## GIVEN LIFE SENTENCE

### MEXICAN PLEADS GUILTY AND ESCAPES NOOSE.

#### Cottrell Case Postponed Until Next Term of Court—Jury Out on Edmondson Case.

Short shrift was made of the case against the Mexican, Tiburcio Hernandez, charged with the murder of a Mexican woman a few months ago. While the case had been set for Tuesday, the Mexican Monday indicated his desire to plead guilty to the charge, and accordingly his case was the first to be taken up. The jury returned a verdict of murder in the first degree and recommended a life sentence, which punishment the Court inflicted.

The crime of the Mexican was a most atrocious one. On Sunday, January 21st, he shot down Genoveva Rodrigues in cold blood because she refused to give up her intention of going out on a ranch to cook for a family. In attempting to escape, and while resisting arrest, the Mexican was shot by Officer Oscar Latta, the wound necessitating amputation of the left arm.

The death of J. W. Hopkins occurred last Friday morning. Mr. Hopkins was taken suddenly ill last Monday night with spinal meningitis, and from the first, his case was reported serious, and grave fears were entertained as to his recovery. He was 67 years of age, and has been a resident of Brady for the past seven years, being well known all over the county by reason of being proprietor of Hopkins Wagon yard, in the east end of town up to the time of his death. The funeral took place Friday, interment being made in the Brady cemetery. Mr. Hopkins is survived by two sisters and two brothers, all of whom live in West Virginia, except one brother, B. E. Hopkins, who lives at Goldthwaite. Mr. Hopkins was attended during his illness by his niece, who came over Tuesday from Brownwood.

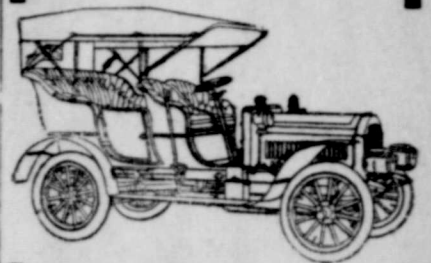

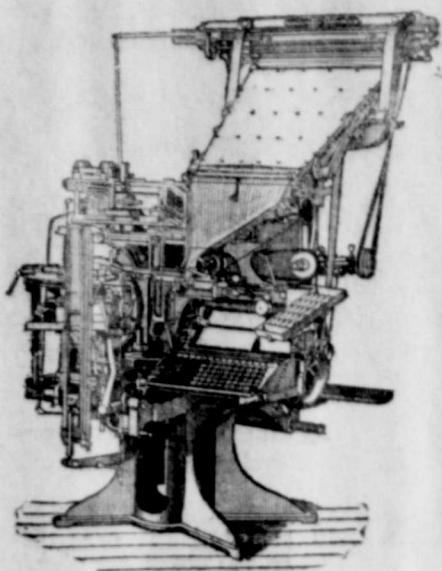

Two of the small pox patients in the Onion Gap community have been claimed by death, Mrs. Polly A. Fuller and her 4-months-old babe. Mrs. Fuller died last Saturday and the babe passed away this morning. This leaves but one case of small pox, that of Mrs. Fuller's 7-year-old daughter, who, at last reports, was doing nicely, with every chance for recovery. A 2-year-old child in the same family was reported ill with fever, but the attendants said her indisposition was caused from swallowing a marble.

Mrs. Fuller's home was in Fort Worth, she having arrived in the Onion Gap community with her children for a visit to her mother, Mrs. Mary E. Fraime, just a few days prior to being taken ill. She was 30 years of age. Interment was made at the place of death. An attendant has been secured for the place, which is under strict quarantine, and every want of the people under quarantine is being looked after.

