A GLORIOUS RAIN FELL

BRADY AND VICINITY IS SOAKED.

Rain Was Very Heavy in the City—Show Crowd Gets Wetting.

A rain amounting to almost a cloudburst fell in Brady last Thursday afternoon, beginning about 2:30 and continuing, intermittently, until 9 o'clock in the evening. The rain was not general, however, varying from a heavy downpour to a light shower.

The rain came a short time after the opening of the 101 Ranch Wild West show, with an immense crowd in attendance, and the number who escaped a thorough drenching was exceedingly small. The grounds where the tents were erected was low, the water collecting in a good sized lake in the entrance, forcing the people to wade through water six or eight inches in depth, and it was a thoroughly bedraggled, though good natured throng who made their way back to the city. The night performance was rained out entirely.

Reports of the rain were furnished by the Brady Telephone Exchange as follows:

Melvin, big rain; Menard, only a good shower; Rochelle, good rain; Lohn, good shower; Waldrip, no rain; Voca, light shower; Mason, good rain.

According to the local government gauge the precipitation in Brady amounted to 1.9 inches.

County Court.

The regular October term of county court convened Monday. Judge Harvey Walker presiding. The criminal docket was taken up—there only being four cases on this docket. Two of these cases were continued and two tried.

In the case of the State vs. Jerry McCarty, charged with disturbing public worship, the defendant was found guilty and a fine of \$25.00 assessed.

The case of the State vs. Alex. Calliham on an aggravated assault charge, was on trial today.

This is the last case on the criminal docket and the civil docket will probably be taken up tomorrow. There are forty-one civil cases to be disposed of and a large per cent of them are jury cases.

A Visit to Brady.

Recently the News man spent a day in Brady and was pleasantly entertained by Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Schaeg, who have a pretty residence on College Hill, one of the nicest residence sections in the town. Early in the morning Mr. Schaeg took us for a drive over the town, going over the new bridge to the north side where the new union station is to be located. It was 5 or 6 years since the writer had been in that portion of the town, and we were of course very much surprised at the wonderful growth; the pretty homes, handsome residences, and even business houses are being built in that locality. The Brady of today is so different from that of a decade ago that one would never recognize the town of Brady as being the same except by the court house, which was wisely built to meet the requirements of the future and does credit to the rapidly growing town.

Brady has suffered, as have most of the western towns in the past two years, by the drouth, and the water supply of the town has proven quite a problem, but the latter will be solved, and with good crops the town will again take on new life. It is surprising to most of people the great amount of good farming land McCulloch county possesses, as it has long been believed that McCulloch lands were not much for farming, but the entry of the railroad into that section has developed it until it may now be considered quite a big agricultural county. Should Brady's second railroad prove as great a developer as the first, that town will make one of the busiest little cities in this section of Texas. A few good crop years and Brady will forget the little flurry of business depression she has experienced the past two years.

F. W. Henderson, vice president of the Brady National Bank, has a big farm a few miles from Brady, and it is said will make 100 bales of cotton on his farm. Just now he is having some difficulty in securing cotton pickers. Mr. Henderson and Jeff F. Montgomery, cashier of the above bank, are vitally interested in the success of the farmer, and will post themselves on the Campbell Soil Culture Method through the News' clubbing arrangement with Mr. Campbell.

D. R. Hardison, the secretary of the Business Club, was arranging some nice exhibits of fine fruits, vegetables, honey, and various products of McCulloch county for their fair that takes place this week, and the whole lot will then be taken to the Dallas fair. We were quite surprised at the fine showing these products make, and they disprove the assertion that good fruit cannot be raised there. Water is what is needed, and with an abundance of it any portion of Texas can produce anything.

