"101 Wild West Show"—Two Days' Racing—Children Free on the Last Day of Event.

The Brady Fair association directors met Monday and decided to advance the dates of the fair one day, making the dates the 10th, 11th and 12th of October. This will give one additional day to move the exhibits to Dallas for the Dallas fair, which opens on the 19th.

It was agreed to have a two days' race meet, on the 10th and 11th, while the 12th will be known as "Children's Day," the children being admitted free to the grounds on that date. A feature for the last day of the fair will be Miller Bros. 101 Wild West Show, which will exhibit on the grounds.

Creeks Up and Branches Out of Banks—Hot Spell Believed to Have Been Broken.

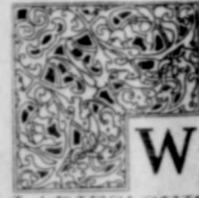
As fine rains as ever fell are reported from all parts of McCulloch county Sunday afternoon. In the Lohn community the creek was reported out of its banks, while a big rain is reported at Melvin, Eden, Pasche, Millersview, Stacy, Waldrip, Fife, Nine, Menard, Mason, Voca, Katemcy, Rochelle and Mercury.

Brady enjoyed several showers, the first Thursday night, another Friday morning, while the third fell Saturday afternoon. The Sunday rain was the one that counted, however, and beginning about 4:00 o'clock fell hard and fast for about two hours, the government gauge showing a total precipitation of 2.04 inches Sunday alone.

There was quite a rise in Brady creek Monday, and all the holes were thoroughly washed out, the creek running all the way through.

It is the general opinion that the great hot spell has been finally broken, and with the continued cool weather prevailing it is hard to estimate just how much good the rain will do.

**SEWERAGE SYSTEM.**

With the rapid strides in city building being made by Brady it will be but a short while before the question of the disposal of waste and sewage will be confronting our citizens. Every city that has enjoyed growth to any extent has sooner or later come face to face with this question, and while it has proven a serious problem in many communities, Nature has so endowed Brady with natural drainage that the problem will no doubt be easy of solution here.

The following article reprinted from the Rockdale Reporter gives some very interesting facts regarding the manner in which the sewage will be disposed of in that progressive Milam county city, together with the cost. It will be noted that the septic tank is placed outside the city limit, where there could be no possible objection to it. It will also be noted that the cost of the tank, together with over a mile of sewer is approximately \$5,000, half of which is to be paid as the work progresses, while the balance is divided into five yearly payments, with interest at 6 per cent.

This appears to us as solving the question at a very moderate cost, and one worth bearing in mind for future reference. The following is the extract from the article mentioned:

"The system will cover the six blocks included in the fire limits, and the big 8-inch mains will be laid in the alleys. They will converge on Burleson street, thence the disposal main will run to a point without the city limits, where the septic tank will be placed. This tank will be 16x42 feet, and will be of the most modern type. There will be more than a mile of the sewer mains.

The system will cost, complete, \$4,970.00. Of this sum the city pays \$2,470.00 in cash, the balance in five notes of \$500 each, due in one, two, three, four and five years, at 6 per cent. The cash portion of the contract will be paid in installments as the work progresses, the city holding back ten per cent on each payment as a guarantee of satisfactory completion."

**TO FREDERICKBURG.**

**Semi-Official Information Assures Building.**

That the Frisco officials have fully decided to extend the Frisco to Frederickburg is the information received through sources that may be considered reliable, inasmuch as the parties making the statement stand close to the head of the system and are actively interested in the building. The plans at present decided upon is to begin work as soon as the road to May is completed, which will be about the middle of October. The Frisco offices will then be moved to Brady, and operations begun.

This information assures connection with San Antonio, for while the Frisco does not care to consider the building of the road from Frederickburg to San Antonio, citizens of the latter place have announced their intention of building the road themselves. It is very likely that operations will be begun simultaneously from either end.

The Frisco's refusal to consider the Fredericksburg-San Antonio road is because of the indescribably rough country that it traverses would necessitate an enormous expenditure in the building of the road. As the San Antonio capitalists are willing to shoulder the burden, the Frisco, on its part, is more than willing that they should do so.

To make cotton pay even of good years, as a rule, we should plant only as much cotton as the home force can work and gather. Then every pound will count as proceeds of the farm. Then, too, this practice would result in less acreage of cotton and more of feed, and in a higher and more scientific mode of farming.—Eden Echo.
