## THE DISTRICT COURT

ADJOURNED YESTERDAY AFTERNOON 'TIL NEXT TERM.

Cowser Granted New Trial—Alfalfa Lumber Co. Loses Suit Against A. Lewis, et al.

District court adjourned yesterday afternoon after being in session three weeks. In the case of M. C. Dutton vs. Geo. Vierling, the judge handed down an opinion in favor of the defendant.

W. H. Cowser was granted a new trial and given a new bond.

The accounts of the different officers were approved as allowed.

Among the cases disposed of were:

State of Texas vs. Chas. M. Dean, theft of cattle. Mistrial, the jury standing 9 for acquittal and 3 for conviction.

S. J. Cox vs. J. J. Savell, suit to correct judgment to conform with judgment of arbitration committee. Verdict favor of plaintiff.

State of Texas vs. Frank Brown (colored), rape. Mistrial, 9 for acquittal and 3 for conviction. Released under habeas corpus proceedings, and bond set at \$500.

Alfalfa Lumber Co. vs. City of Brady, suit on account. Judgment for City of Brady.

State of Texas vs. Miguel Mendoza, assault and attempt to murder. Guilty, two years in the penitentiary.

J. H. Moore vs. J. S. Heflin, suit on vendors lien notes. Judgment for plaintiff.

Alfalfa Lumber Co. vs. A. Lewis and Mrs. Mae Pollack. Judgment for defendant.

The big meeting in progress at Pear Valley is reported progressing nicely, there being some 15 or 20 converts up to date. ### RAILROAD NOTES.

Report of Doings About the Frisco Depot.

The Frisco railroad has reduced the one-way fare to Dallas from \$6.65 to \$6.40, in order to meet the Interurban rate.

There will be a slight change in the schedule on the Frisco effective Sunday, in order to give through sleeper service from Rotan and other Texas Central points through Dublin via the Frisco to Fort Worth. This will not affect the schedule at Brady. The carpenters are here rebuilding the part of the stock pens torn down some time ago, and restoring the pens to their former size. The old pens will also be strengthened. The Magnolia Petroleum Co. has secured a location on the Frisco track for storage tanks and warehouses.

His last load of seed cotton, weighing 1510 pounds, ginned a bale weighing 589 pounds, or a fraction over 39 per cent lint, and he says he is sure there was at least 50 pounds of dirt in the load, which would make the actual per cent of lint about 40 1-3 per cent. The cotton was grown on his place at Calf Creek and looked like it would make a bale to the acre until the worms struck it.

### STREET SPRINKLING.

That water for street sprinkling purposes is entirely unsatisfactory has been fully demonstrated this week. The down town streets and the public square which have been thoroughly wetted down each night have shown up dry by morning, and before noon the dust clouds have been blowing just as though not a drop of water had been placed on the streets.

Speaking for itself, The Standard has a lot of valuable machinery that the grit and sand that blows in through closed windows and doors threatens to damage and ruin, and we are sure the merchants fare but little better with their stocks of goods.

The article recently published in The Standard concerning the sprinkling of the streets with oil has been the subject of much favorable comment. Sprinkling with oil has been tried out in Dallas, San Antonio and other large cities, and pronounced a decided success, in fact it is said to be cheaper in the long run than sprinkling with water, and decidedly more effective. Once the streets have become saturated with the oil, it is not necessary to sprinkle only every few days, and the oiled surface not only serves to keep the dirt from powdering and blowing but catches the flying dust devils as well, thus practically freeing the atmosphere from this plague.

That there is merit in this mode of treating the streets can not be doubted, and we believe the experiment would meet with instant favor in Brady when once tried.

### BROOM CORN.

Brady has assurance of a broom factory next year, providing at least 60 acres of broom corn are assured the promoters of the new industry—and enough of our enterprising farmers have already volunteered acreage sufficient to meet the required amount and some to spare.

The growing of broom corn seems to offer one solution of the perplexing question of a profitable crop to take the place of cotton. It is easily grown, requires very little attention, and is one of the most profitable crops that can be grown.

