TWO MEXICANS KILLED

SHOOTING AT DANCE ON COLTON RANCH.

Mexican Flees After Shooting and Has Not Yet Been Located.

Two Mexicans dead and a third a fugitive from justice is the outcome of a dance following a wedding, at the Mexican colony on the Colton ranch, about nine miles west of Brady.

The shooting occurred about 4 o'clock Sunday morning, but no alarm was given by the Mexicans. It was about 10 o'clock Sunday morning before Sheriff Wall learned of the tragedy, S. W. Colton phoning in the news, and at the same time Dr. J. G. McCall was called to the scene. They found Cruz Rodriguez dead, his neck having been broken by a bullet from a 45 pistol, while another ball had entered his body. Antonio Carter, the other Mexican was found to be fatally wounded, he having also been shot through the neck, the ball being extracted from the opposite side of where it had entered. He died last night. The Mexican who did the shooting, Juan Espinoza, fled immediately after the shooting, and so far no trace of him has been found.

M. C. and W. D. Ludwick, accompanied by their families, were in Brady today returning to their home at Pear Valley from San Antonio where they visited their brother, and also saw another brother for the first time in twelve years, and his wife for the first time in forty years. This latter brother and his wife were returning to their home in California from a visit to the old home in Missouri, and his visit to San Antonio was made the occasion of a family reunion. One brother, living in Walla Walla, Wash., was unable to attend.

Pioneer Citizen Dead.

John D. Miller, one of McCulloch county's oldest and most highly respected citizens passed away Sunday at 12:30. The deceased had been in feeble health for the past five or six months, and death resulted from general decline. The funeral took place Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock from the residence of his son, Henry Miller, services being conducted by Rev. J. T. King, and the funeral being in charge of the local confederate camp. Interment was made in Brady cemetery.

Mr. Miller was born in Virginia 71 years ago, coming to Texas in 1850, and for the past 29 years had made his home in McCulloch county. For a number of years he engaged in the grocery and dry goods business, being located on the east side, but lost his entire stock by fire. Later he engaged in the transfer business, in which line he continued up to about three years ago. He was an ex-confederate veteran, having served the 23rd Texas Regiment, and was both wounded and captured during that time, being held a prisoner for a year and a half at Camp Chase, and securing his release only at the close of the war.

Mr. Miller was a devoted Christian, having been a member of the Methodist church the past twelve or more years. He was resigned to death, and said he was ready to go.

Two children survive him, Henry Miller by his first marriage, and Mrs. R. A. Rutherford, Jr., by his second.

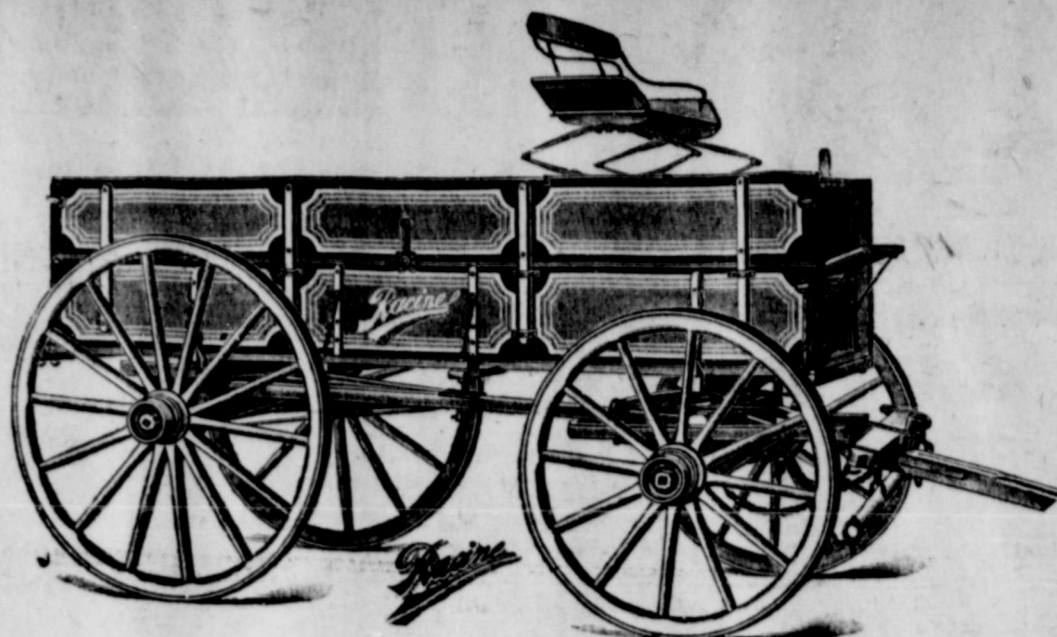

DON'T FORGET.

That you owe taxes and if they are not paid before the first of Feb. 1912, there will be a penalty of 10 per cent added. Which is in compliance with the law governing the collection of taxes.

Later I will be at the various places in the county, as has heretofore been the custom, to collect taxes, for the convenience of those who prefer not to come to Brady for that purpose.

If you wish to pay your taxes through the mail you can do so, but I can not issue your poll tax receipt except you appear in person, or to an agent with a written application signed by you. The application must be as follows, or of a similar form:

Young men who become 21 years of age before the election at which they intend to vote, but whose poll taxes are not due and payable before the election, must take out exemption certificates whether they live in cities of 10,000 inhabitants or not, men who are 60 years old and men who are blind, deaf and dumb, or those who have lost a hand or foot or are permanently disabled from doing manual must take out exemption certificates only when they live in cities of 10,000 inhabitants or more (see Terrell Election Law, Secs. 12 to 29).

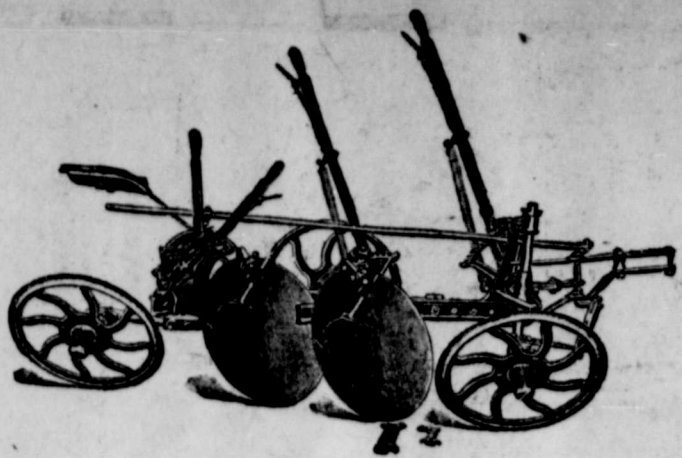
