed their colors Saturday in no uncertain manner. From early in the morning until late in the afternoon ladies and the children paraded the streets singing prohibition songs and carrying prohibition banners, and there was not a man in Brady over 21 or under 80 that was not approached by someone wanting to pin on him the prohibition badge, a bow of white ribbon. The ladies also served an excellent dinner to a large number of voters, in the building formerly occupied by the Lyric.

Menard gave the antis a small majority, while Menard county itself went anti by only 15 votes, the total vote polled being 188 for and 203 against. Incomplete returns from Mason county show an anti majority of 39, Mason itself going wet. Tom Green county went dry by 270 majority, even San Angelo itself voting in the dry column. Rannels county gave the pros 340 majority, while San Saba gave them 141 majority.

Dallas county went wet by only 215 majority. Tarrant county, wet by 1,363.

The Water Problem

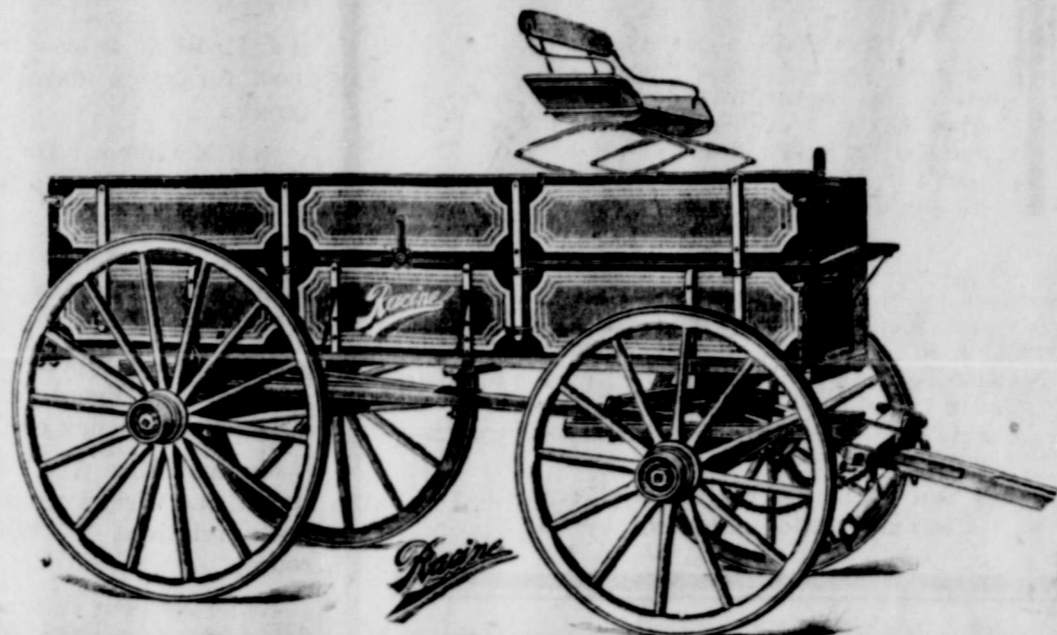
Solve the water problem and solve it now.

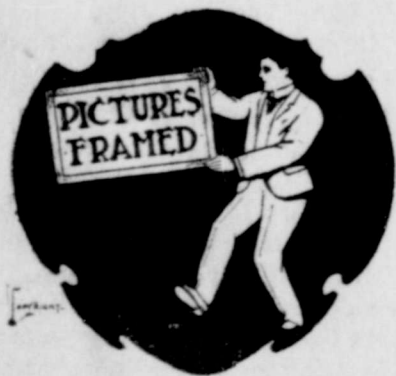

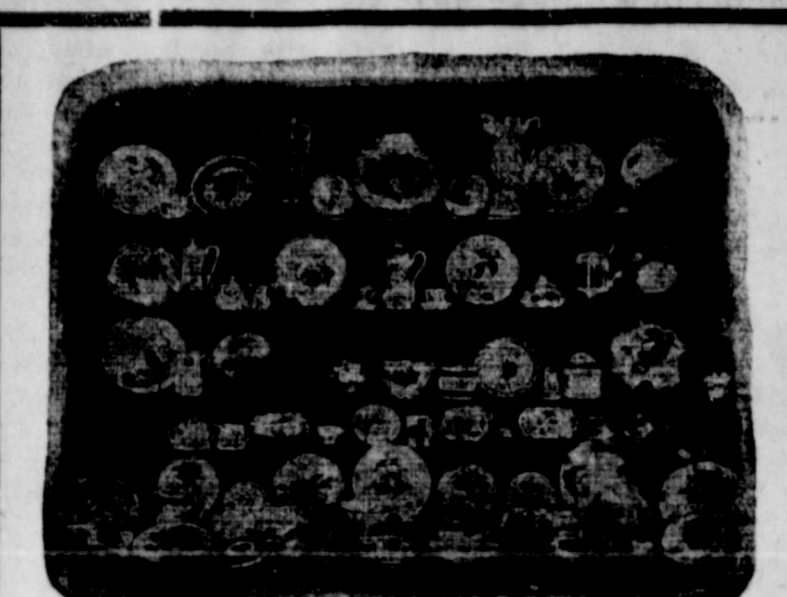
