SUMMER NORMAL.

Brady's Application Is Approved at Austin.

Superintendent of Public Instruction J. K. Baze is in receipt of a letter from State Superintendent F. M. Bralley stating that Brady's application for a summer normal of the first series has been approved by the Department of Education.

The normal will be held here the early part of June, and the following will be the instructors: G. H. Hagan, San Saba, conductor; L. A. Koenig, Mason; H. B. Cowles, Menard; C. W. Lagrone, Paint Rock and J. F. Sutton,

Mercury, teachers; Miss Linnie Bell, Luling, primary teacher.

The normal is known as the Frisco Normal, and comprises a district made up of McCulloch, Mason, Menard and Concho counties. Of the six teachers in the normal faculty, five have permanent certificates, which, in itself, is evidence that the normal will be one of the best in this section of the state.

COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Accepts Bridges—Completes Purchase of Machinery.

Commissioners court has been in session this week attending to various duties, chief among which was the inspection of the bridges over Tiger, Onion and Elm creeks, and the low water bridge over the San Saba river at Camps, all of which were found satisfactory and accepted by the court.

The commissioners also completed the trying-out of the new oil pull engine. The engine, together with the two graders, was taken down on the Voca road yesterday morning, and thoroughly demonstrated to the satisfaction of the court, who thereupon accepted them and ordered payment to be made for the machinery purchased.

THE BRADY DAM.

Both Wings are Completed and Work Progressing on Center

The scene at the site of Brady's dam presents an interesting spectacle, and is the object of visits daily by a large number of Brady citizens. The cleaning out of the creek and its branches above the dam is still in progress, although about three miles of Brady and three-quarters of a mile on Post Oak have been put in shape. This in itself was no small task. All the trees in the area which will ordinarily be covered by water upon the completion of the dam, were cut down and carried away the brush and underbrush being burned or removed. The object was to remove any possibility of trees or brush falling into the reservoir, thereby presenting an unsightly appearance and also endangering the dam in case of a rise or overflow.

Both abutments on the dam have been completed. The one on the west side goes thirteen feet into the ground and has its foundation down in the solid rock, so as to prevent any seepings. The east abutment was also set down in the solid rock, but it was not necessary to make as great an excavation the other in order to secure the foundation. These abutments stand four feet higher than the center section of the dam.

Work is now in progress on the left hand section of the center. This likewise is set in solid rock, cutting off all seepage, and will rise to a height of eight feet above the surface of the rock. This section will be thirteen feet wide at the base and three feet wide at the top. As soon as this is completed work will be started on the opposite abutment, and the last work will be filling in the third section in the center.

The dam, when completed, will impound water sufficient to supply a city of 10,000 inhabitants, and be a credit to a city many times the size of Brady.

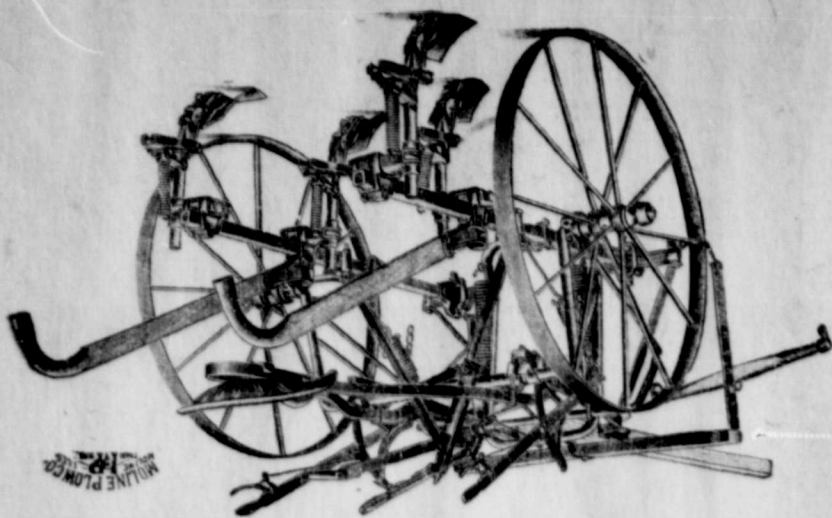

Well, as this is our first visit to The Standard, we won't stay long. If this escapes the waste basket we will call again.