So many of our readers have manifested an interest in this crop that we expect to publish a series of articles upon broom corn growing in the course of the next several weeks, or as soon as the proper information can be obtained.

Talk about your land of prosperity. Every farmer now says his cotton is making more than he anticipated, and the cry is for more cotton pickers. More cotton being grown than can be picked. That doesn't sound like a crop failure, does it?

And another thing. Did you know that, in the territory within five miles of Brady, the Santa Fe is employing between 300 and 400 men—skilled and unskilled labor? And did you know that these men are drawing from \$1.75 per day to salaries of \$5.00 and \$6.00 per day? Just reflect what an immense amount of money this figures, and you will agree with us that, compared with most places, Brady is seated in the very lap of luxury.

### CASE OF COTTON GROWER AT PRESENT PRICES.

Middling cotton just now is selling for something less than 10½¢ a pound on the wagon. That makes a bale of middling cotton worth less than \$52.50 a bale. With the value of the seed added, a bale of middling cotton is worth not more than \$60 on the basis of current quotations. Picking will cost \$10 a bale, ginning probably \$3. If these were the only items of expense a bale of middling cotton would now net the farmer \$47. But of course there are other items of expense—seed, bagging and ties, interest on investment, assuming the farmer to own his land; fertilizer in some cases, to say nothing of the cost of feed, the repair of implements and an allowance for the farmer as wages. Since, ordinarily, it will require at least two acres of land to produce a bale of cotton, the interest on the land investment at \$50 an acre will amount, at 8 per cent, to \$8. Leaving out of account the allowance for the farmer's wages, the other items of expense will probably add \$12 making a total cost of producing a \$60 bale of cotton easily \$27, leaving a net profit of \$33 on that bale of cotton. One farmer working with the assistance of a large family will not produce more than twenty bales of cotton a year, so that at present prices he would not derive more than \$640.

Cotton-growing in other words at present prices and under the most favorable circumstances, doesn't return much above the average day-labor wages. Consider how much worse the case is if the farmer be a renter, under the necessity of giving a fourth or a third of his crop to the landlord. What chance has he to make a competence, or to accumulate a small sinking fund against those adversities to which farming is subject more than any other branch of industry? The best he can do is to keep even with the world, and to do even that he has well-nigh to enslave his family and stunt the growth of his children intellectually and physically. One bad crop season will put him in debt so deep that two or three seasons will no more than enable him to climb out.

So long as the cotton grower

is in debt he cannot be entirely free. The establishment of warehouses and the devisement of a system of financing may prove to be of some benefit to him; but the best system that human brain can devise is incapable of emancipating the cotton grower who is in debt. The fundamental problem, and the problem that must be solved if cotton-growing is not to be the cause of a degenerating civilization, is that of enabling the average farmer to get out of debt, and that is a problem worthy of the best thought that the South has.—Dallas News.

**MRS. STALLINGS IN DEFENSE  
OF HER CHARACTER COM-  
MENTS ON SUPT. LONG'S  
LETTER TO STATE SUPT. F.  
M. BRALLEY.**

Brady, Texas, Sept. 20, 1911.  
Prof. F. M. Bralley,  
Austin, Texas.

Dear Sir:

In virtue of the contention of  
which I learn Mrs. Stallings sets up  
in her appeal from the school board  
here, I beg to make a statement.

I understand that she contends  
that she was elected to the 7th grade  
and afterwards, Mr. Bell, the presi-  
dent of the Board, worked a scheme  
to get her out of the school, by hav-  
ing its board pass a resolution in-  
structing the Superintendent to place  
the teachers where he wanted them,  
and then requesting me to place her  
in a lower grade, thinking that she  
would not accept that place.

As to this contention I wish to say  
that the placing of the teachers by  
the Superintendent is an old custom  
at Brady, that Mr. Bell had never in-  
timated to me at any time, the plan  
of placing her in a lower grade, that  
Mr. Bell knew nothing of my plans  
until after I had informed one of the  
teachers that I wanted her to take  
the 7th grade, that I had told Mr.  
Rainbolt, a member of the Board,  
right after the close of school that I  
thought it best to change Mrs. Stal-  
lings, that I wanted her in the school  
but not in the 7th grade. I wish to  
say, however, that the only reason I  
recommended her re-election was to  
prevent just such a commotion as  
was brought about any way, and I  
placed her in that position, in which  
if she did not make good, she would  
certainly do the school as little harm  
as possible. Five members of the  
school board understand that she was  
not elected to any particular grade,  
it was my wish that she not be, as  
well as all who were elected at that  
meeting, except Mr. Wallace.