Theo. Christianus, formerly of this place, has a nice little home in Brady, and has made a few profitable trades in real estate, but like most people who have once known the joys of living in such a county as Mason, he is anxious to come back, and will be here along with the scores of other Masonites who will come back with the railroad. 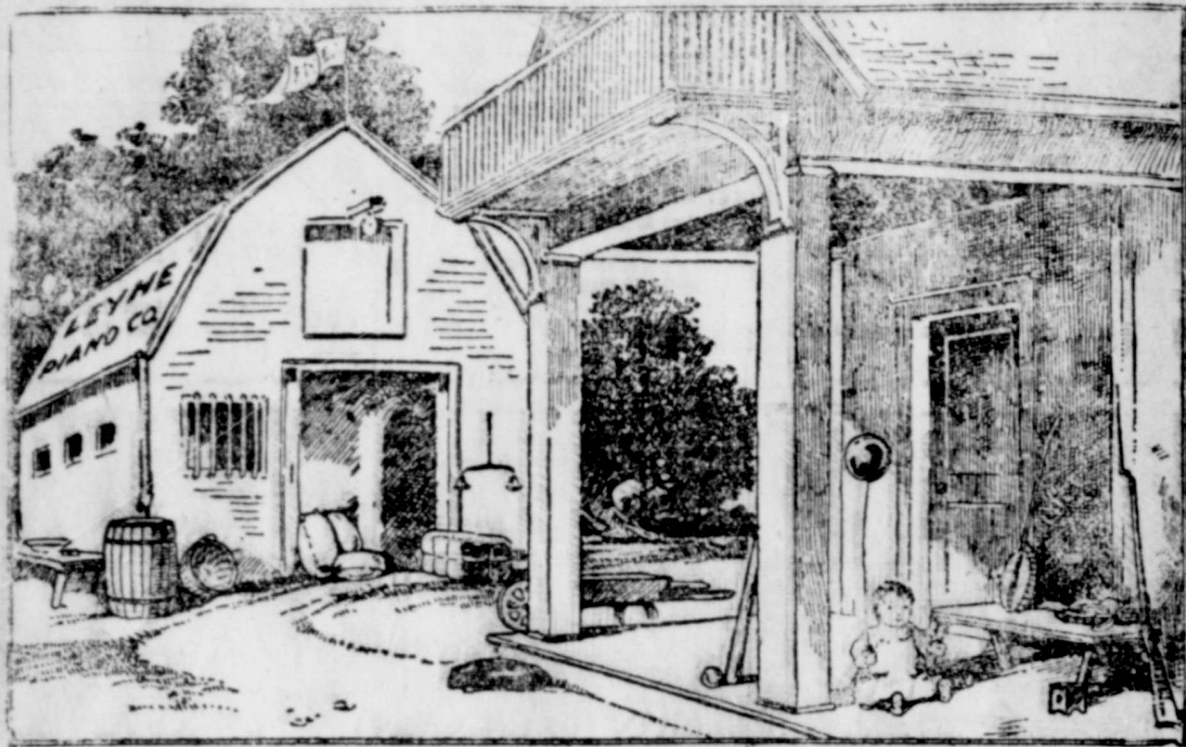

MEETING TONIGHT.

City Council Will Hold Important Session.

The city council will meet tonight in regular session and several important matters will be disposed of at the meeting, chief among which will be the waterworks matter.

The inventory of the plant of the Brady Water & Light Co., has been received from Engineer John B. Hawley, the sale of the bonds has been contracted and the funds will be available in a week or ten days, and it is to be hoped that active operations will be begun immediately.

A matter over which there has been some controversy at former meetings, and which will probably receive attention at the meeting will be a petition from Mann Bros., for a permit to erect a brick veneer building on the lot now occupied by the Lyric theatre. Some of the aldermen contend that this class of building does not conform to the provisions of the building ordinance, while others say that it does. The ordinance in question provides that no building shall be erected in the fire limits the walls of which are not constructed of brick, stone or concrete, and some of the councilmen claim that a veneered wall does not conform to this class of building.

Another matter which will receive attention will be an ordinance providing for an annual occupation tax of \$100 on peanut, popcorn and confection vendors on the streets, which was passed by the council about a year ago. 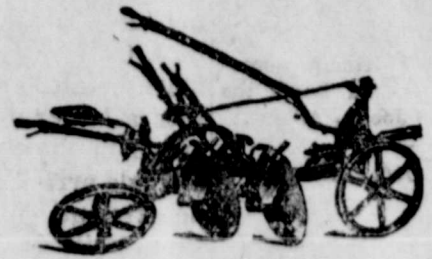
