## MAY TRACK COMPLETED

**BROWNWOOD N. & S. TRACK LAYING FINISHED.**

Believed That Within a Week the Frisco Will Be Hauling Cotton Out of May.

After having been delayed just a little more than a month on account of the scarcity of labor, the Brownwood North & South road has been completed into the city of May, twenty miles north of Brownwood. May will be the terminus of the road for the present, but within the next two years it will be extended to connect with the Central at some point farther on and probably will go to the T & P. The coming of the road to May is but the realization of the fondest hopes of the May people. They have been patient in their efforts to secure railway connections and now that they have this connection it is expected that the little village will soon become a city of importance.

It is unofficially announced that the Frisco will run an excursion into May about the middle of next month.—Brownwood Bulletin, Oct. 26th.

## STRIKE BIG GAS FLOW

OVER ONE MILLION CUBIC FEET EVERY 24 HOURS.

Most Important Discovery Ever Made From Commercial View—Near Trickham.

The discovery of a strong flow of gas that was struck at a depth of 951 feet in a well near Trickham, Coleman county, is causing considerable excitement in that community. While it was known that important developments were anticipated in connection with the drilling of the well, it was not until Saturday that the news of the big strike became public.

The Trickham fields are but twelve miles from the Lohn oil fields owned by Meers Bros. of this city, and are on a direct line with the local field. Consequently the discovery is of great interest to local parties interested in the development of the Lohn fields, and gives rise to increased hopes of making a big strike whenever the Lohn fields are developed.

The news report of the discovery of the gas at Trickham, as printed in the Fort Worth Record, follows:

San Angelo, Oct. 28.—What undoubtedly is the most important discovery ever made in West Texas from a commercial standpoint, is the big flow of gas struck near Trickham, Coleman county, at a depth of 951 feet. News of the strike was brought here today, and it is reported a company will be formed to pipe the gas to San Angelo and other cities.

The flow is 1,200,000 cubic feet every twenty-four hours, and it was with greatest difficulty that it was capped by a Shreveport expert.

The discovery was made on land controlled by Fred W. Turner, who has the mineral lease on 15,000 acres.

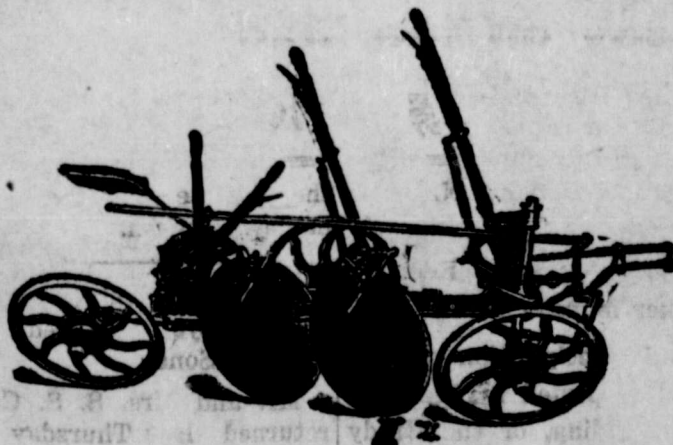