The only question involved in this  
whole matter, Mr. Bralley is one of  
discipline. She thought she was  
strong enough here to over-ride my  
wishes and defy my authority; and  
when she failed in that she and her  
husband have sought to keep feelings  
rife in the town. I gave the woman  
two chances to accept the position  
and when I last talked to her, she  
said it was not worth while to wait  
longer on that proposition for she  
would have nothing but the 7th  
grade. She said more. She said  
that her refusing to take the 3rd  
grade was not equivalent to resign-  
ing, that she would go to her friends  
with it.

When she went to her friends in  
way of a petition she found some-  
thing like 65 patrons of the school  
who signed it, and about 90 young  
men and boys in the town.

I hope you will see things as the  
Board does, Mr. Bralley, and sustain  
us in our attitude toward this woman  
in this matter.

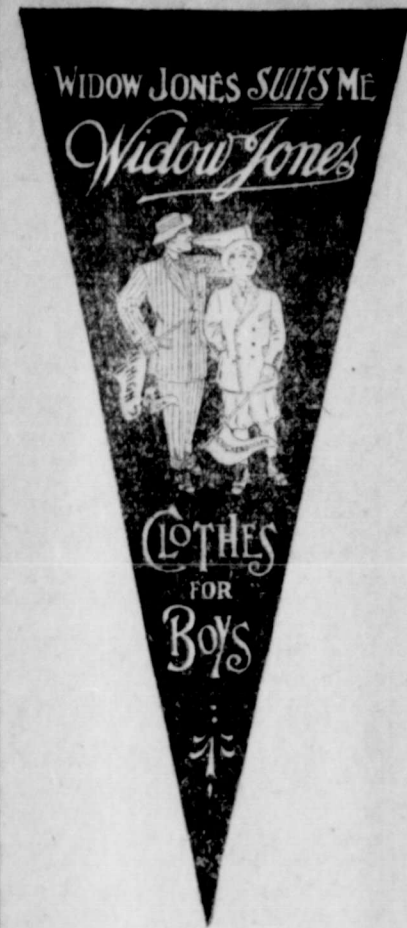

Now it would be ungenerous in me  
to say anything about Mr. Long's  
english, but I can only wonder what  
Superintendent Bralley thought of  
his letter beginning with the phrase,  
"In virtue," and closing with an ap-  
peal to him "to see things as the  
Board does and sustain us in our at-  
titude toward this woman in this  
matter." It is this attitude toward  
this woman that many of the best  
citizens of Brady object to, and not  
without reason.

It is not the State Superintendent's  
business to sustain Boards and Su-  
perintendent's in their prejudice  
against teachers, and I am sure Su-  
perintendent Bralley will see by Mr.  
Long's letter and the affidavits made  
by the Board and carried to Austin  
by Judge Harvey Walker for them,  
that prejudice is all they hold against  
me. However, it is only a question  
of contract that Mr. Bralley has to  
decide. It was very important that  
I sign a contract; so much so that I  
was requested by the secretary of the  
Board to sign at once and return.  
Yet there were teachers who did not  
sign a contract until last Friday, the  
end of the first month of school—  
taught one month without a con-  
tract. Now if this contract was  
legal and binding, is it not a fact  
that this Board has paid out public  
funds illegally. One teacher did not  
sign contract until she had arranged  
for her grade at the opening of  
school. She refused to take the  
work assigned her by Superintendent  
Long. Why did the Board not can-  
cel her contract? They canceled  
mine for the same thing of which  
she is guilty. Where is your justice?