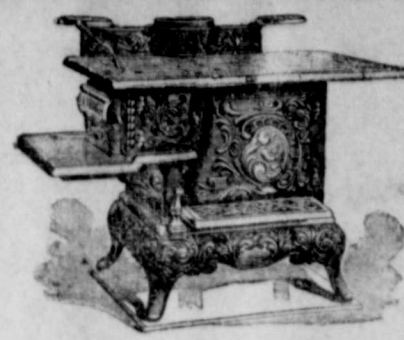

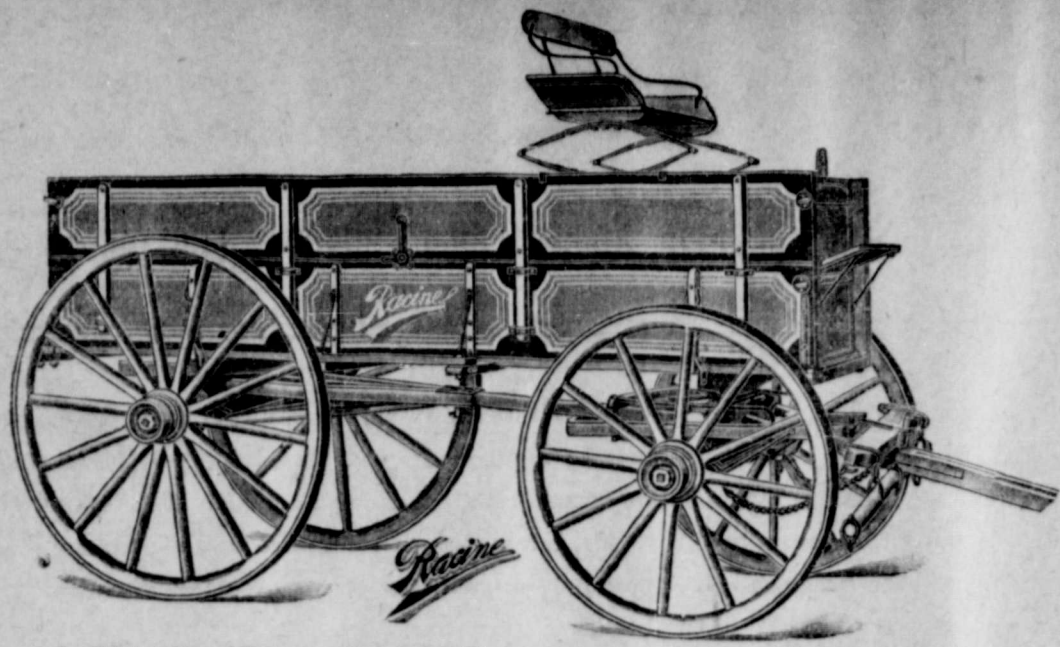

### SAN SABA SAYINGS.

From the News.

Mrs. Elizabeth Wood, of Richland Springs, died very suddenly at the home of her niece near Holt, Sunday, Feb. 18, 1912. The body was buried Wednesday in the "Old Big Uncle" grave yard, west of Richland Springs, Rev. W. M. Chapman conducting the funeral services.

G. J. Gray, a wealthy ranchman, of Cherokee, was painfully, though not seriously hurt in a runaway while coming to San Saba last Thursday. Mr. Gray had the left arm broken near the wrist, the bones of the hand broken and crushed, some teeth knocked loose and one side of his face badly skinned and bruised.

Dr. W. S. Sanderson drove into a loose telephone wire Sunday evening and was thrown from his buggy and the top of the buggy torn off completely. The doctor was returning from a call west of town. The wind was very high and the doctor was pretty well wrapped up and was driving at a rapid gait. The high winds had blown down a telephone pole near the residence of H. R. Harkey, in West End. The horse passed under the wire before the doctor saw it. He ducked his head, but the wire caught the top of the buggy and jerked it off and he was thrown out under the buggy. Fortunately he held to the lines and called to the horse who stopped and no damage was done other than the breaking of the top of the buggy.

Prof. G. H. Hagan was notified by phone Saturday night that he had been unanimously selected as the head of the summer normal faculty at Brady. The election came altogether unsolicited and the first Prof. Hagan knew of his name being considered was the notification by the county superintendent of McCulloch county and A. B. Reagan, members of the committee having in charge the normal work. Recently the attention of the editor was called to an article contributed by Prof. Hagan and published in the Dallas News and the Texas School Journal some fifteen years ago in which he advocated the very plans of organization which the state department of education and the Conference for Educa-

tion are now urging as reforms in the school system of Texas. Brady has made no mistake. Prof. Hagan will make good. The summer normal, which belongs to the first series, will be a success.

### ANOTHER OIL WELL.

No. 4 Brought in Saturday in the Lohn Field.

Saturday at noon the fourth oil well was brought in at Lohn by Meers Bros. & Bannister, and the well is said to be a fine one, being entirely free of salt water. The well stood 112 feet in oil, and hopes are high that it will prove a good producer.

The local oil field is attracting the attention of oil men in all parts of the state, as well as other states, and scarcely a week passes but what some oil men visit Brady for the purpose of making a personal investigation of the field. Probably the most interested, as well as interesting, visitor was Mr. A. F. Denison, who was in the city Monday and Tuesday. Mr. Denison is well remembered by many of the older citizens as the man who drilled several of the holes in the Lohn field seven years ago, and when operations were abandoned at that time, he still expressed his confidence in the field. Since leaving here, Mr. Denison has drilled wells in all the principal oil fields of Texas, and at present is drilling wells at Electra for the Corsicana Oil Refining Co. with remarkable success. During all these years, though, he has always had in mind that he would some day return to Brady and try out a well with a deep well rigging. Consequently when he met W. D. Crothers in Houston a few days ago and learned of the recent developments he decided it was a good time to pay us a visit. Unfortunately the rainy weather prevented his going out to Lohn, but he had lost none of his enthusiasm when he took the afternoon Santa Fe passenger enroute to Electra.

In speaking to Mr. Denison about the field he said, "I am greatly interested in the wells, and always have been from the time I left here, and I have always had an idea that I would some day return and try for a deep well. The wells are the only object of my present visit. Should the parties at present interested in the wells, fail in their efforts to secure deep well rigging, I am confident I could secure one for them, and will be glad to lend any assistance in my power."