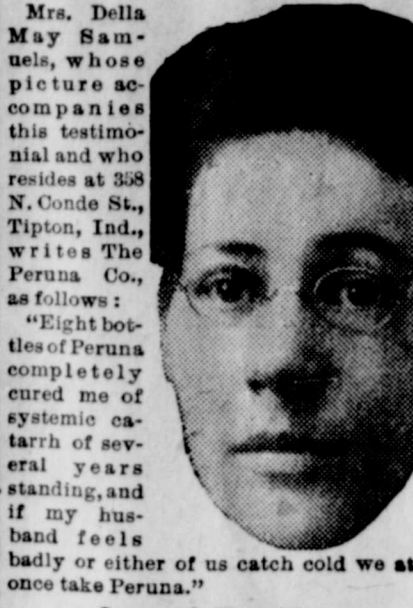

BOOSTING THE BOOSTERS.

Developments in the oil fields or possible oil fields, are being made everywhere in Texas, and just at present Childress county, out in the Panhandle is trying hard to develop an oil field. The interest of the enterprising citizens of that county in the success of the oil development is evidenced by the fact that citizens of Childress have subscribed a bonus of \$10,000 to the party or parties bringing in the first oil well producing 100 barrels per day; the well to be within seven miles of Childress and to last thirty days or more.

The bonus is a unique idea, and has stimulated interest in the field, and turned the eyes of prominent oil men all over the state in their direction. Likewise the drillers have exhibited more interest than ever, and are rushing their work in order to win the prize. It takes local encouragement and support to bring the good things home.

COME TO BRADY.

While the idea seems to prevail in some parts of the county that cases of meningitis and small pox are more or less numerous in Brady, nothing could be more erroneous. Brady never has had a single case of small pox and there has been no case nearer than Onion Gap community, ten miles from Brady. All the meningitis cases have been reported as they were declared by the health officers, and to date there have been four in number, three of which were of a very light form. The quarantine in two of the cases has been raised for a week or more, and the remaining two patients are improving rapidly and within a week the city will be free from quarantine.

Both Brady papers have deemed it the best policy to give a full and accurate account of each case as it developed, believing it better policy than to remain silent on the subject and thereby cause countless rumors and inaccurate statements to be floated about.

There is no cause for alarm; no cause to remain away from Brady. Her health record is as clean and as good as any city of its size in the state.

We feel greatly benefited by the norther, for it has cured our case of spring fever already. It's an ill wind that blows no one good.

Our readers must not judge the sockless editor of the *Messenger* to be Irish just because he wore the green on St. Patrick's Day. It's natural for him to look that way—Irish we meant.

AQUA PURA.

Ever since Brady was a town, in fact, before Brady was even on the map, its greatest drawback was the lack of water. No matter how much a Brady citizen boosted his home city to strangers, his enthusiasm could be cooled in a minute by the assertion, "But what about the water? Mighty scarce article, isn't it?"

Old citizens will tell that while enroute to Brady to locate they would be told that there wasn't enough water here to wash their face of a morning.

In spite of this handicap, Brady has grown and prospered, and grown more rapidly and prospered to a greater extent than most any city in the state. But Brady's dream is about to be realized—a dream of a supply of water in unlimited quantities; enough for all demand; sufficient to supply all demands for years to come and for a city three times its size.

Work on the dams that will impound an immense reservoir of water is progressing in a most satisfactory manner, and within a few months the work will be completed, thereby setting forever at rest any question as to Brady's water supply. And with this undertaking completed the door is opened to countless industries and factories that have heretofore failed to become interested for the simple reason that the most vital requirements, water, was lacking.

Looking backwards, through the years that were surmounted with obstacles and disappointments, and Brady's achievements loom up like a mountain; looking into the future, and with the achievements of the past in mind, Brady as the metropolis of West Texas seems almost a certainty.