On account of the misrepresenta-  
tions in the above letter, I desire to  
give to the people of Brady the fol-  
lowing statements and corrections.  
I contended in my appeal to the

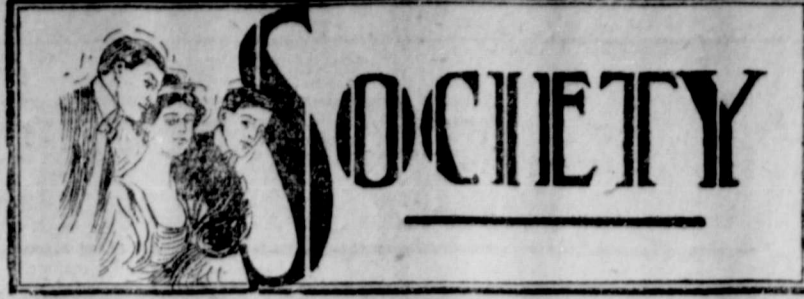

## Benham, The Shoe Man

State Superintendent that I was elected to the seventh grade work because I applied for that position and was informed that I had been unanimously elected, which fact is not only shown by the records of the Secretary of the board, but by the statements of two members and the oaths of five other members that voted for me.

The statement by me that Mr. Bell worked a scheme to put me out of the school was only stated by me as a belief (not a contention) founded on the fact that he had said to different parties that he was going to put me out of the school. I had no means of proving it a scheme, and did not assert it as a fact, but as an opinion, based upon the knowledge that he was opposed to me soon after he was elected a trustee, and some time before Mr. Wilson resigned.

Was it not confirmation of "my belief" when Mr. Long told a committee of gentlemen at the Brady National bank that there was a "scheme" to elect trustees to put me out of the school, but that he told Mr. Wallace that it would cause trouble in the school and Mr. Wallace thought so to. So he went and stopped it. Why did he stop it? He was asked by a gentleman present if he did not think that "such a scheme" would get out and the people would "fix his clock," when he answered that he did. Now here is evidence that "somebody" thought they could control a majority of the board of trustees easier than they could control the citizenship of Brady. Now who was this "somebody." Can anybody guess? A tree is to be known by its fruit, and sometimes sweet fountains send forth bitter waters.

Mr. Long says, "that the placing of the teachers by the Superintendent is an old custom in Brady." Now Mr. Long either knew, or could have known, if he had so desired, that this statement was untrue. To my certain knowledge this has not been the case for the three elections prior to the last, and Mr. Willoughby, who has perhaps served for a longer period of time as school trustee, than any man in Brady, says it was never the custom in Brady while he was a member of the Board—about ten years. The records of the board show that it has not been since 1902.

Mr. Long says that he told Mr. Rainbolt right after the close of school (school closed June 3rd) that he thought it best to change me. Again he says that five members of the school board understood that I was not elected to any particular grade, and that it was his wish that I should not be. How does that harmonize? The election of teachers took place on the 20th of May, and Mr. Rainbolt was one of "the five."

Mr. Long says he wanted me in the school, but not in the seventh grade. He wanted me in the school "to prevent just such a commotion as was brought about anyway." If his statement be true he is responsible for the commotion.

Just before the election of teachers, when Mr. Long was more concerned about his own election than any other question, he was making some inquiry as to whether or not, it would hurt his chances of re-election if he advocated my election (politics). Yet he says he is no politician. What he does he does for the good of the school, but he knew Mr. Bell was against me.

"I placed her in that position in which if she did not make good she would certainly do the school as little harm as possible." Now what do you think of that statement to the State Superintendent? That is not what he told me, or these people of Brady, who knew I would not do harm to their school, for many said it was not my loss but the community's loss. I defy him to go anywhere I have ever taught, and find where I have failed to make good, or ever did harm to any school. I have never yet been tried by any school board for improper conduct. It is the first time in my teaching that I have ever fallen into the hands of such a Board.

