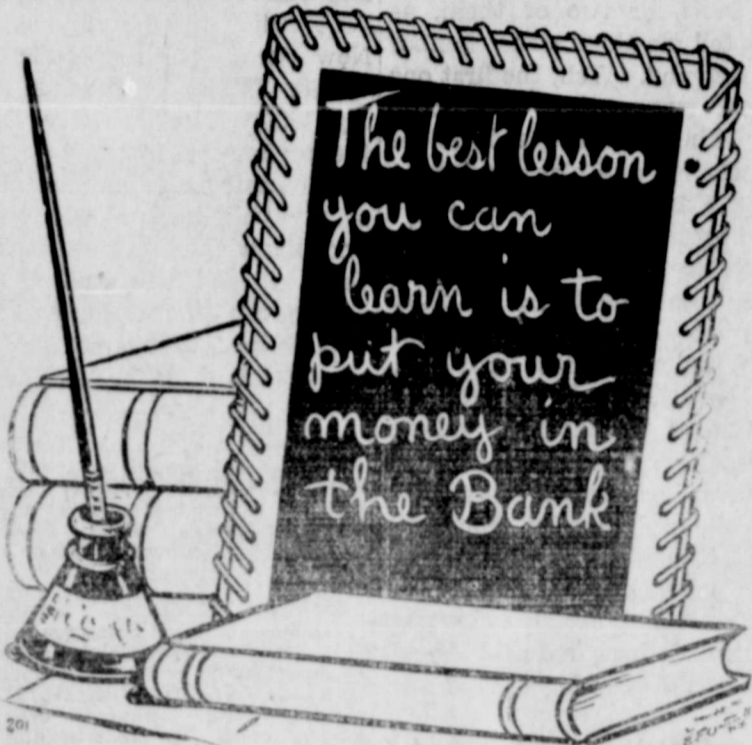

## 121-2 FT. RISE IN CREEK

BRADY CREEK STILL RUNNING THIS AFTERNOON.

Heavy Rains Reported From All Parts of the County Sunday Night and Monday Morn.

The long expected has come to pass, and every hole on Brady creek has been thoroughly washed out. Following the rain of Sunday night, Brady creek began running at the bridge Monday morning, a rise variously estimated at from six to ten feet coming out of Live Oak. On top of this came the news over the telephone of a ten foot rise coming down from Melvin, and during the afternoon the rise struck Brady. By 8:00 o'clock p. m. Monday the crest of the rise had been reached, the water gradually subsiding, although the creek is still running this (Tuesday) afternoon.

By actual measurement, the rise in the creek was 121½ feet, Engineer Gayle making the measurements this morning. From the amount of rubbish and trash that floated through under the bridge it is safe to say that there isn't a particle left in any hole along the creek above Brady.

The rain in Brady amounted to 1.55 inches. It began falling about 8:30 Sunday night, and continued falling slowly and unbrokenly practically throughout the night. From every part of the county the same reports are to be had, that of a splendid

## BROOM CORN.

Much interest has been manifested the past few years in the broom corn industry, and the success that has attended its culture has placed it in the front ranks as one of the most valuable and profitable crops to be had. Just the other day a press dispatch tells of the success of a Marshall man in raising broom corn. From but a single acre, planted this year, he estimates that he will make a ton and a quarter, which, at present values, will yield him \$160 per acre. He estimates that it costs him about \$15.00 per acre to raise the broom corn, and with broom corn selling at \$150 per ton, he will easily clear the first named figure on his ton and a quarter yield. He announces that he will plant several acres next year.

That broom corn can be grown successfully in McCulloch county there can be no doubt, and that its culture means profits to the man who undertakes it is also certain. What other counties can do, McCulloch can do better.

