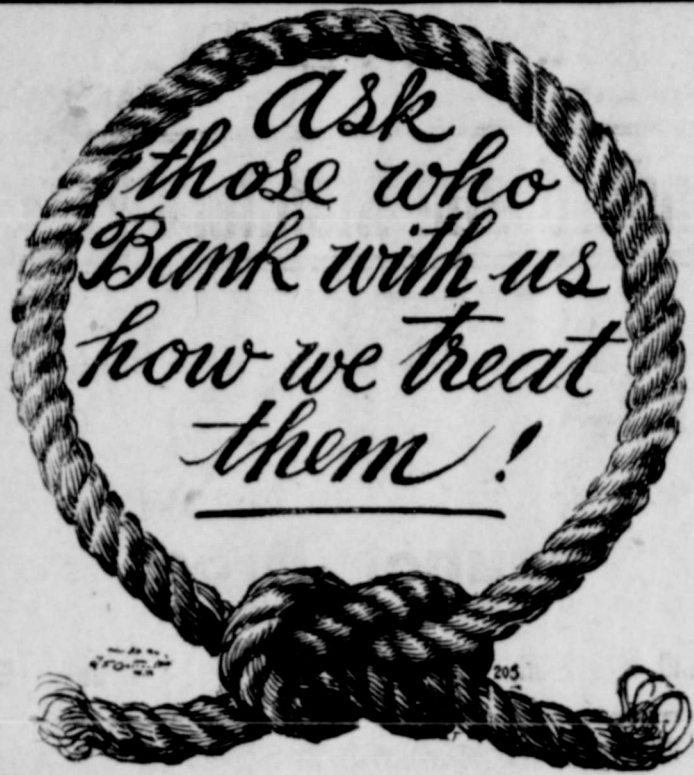

Tracklaying.

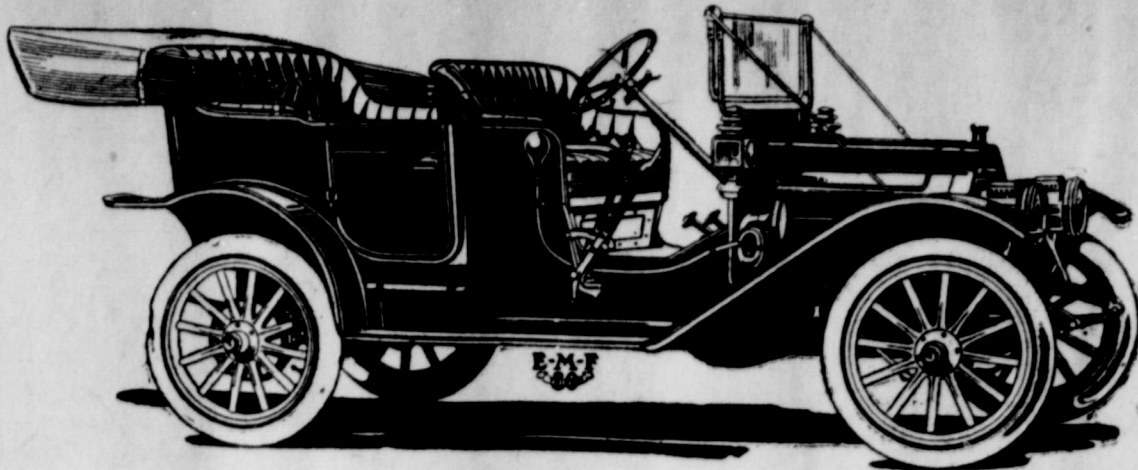

E-M-F "30"

