ROAD WORK WILL BEGIN

COLEMAN ROAD WILL BE FIRST IN LINE.

Work of Getting Roads in Shape for Road Machinery to Start Next Thursday.

W. Daugherty, who will superintend the construction of the good roads in Road District No. 1, arrived yesterday from Taylor and is making preparations to begin work about the first of the month. Work will be started on the Coleman road west of the bridge over Brady creek, and will be confined to getting the road in shape for the road grading machinery which is expected to arrive some time this week. Other preliminary work will be the stripping of the gravel pits and getting them in readiness.

Mr. Daugherty reports that he has located a splendid gravel pit on Live Oak creek, and that the gravel there will be admirably suited for surfacing the roads. He is very optimistic over the possibilities of building good roads in the district, and thinks the cost per mile will not be as great as had been apprehended.

DALLAS ROAD BONDS.

Are Sold for Par and Accrued Interest.

The county commissioners, through County Judge John L. Young, yesterday afternoon sold the remaining \$200,000 of road and bridge bonds issued last year. The bonds were sold to W. N. Coler & Co., of New York City, who bought \$300,000 of the \$500,000 issue several weeks ago.

The county received par value and accrued interest for the bonds. County Judge John L. Young made the sale and the county will have no commission to pay. Judge Young, through his efforts, disposed of the entire \$500,000 issue and saved the county a large sum in commissions, which would have been paid if the sale had been made through bond brokers.—Dallas News.

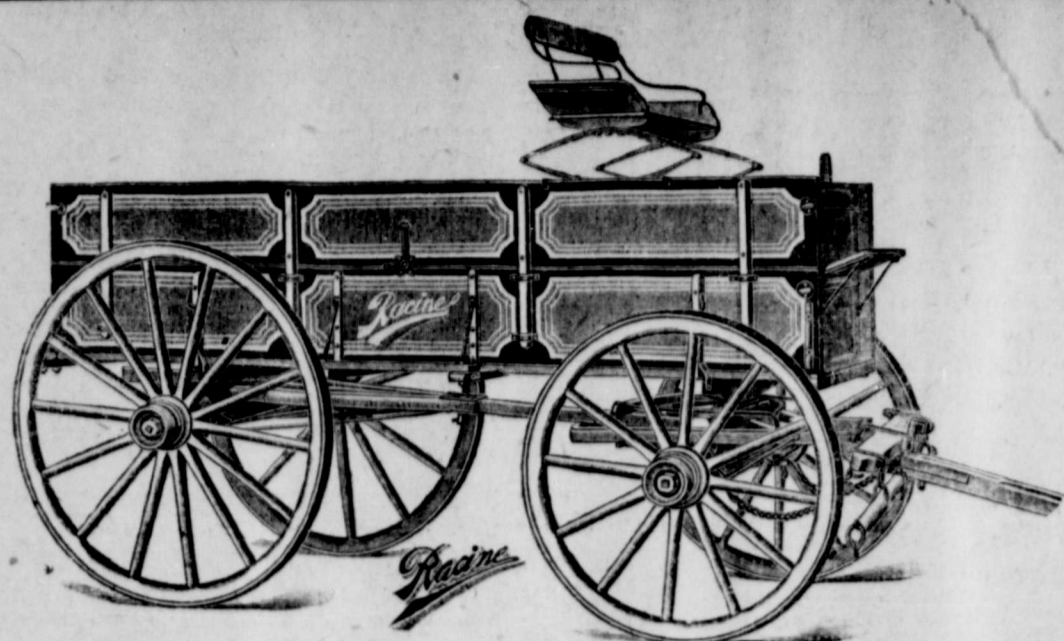

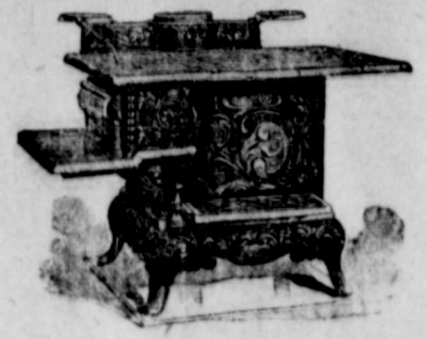

LOST CREEK ECHOES.

Voca, Texas, Jan. 27.

Editor Brady Standard:

Well, the Echoes have not been heard for some time, but if you will take time to listen for a minute you can hear them ring.

The weather has been fine for several days and work has been turned off in a hurry. Farming is under big headway; the old Mother Earth is being torn up to a finish. More flat-breaking of land is being done than usual and done better. Perhaps the cause is due to the efforts of the farm demonstrators that we have had in McCulloch county the last year, or to the more scientific farming. The more prosperous farmers and better times, better people and a better McCulloch.

I well remember the time when fifteen or twenty acres was considered a big farm. The men scratched around with one pony with a home-made, single stock plow, some times planted their corn with a hoe, and, by the way, I must tell you that in the year '76 or '77 I was helping a man plant corn. He had a yoke of steers. He took one steer and opened the furrow and had his wife to drop the corn and I took the other steer and, with a home-made, single stock, with a board on the foot, went down the open furrow and covered the corn. About 11 o'clock on a warm day in March a heel fly struck my steer and away he went and left me standing in the middle of a row, and what he did for my plow and board was a plenty.

But these were good, old happy days. I like to recall them to mind, when the woods were open and free, teeming with wild cattle, antelope, deer and turkey.

So far as I know, the first bale of cotton that was raised in McCulloch county was raised in the year 1874; was hauled to San

Saba and ginned. The land is still being cultivated, and has been every year since then, and a few years before that, and it still produces without ever being fertilized—at least 40 years in constant use. Is there any place on earth that can make a better record?

I guess this will be enough of the past for the present.

The McCulloch county farm demonstrator, Mr. Griffin, was here visiting among the farmers last week.

Mr. W. E. Reed is building a fine residence on his place.

J. J. Armor has been trying some fine cotton this year. He says it turned out 38 per cent lint net.

Thos. S. Wood and son, Leonard, of Brady, came down on the creek Wednesday, and as usual, landed just fifteen squirrels, and returned Thursday. They were the guests of D. H. Henderson.

This spring-like weather makes the farmers begin to think that planting time is close at hand.

I do not wish to advise, neither do I feel competent, but past experiences has taught me many lessons. I believe that diversified farming will be more extensively practiced this year than ever before, which is a good thing to do, but before we plant we should study well the markets, as well as the market values. There are many paying crops besides cotton; in fact, cotton is no paying crop considering the amount of labor it requires to make and gather.

There are two things, as I see it, that beautiful, bountiful Brady is lacking and will hold the farmers to cotton until we get them. They are, first, a canning factory, and second, a peanut factory. This country would become famous for both these crops if we had a market. I don't think the world can beat this part of McCulloch county for both of these crops.