WOULD IT LOOK WELL.

Someone has suggested that nothing would look prettier or be a better advertisement for the town than to place an arc light on each corner of the square, and another in the center on the highest point on the court house, where it could be seen from every part of town.

Does the idea appeal to you? It does to us, and we believe it will appeal to every man who has any pride in the town or who would like to see a system of street lighting inaugurated. With the oil field at Lohn coming into prominence more and more, the influx of prospectors and investors is increasing every day, and according to their impression of the town, so will they send the news out to the world. The question naturally arises, can Brady afford to al-

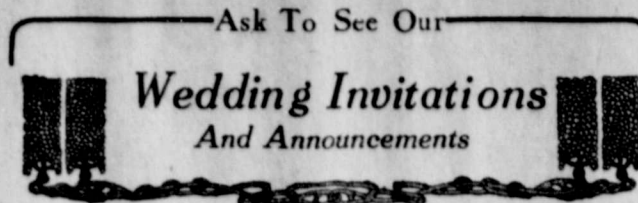

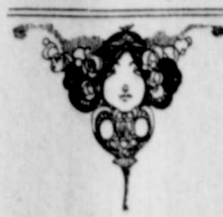

A TOWN BOOST.

Ask any commercial drummer what they consider is the most noteworthy feature about San Saba, and they will unhesitatingly state that it is her street lights. The well lighted appearance of the streets inspires the confidence of the visitors, and is a good talking point for San Saba. And a talking point is always a good advertisement for anything, anywhere.

San Saba is not a big city—it is a comparatively small place, just recently placed on the map by the coming of the railroad; more recently incorporated. Yet her citizens are alive to the possibilities of boosting the town, and one of their methods is to light all the main thoroughfares leading toward the depot, as well as a number of cross streets.

What other places have done, Brady can do, and do better. There is no question about Brady needing street lights; the problem is taking the initiative step. Once the movement is started, it will grow and expand until Brady will become known near and far as one of the best lighted cities in the state.—Brady Standard.

The Brady Country has an able booster in the person of Editor Schwenger, of The Standard. He never gets out an issue without saying something good about his town and county. But Schwenger is shrewd enough to know that a good booster must sometimes criticize. We print the above paragraphs from the last issue of The Standard because it pays a generous tribute to San Saba and also because it emphasizes what the Star has always contended, that a community, in order to grow, must recognize its own defects and hasten to remedy them.

Brady has much to be proud of, and we trust the matter of street lights will be attended to by her progressive citizens at an early date.—San Saba Star.

Brady is to have a broom fac-

tory, the machinery having already been ordered. The statement is made that in a short time the factory will be turning out brooms. More than that, the statement is made that the broom corn will cost \$230 a ton. The owner of the factory makes the statement that the price may not be expected, even with a large crop, to get below \$100. The average price for several years past has been about \$150. This country is a good broom corn country, the crop being about as certain here as the maize crop. Just why our people will not plant a few hundred acres of broom corn is hard to tell.—Brownwood Bulletin.

The broom corn offers a new field for diversification for the Brady country, and another opportunity for cotton acreage reduction. Many Texas towns could support a broom factory to the mutual benefit of producers and consumers.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

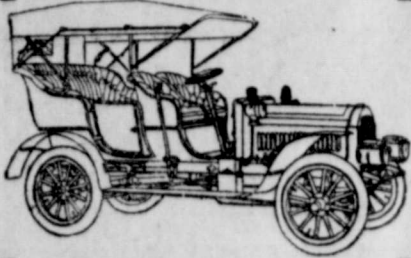

COMMERCIAL CORNER

By the Secretary.

It is always interesting to any owner of business to take an inventory of stock. It enables him to understand just where he is in a financial way. The same may be true when we speak of our natural resources and our mineral possibilities. The writer has been giving McCulloch county a very careful study recently as to what we have in minerals. We are a little astonished, as well as gratified, at our findings. Let us enumerate some of them as compiled from our investigations. By way of preface to what is to follow, I will grant that many of our good citizens will be very skeptical as to some of the things said to be here. The reason of this incredulity is that they have never seen any results so far. But, as I have some good authority, I will give them anyway.