73,000 Miles! A Record by An E-M-F "30" and Still Run-

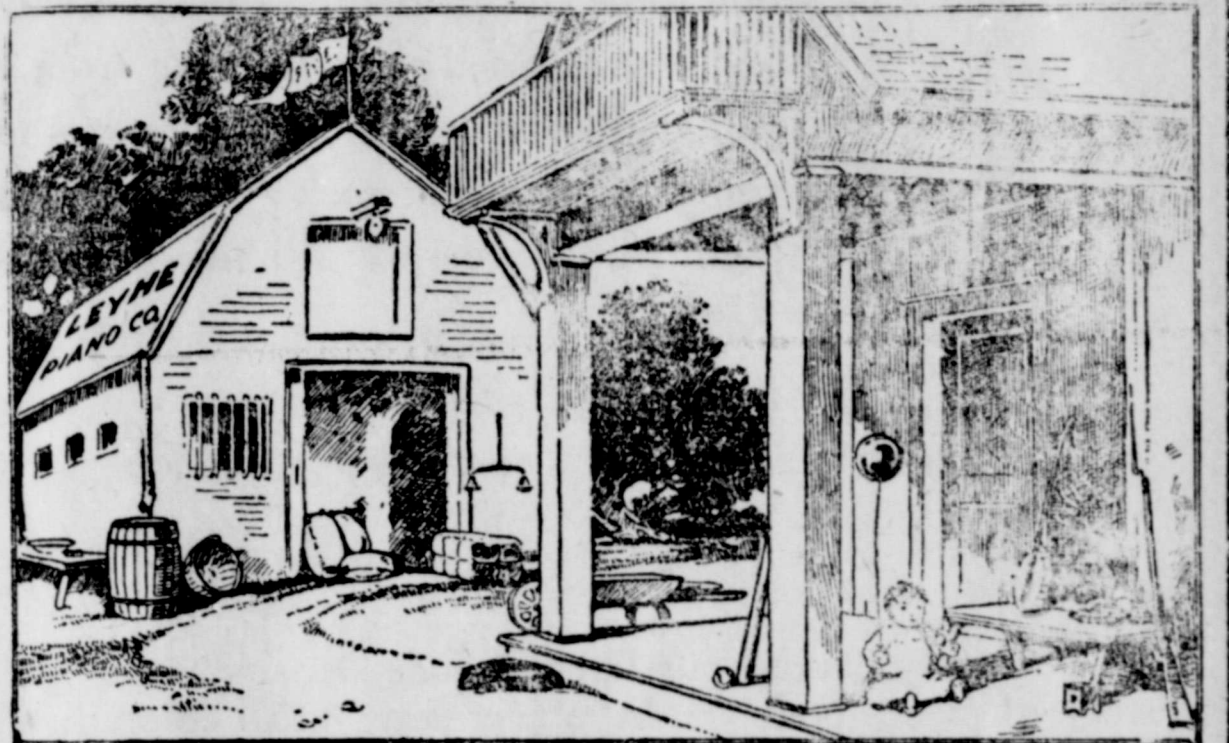

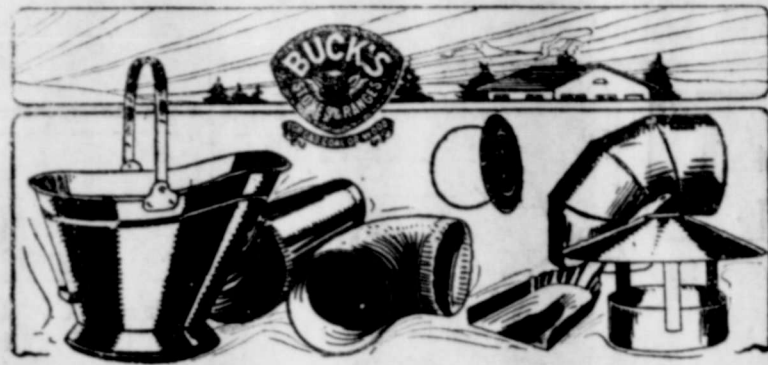

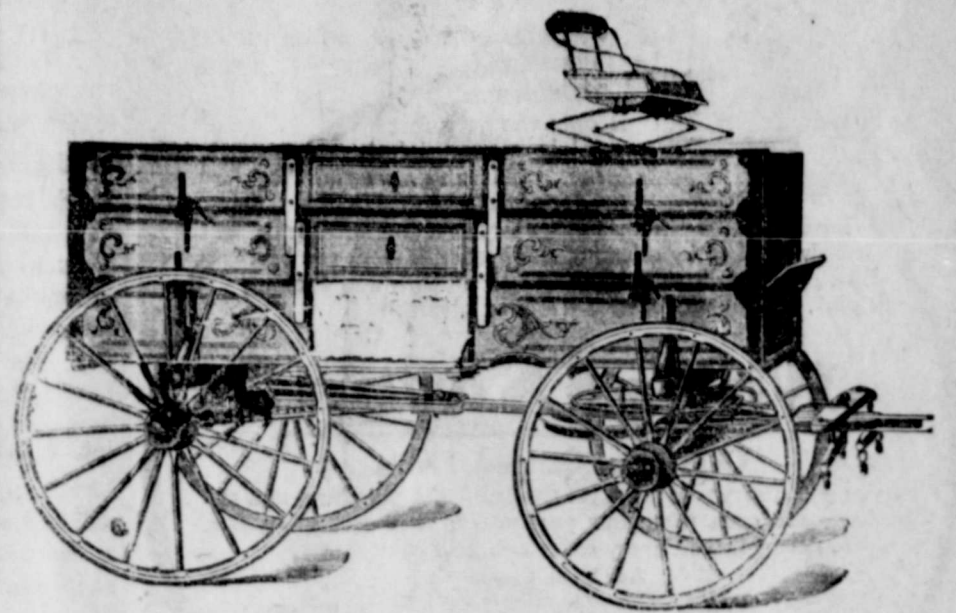