Dear Sir:—

Referring further to the matter of establishment of railway mail service between Brady and Menard, and your letter of July 28, enclosing one to Senator Bailey from the Second Assistant Postmaster General:

I am just in receipt of advice from our superintendent of mail service to the effect that the only reason this service has not been established long ago is that the Department insisted on having the route stated as from Brady to Menard all in the name of this company, whereas it should have been made to read from Whiteland to Menard, and that part of the line between Brady and Whiteland be covered later by a new route in the name of the G. C. & S. F. Our Mr. Adams will be in Chicago in the next day or two, and while there will urge that it be established at once.

## From the Plains.

Matador, Texas, Sept. 1.

Editor Brady Standard:

According to promise in my last letter to you, I will try and pen you a few lines this beautiful, bright morning. We stopped with relatives all along the route and in thirteen days made our arrival at Plainview, a most beautiful little town of several thousand inhabitants and the best watered town I ever saw, and it is here that I visited the big wells, or two of them, as they tell me there are a number just as good. Well, the first one visited was a sight to behold, furnishing two thousand gallons per minute, and placidly flowing off in a trough and ditch on to the crops of maize and alfalfa, which certainly is luxuriant in growth and this being the third crop of alfalfa cut from the patch and now almost knee high.

From this well we went to another of one thousand gallons capacity. There was a fine apple orchard just loaded down with fruit being irrigated from this well and he also stated that he had marketed his crop of peaches which brought him nine hundred dollars, and said the apples would net him a great deal more.

At this place we stayed with relatives from Wednesday until Monday morning and found all doing well except one brother who is afflicted with paralysis, but was doing reasonably well at the time of our departure for this place (Matador.)

On my arrival here found that my sister from Lafayette county had accepted my proposition by letter to meet me here with the sister who makes this her home, so the following sisters are having a family reunion at this place: Mrs. M. A. Lyons, Matador; Mrs. J. C. Jones, Muldoon; Mrs. J. P. Waddill, Rochelle and meeting with relatives with whom we have not met in thirty years, and of course the reader will understand what a pleasant time I am having, but have enjoyed the whole trip, from start to finish; even the cold day in August that I have always heard of, but never met until the 23rd, the day of our arrival at Plainview, when I had to travel all day rolled up in a bed quilt, having left home for a summer outing, but found that a man, or woman, always take their coat, but I had to put up with only wishing for mine.

In some parts of the country we found fine crops and others, none; but have in most of the

places found fine feed crops, maize and kaffir. I think we have seen thousands of acres of this crop which is the finest I have ever seen in my life and some of the finest cattle, but horses don't seem to be anything extra and the finest grass everywhere, just as good as heart could wish for. The gardens are also fine. Have eaten vegetables at every place we have stopped and they have a variety, too. The finest tomatoes and cabbage that I firmly believe will weigh ten pounds. Now some of my McCulloch county friends, methinks, will cry, "fishy," but I'll prove it to them when I get back.

Now, as I can't spare any more of my valuable time to write, and knowing there is such a thing as a waste basket, had better ring off for this time.

### Early Closing.

The following article, clipped from the Southwest Magazine, published at Dallas, has been handed us by a salesman in a local store with a request to publish. It tells what steps have been taken in Fort Worth toward relieving the burdens of the salespeople in that city.

"Retail clerks have started a campaign for early shopping and have issued a request to the public not to enter the stores after 6 p. m. weekdays and after 9 p. m. Saturdays. The request follows:

"To the people of Fort Worth and vicinity: The merchants of Fort Worth agree to close their places of business at the following time:

"All day Sunday and four of the legal holidays, viz: Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

"We trust the public will approve of the action of the merchants, who so kindly consent to close their respective places of business on all holidays and at 6 o'clock each evening, except Saturday evening, when they close at 9 o'clock.

"We appreciate your willingness to encourage the merchants in their efforts to promptly observe the holidays and early closing hours.

Do not try to enter the store after 6 o'clock evening and 9 o'clock Saturday nights, for these are the closing hours. By observing these rules you will do a humane act, and many a weary salesman and saleslady will thank you for it."

### U. S. Civil Service Examinations