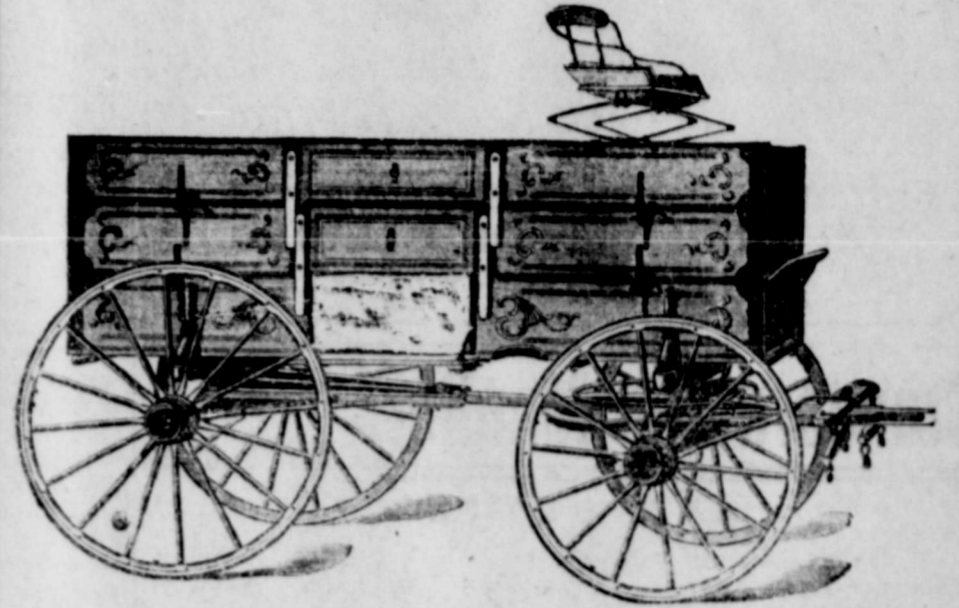

I have been used to dealing with men who knew how to appreciate me and my work.

Go where I have taught, meet the men with whom I have had dealings, see for yourself who they are and what they think of my standing as a teacher and a lady. I can go anywhere I have ever taught and if there is a vacancy in their school I can be unanimously elected. I wonder if Mr. Long can produce such a record. I never left a school except of my own accord.

"The only question involved in the whole matter, Mr. Bralley, is one of discipline." I suppose he refers here to disciplining the faculty, for my pupils will not bear him out in accusing me of permitting disorder in my class room, and I believe the members of the faculty will testify that no teacher tried harder to be agreeable and meet the requirements of her Superintendent than I did. Mr. Long knows I obeyed his every command.

"She thought she was strong enough here to over-ride my wishes and defy my authority." That is a thought that emanates from his own perverted imagination.

"She and her husband have sought to keep feelings rife in this town." Mr. Stallings tried to avoid having anything to do with school matters at Brady until Mr. Long's attack on my professional character. Last May when Mr. Stallings returned from Georgia, Mr. Long said that he had come back to Brady to get his job, and notwithstanding he has been told Mr. Stallings would not have the school, he refused to believe it, and I think this has had much to do with his fight against me; he desires to kill our influence in Brady.

As for me keeping feelings rife in this town, I have done nothing except in defense of my professional

character against unreasonable and unjust attacks made against me without cause, and this I promised to do from the beginning. Whatever "commotion" that has been caused has been brought about by an outraged citizenship, and it seems to me that what they have done to show Mr. Long that he was not the man for the place, would have caused him to seek more pleasant environments.

Mr. Long disrespectfully alludes to me as "the woman" and "this woman," for no other purpose, as I see it, but to impress Mr. Bralley that I am without social standing in my community, but Mr. Bralley, I am sure, will not take it that way. It seems to me that a gentleman would have at least alluded to me as Mrs. Stallings. Don't you think so?

About the petition. I did not go to my friends with a petition and Mr. Long knew it when he wrote this letter on September the 20th, as I had cause to refer to it in The Standard published August 22. He made the statement that ninety young men and boys signed the petition and only sixty-five patrons. I believe if he will ask some one who is acquainted with the parties who signed the petition, he will find about seventy-five patrons and only twenty-two young men, but most of these are tax paying voters. Only two I believe, signed the petition who were under twenty-one years of age—one of them assistant cashier of the State Bank and Trust Co., the other assistant bookkeeper for O. D. Mann & Sons, business boys both of whom are twenty years of age.
