FIRE AT WALDRIP.

Stock and Building of M. J. Hutto Destroyed Friday.

The stock of general merchandise and building of M. J. Hutto at Waldrip was completely destroyed by fire last Friday morning. The fire started between 2 and 3 o'clock, and by the time it was discovered had gained great headway and was beyond control. The fire originated in the southwest corner of the building, the cause being unknown. Mr. Hutto estimates his loss at between \$7,500 and \$8,000, with \$3,000 insurance.

THIRD CASE.

Mary Batey Develops Spinal Meningitis Sunday.

Brady's third case of spinal meningitis was reported Sunday, the patient being Mary, the 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Batey. A quarantine was at once established about the place as well as about those who had been exposed. Like the first two cases, the Batey case was merely sporadic, the child not having attended school or having been exposed in any manner. The child is reported as responding nicely to the serum treatment and is getting along nicely. Her case is a very pronounced one, although not a serious one; in fact, it seems to be no more severe than that of the little Tindel girl.

The quarantines at both the Tindel home and the J. W. Hopkins residence have been raised.

PRACTICALLY READY FAT STOCK SHOW

Preparations For the Sixteenth Annual Exhibit

ARE VIRTUALLY FINISHED

Premium List, Which Totals Some Thirty Thousand Dollars, Bound to Attract a Mighty Array of the Leading Exhibitors.

J. A. Stafford, secretary-manager of the National Feeders' and Breeders' Show, announces that practically all preparations have been completed for the sixteenth annual exhibit, which will be held at the stockyards, North Fort Worth, March 18-23, 1912, and it will from every standpoint far surpass all previous livestock shows held in the southwest.

The premium list, which this year totals about \$30,000 covering more than 1500 prizes, will attract more exhibitors from a larger area than were ever before gathered together in this section of the country. This means that where there were six thousand exhibits last year, there will be fully eight thousand in 1912, and these exhibits will represent the cream of the pure-bred herds of the United States. A strong inducement is also being offered to prospective exhibitors in the form of greatly increased facilities many improvements having been added to all departments.

The preliminary catalogue, which has already been issued, covers all standard breeds of horses, mules, breeding and beef cattle, sheep and hogs, is the most creditable classification booklet ever published by this institution. The various livestock breeders' associations are again offering liberal premiums for winners in their respective classes, and many other special prizes are being offered by the packing houses and other firms and individuals.

Aside from being the largest educational exposition of its kind in the southwest, the Fat Stock Show has come to be known by the stockmen throughout the entire west as the greatest sale show in America. For years the farmers and cattle men of Texas and surrounding territory, have looked upon "Fat Stock Show Week" as their annual vacation-time; the one week of the year that they can drop their work, forget their affairs at home, and take their families to Fort Worth for a grand celebration. They know that this is their one opportunity of the year to see the largest and finest collection of pure-bred stock exhibited in this section; their one opportunity of the year to meet and mingle with many of their old friends and acquaintances. Fort Worth stands with open arms to receive the big-hearted and jovial friends from the ranch and farm, and each year citizens endeavor to surpass all previous efforts to make their visitors' stay the most pleasurable and memorable occasion of their lives.

It is believed that all records for attendance will be broken at the 1912 show, and the people of Fort Worth, accordingly, are preparing to elaborately entertain the increased crowd, and this show will mark the beginning of a new epoch in the history of the livestock development of the great southwest.

There is a constantly growing demand on the part of southwestern farmers and stockmen for better grades of working and marketing animals, but this demand does not very materially affect the improvement of the livestock conditions. The annual exhibition of pure-bred stock at the National Feeders' and Breeders' Show has acted as a spur to those among the stockmen and farmers who at first failed to realize the tangible value and economic significance of better livestock. The judging of all stock will take place in the arena of the big Coliseum each day throughout the week of the show, and the prize-winners in each day's contest will be announced by the press throughout the state of Texas on the succeeding day. A bureau of information will, as usual, be located in front of the Coliseum for the accommodation of all visitors.

BOVINIANS REORGANIZE.

The Mystic Knights of Bovinia reorganized recently, electing Jim Callan, (former president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association) Ranch Boss, and preparations are now under way to receive and entertain the Cattle Raisers' when they hold their next annual convention at Fort Worth, 19-21, inclusive. The National Feeders' and Breeders' Show will also be held in Fort Worth at that time, opening on March 18, and closing March 23, and it is expected that fully 100,000 white will attend during the week. For a long time it has been the custom of the Bovinians of Fort Worth to raise money to entertain their friends, the cattle men of the Southwest, every year their convention was held in that city. This year more money was raised than ever before, the thousands of Cattlemen and week of March 18th can rest assured that they will be entertained most royally. In addition to all the elaborate "blow-outs" to be given in honor of the cattle men, there will be any number of special amusement "stunts" pulled off each day, and everything possible will be done to show the visitors the time of their lives.

