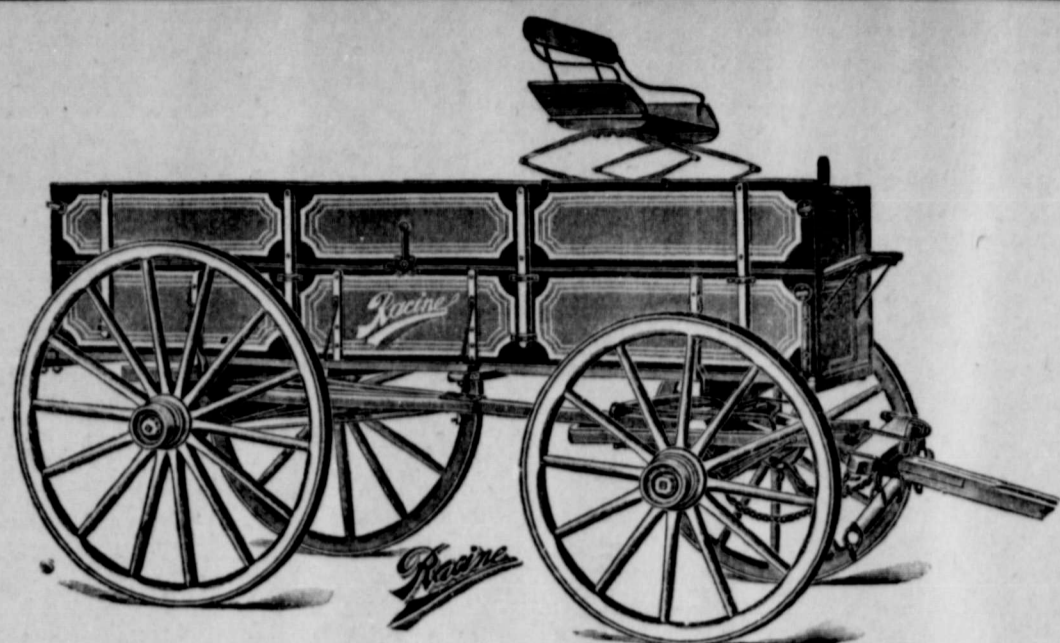

McCulloch County Enterprise

W. J. West was up from Rochelle yesterday to have some stationary printed, and incidentally to pay his taxes. Mr. West is this year making his home on the J. M. Williams place, which he purchased a month or two ago, and from there will not only superintend the Williams farm, but his farm at Lakeview, San Saba county, and also his Lohn farm.

Mr. West believes every farm ought to have a name, and everything sent out from the farm should be advertised as coming from that farm. His San Saba county farm is named Lakeview, and J. I. Ellis has charge; his Lohn farm is called Loneoak and W. G. Kelly will look after the place this year, while his new Rochelle farm is called Artesia, and will be under the personal supervision of Mr. West. The total acreage of the three places is 1,008, of which 800 acres are in cultivation.

Last year Mr. West successfully conducted both the Lakeview and the Loneoak farms, making over a half bale to the acre on the former, or to be more exact, 104 bales off 200 acres, while the Loneoak made something over 40. Besides, he raised enough feed to do him. He believes in using the best seed obtainable and gives this feature particular attention. As a proof of the correctness of his idea, he states that the land adjoining his Lakeview farm, and considered equally as good, if not better, produced but 40 bales off 110 acres, whereas he secured 104 off 200.

Mr. West sowed 50 acres of oats during Christmas week, and is wondering how it stood the freeze. He states he used a new method in sowing, that may possibly have protected the oats from the freeze. His plan was to go in the field with a 12-inch shovel, plowing just as deep as it would go, and letting the stocks of the plow, the hind shovels having been removed, drag just enough dirt over the oats to cover it. Some parties are inclined to poke fun at Mr. West's plan, but as he was the originator of a very successful method to prevent hillsides from washing, that of terracing the hillsides, we are inclined to the belief that his new oat sowing plan may have some merit. At least we expect to believe until the contrary has been proven. Mr. West says if his plan succeeds, he will know how to sow oats any season in the year.

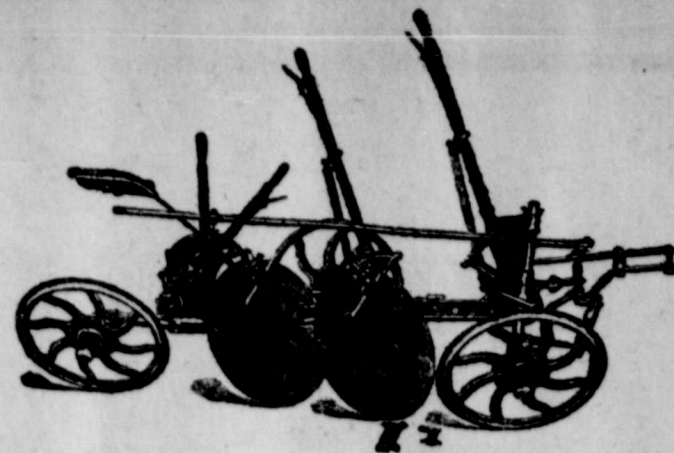
