### INVESTIGATE WELLS.

#### Committee Appointed to Examine Trickham Oil Field.

The Trickham oil field has been receiving considerable attention of late, not only at home, but from every town within a large radius. More especially has interest become manifest since the recent strike of a fine flow of gas. In order to ascertain at first hand just what the value of the oil and gas finds might be, and to get a line on this development, the Brady Commercial club last week appointed a committee of W. D. Crothers, J. F. Montgomery and Thos. Bell to investigate the Trickham oil field. The committee planned to make a trip to the fields this week, but the unfavorable weather has unexpectedly detained them.

The proximity of the Trickham oil field to the Lohn oil field is a point that has been pointed out, and strengthens the belief that the development of the local field would bring rich returns. The Lohn oil field has been receiving much attention of late, both from local and outside capital, and it is not at all unlikely that development of the field may begin at an early date.

The Coleman North and South railway project is again bobbing into prominence, and has been doing so at intervals for a number of years past. 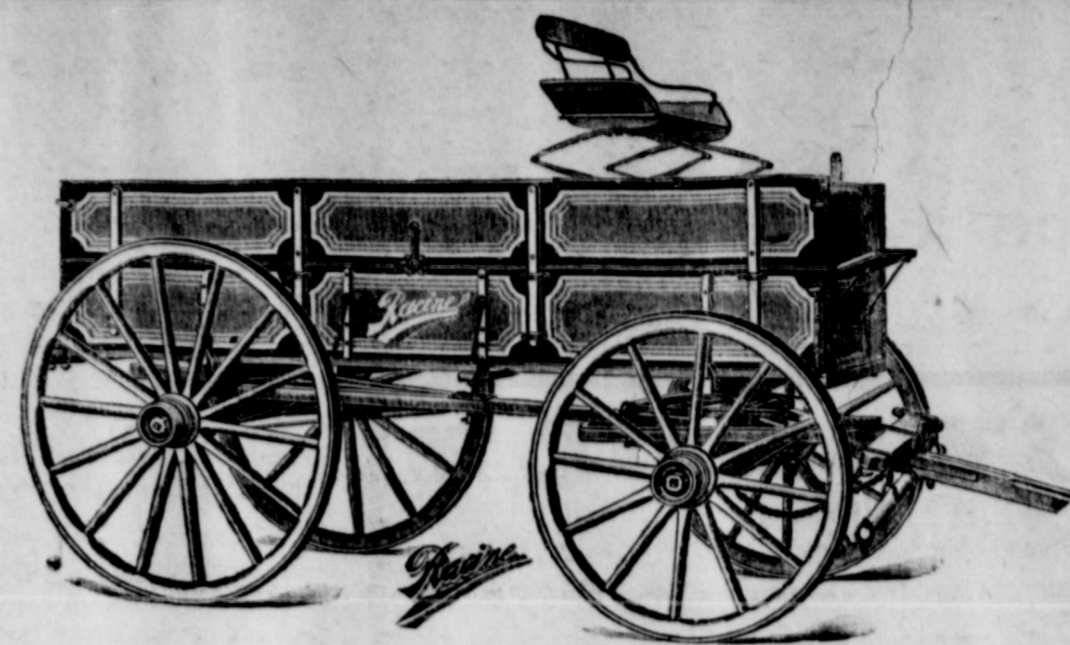

We don't want goods in bulk any more. We want them put up in small, dainty packages with much tinfoil, paraffined paper, and fine printing. Our demand is met, but we pay the bill.

The old-fashioned pantry, large enough to hold supplies for a month or two, has given place to the kitchen cabinet with a space for a few days' supply. This means that we buy in smaller quantities, necessitating more labor and expense in ordering and delivering and higher prices.

We are not willing to call at the baker's for our bread, but order it through the grocer, and, of course, we must pay him for handling it.

### WHO IS TO BLAME?

The disparity between what the consumer pays and what the producer gets for food products continues to be a theme of interest to the public. William Hope, a South American cattle man and wheat "king" from Buenos Ayres, who is now visiting this country, asks two pertinent questions. He wants to know why Britons who ship their wheat from America pay only 3 cents for a pound loaf of bread, while Americans in the midst of wheat fields, pay 5 cents for a scant pound loaf; and why the Briton pays only 10 cents for meat, while we, who export meat, pay 20 cents? Mr. Hope answers his own question with the one word—middlemen.

This is interesting, but it doesn't solve the problem. We have middlemen, many of them, but they are here in response to our demand. We are too busy to take a basket and go to market and carry home the day's supply of fruit and vegetables and insist on ordering them through the grocer. Deprived of retail customers the producer has quit the market and sells to commission men, who in turn supply the retailers, who sell to us. Plainly, the people are responsible for these two middlemen.

Out of each dollar the consumer pays for food the farmer gets but 44 cents, the remaining 56 cents goes to the agencies that transport the food, prepare it for sale and deliver it at the consumer's door.

Doubtless there are too many middlemen and it may be that they charge too much for their services, but they are in business at our request and the unnecessary ones will go out of business when we are willing to perform ourselves the service they now perform for us.—Fort Worth Record.

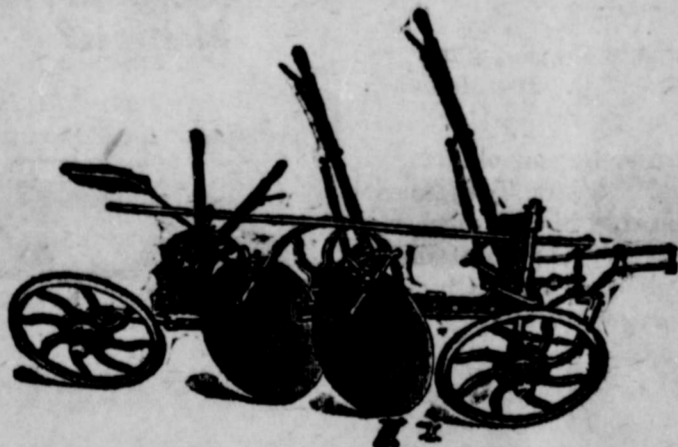
