THERMOMETER REGISTERS  
NINE ABOVE ZERO.

Mercury Drops 33 Degrees  
Within An Hour Saturday  
Morning—Second Spell.

Folks that fail to keep posted on weather reports and predictions, and also those who have lost faith in such, had the laugh turned on them last Saturday morning when the thermometer dropped from 51 degrees at about eight o'clock to 18 degrees at nine. Many business men had come to town without overcoats or other precautions, the temperature being mild, but when the norther came about nine there was a wild scramble for warmer clothes, and for warmer fires. Saturday night was the coldest of the season, the government gauge registering nine degrees above zero.

Sunday was considerably warmer, and Sunday afternoon was quite pleasant, but Monday came very near being a duplicate of Saturday's weather. Out-of-town folks who were obliged to come to town did not tarry long, and town folk remained close at home. The cold wave was general all over Texas, and out in the Panhandle the weather was especially severe, and considerable suffering among cattle being reported.

### To the Woodmen of the World, Valley Camp No. 452, Greeting.