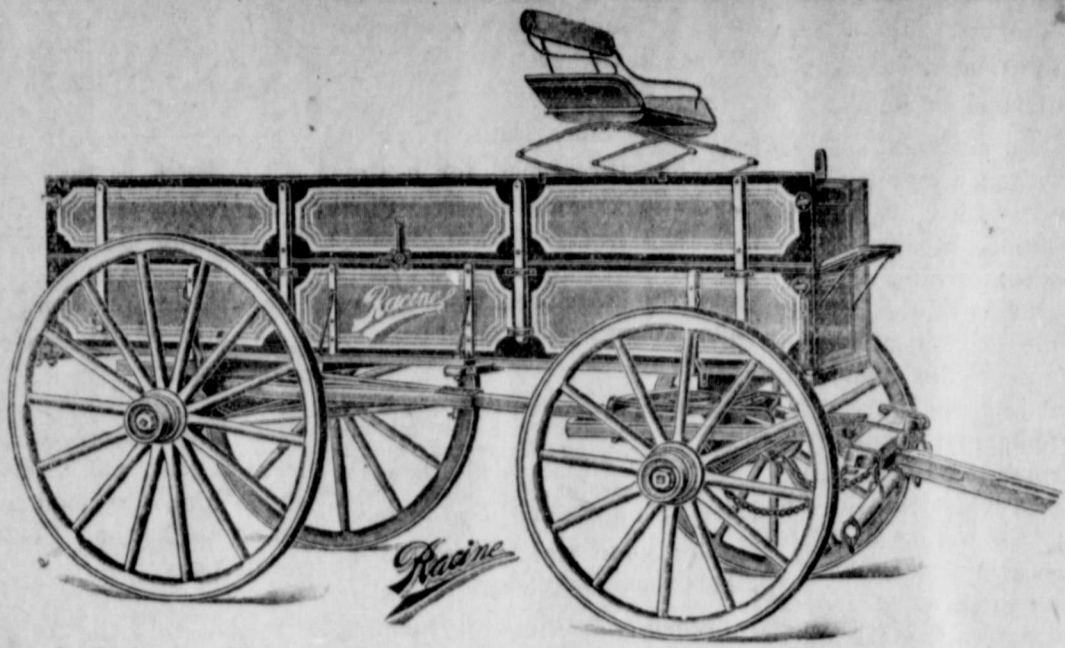

After shooting himself he went out of the room and called for help. He was heard by Dan Malloy, at whose home John was, and was carried back to his room and aid was summoned. Dr. Burleson being out of town, and Dr. Anderson also being away, Dr. Fenley, of Menard, was called in and dressed the wound and cared for the patient for several hours. Dr. Fenley and Dr. Burleson both treating the wounded man during Sunday. Monday Dr. Marberry, of San Angelo, called, but there was nothing then to do more than had been done. John held his own until Tuesday, when he began to sink. He was conscious all the time to the hour of his death. His mother, Mrs. J. A. Roberts, came in Monday from her home in Oklahoma and was with him until he died. He was buried in the Eden cemetery on Wednesday in the presence of a large number of his friends. The shot was an accident, and the untimely death of John B. has caused a great sadness to fall over our town. From a boy John B. has made his home here with his parents, and for the last two years, since the family has moved, he has still been here most of his time. He was a big-hearted, whole-souled boy whom all liked. He had ways that all deplored, but we knew his faults and could overlook them, and we knew his good traits and admired him in them. He was his worst enemy. Before dying, he told his mother he had made peace with God. Peace to his ashes!

Mrs. Dr. Anderson died last Thursday at the Moody Sanitarium, San Antonio. She has not been well since the family moved here about two years ago, and some six weeks since the doctor took her to Brownsville, hoping the change would benefit her health. From there she was taken to the sanitarium in San Antonio, but medical skill nor a change of climate would check the disease that caused her death. Interment was made at Kennedy, the old home of the doctor and family, Sunday. We extend our sympathy to the bereaved family.

Hon. Joe Adkins, of Brady, was in Eden Thursday and Friday. He is one of the most widely-known men in West Texas. He made a talk to the school, which was appreciated by the student body.

GOVERNMENT ADVICE.

Sought By Commissioners On Maintenance of Roads.

Application has been made by the county judge and the commissioners to the U. S. Department of Public Roads for expert advice concerning a system for the securing of the best administration, construction and maintenance of the roads now being built in Road District No. 1. The application is one of the forms furnished by the government, and provides for the furnishing by the county of all facilities necessary to enable the government engineer to inspect the roads and road material, to make the necessary surveys, and to make a report on such; the facilities to include livery and other transportation when needed. The government bears the expenses of the engineer to and from the county, as well as paying his salary.

That this will mean much to Brady will readily be seen, as it gives us the advantage of the best advice from the government experts at a comparatively trifling cost. If there is anything in the principle of scientific road building (and everyone must admit there is) McCulloch county will receive the full benefit of it.

In speaking with George D. Marshall, the government engineer, now assisting in the work of building the roads, he stated that he was engaged in carefully inspecting all roads in the district and collecting information for a complete report as to the best method of working each road, location and size of culverts, and what other information necessary to insure perfect drainage. After this report is made up, Mr. Marshall will prospect for gravel or other material suitable for road building, and he states that the farmers will find it greatly to their own interest, as well as of material assistance to the county in the building of the roads, to prospect on their own account, reporting any information of value to himself, Mr. Daugherty, any of the county officials or The Standard. The farmers are vitally concerned in the building of the roads, and their assistance in any way will tend to advance their own interests more so than any one else.

Mr. Marshall is highly complimentary in his remarks upon the work being done by Mr. Daugherty, and he says he is not only carrying out all the principles of modern road construction, but that he is at the same time, instructing several residents of the county in the work, who will be well fitted to

continue the work and look after the county's future improvements in this line.