From a bulletin just received from Wm. B. Phillips, Ph. D., director of Economic Geology in the University of Texas, I gather the following facts: There are in McCulloch county in more or less quantities, agate, beaumontite, biolite, chert, coal, natural gas, hemalite, limonite, petroleum, pyroaurite, travertine, turgite. To this we may add pottery clay, kaolin, brick shale and sand stone. Of course the general public knows but little of the commercial value of the above named minerals. In fact, at this time, but little attention is being given to these resources. But if we are fortunate enough to have these things here, there is nothing wrong in having an intelligent investigation of them. The work of starting a profitable development is most always a slow and tedious matter. For that reason, many become discouraged and follow other pursuits that bring immediate results.

I am astonished to find some men who think that it is useless to go further in the development of our petroleum resources. However, there were lots of men at Sour Lake, Beaumont and other places who said the same thing about those wonderful fields. But the croakings of such men are a good sign of something coming. You will notice that the frogs generally get busy just before the rain.

We are having some sample bricks made from the shale picked up right here in Brady. We have reports that it is first-class. But we expect to keep up the work until something really worth while happens.

In a quiet but careful way investigations will continue.

J. W. Griffin, Demonstrator

I take the liberty to make mention of a few demonstrators whose farms I visited this week. Messrs. B. B. Gabbert, Jim Rice, Geo. E. Youngdale, H. J. Hanson and W. G. Joyce. All have their plats in fine condition. These gentlemen are reading their bulletins, and doing good work. It's a pleasure to work with and try to help men who try to do their part. Allow me to insist upon every one who receives these bulletins and literature from the department reading them and studying them. Just as soon as we begin mixing a little more brains with our muscles, just that soon are we going to be on the road to a more successful and permanent system of agriculture, and no sooner.

The possibilities right here in this county are so great that I must say we are only in the beginning, and the farmer who is reading, studying, thinking and acting today is going to outstrip those who do not, tenfold in the years to come.

Warns Citizens.

R. F. Peden, justice of the peace of Tarrant county, through his clerk, W. H. Williams, sends the following warning to friends in this city: "There is lots of sickness here. There is a great deal of black small pox, and it is terribly fatal; it kills nearly all who take it. The papers here do not report the cause of deaths from it. Tell your friends to stay away from here during the Fat Stock show."

Under date of March 16th, the Fort Worth Record states that there is no epidemic in that city, and that there have been some cases of small pox, principally among the negroes and Mexicans, and states further that there are some cases of small pox in every community of any size in the state and have been since time immemorial. It states that in Fort Worth there have been all told, seventy-two cases, some already discharged and some still in the pest house. The Record also claims to have conscientiously published every bit of information about the presence of every infectious and contagious disease which has obtained there.

Nevertheless, the reports from the Fort Worth city health officers seem to bear Mr. Peden out, and indicate serious risk by those who have or are attending the Stock show.

BRADY HIGH SCHOOL.

Secures Affiliation With State University.

The following report has been made to the State University at Austin by its official visitor, Prof. C. D. Rice, who recently spent an entire day in Brady examining methods used by the high school teachers and grades on record by the high school pupils of the Brady public schools, a copy of which was sent Supt. R. H. Long. The report speaks for itself:

"I found a well disciplined, good working school. It is taught by three persons devoting their whole time to the high school proper. The superintendent does no teaching, supervising only.

"The principal of the high school, Prof. J. O. Wallace, is a live, wide awake, progressive young man. In fact, he is one of the best science teachers I have found for several years. His classes are enthusiastic in their work, especially interested in their laboratory practice. He has a good science equipment for Chemistry, Physics, Physiology and has made a good beginning in Physiography. The science at Brady is much better done than I have found in larger schools of the state.

"The Latin is taught at present by Prof. Miller, who recently took the place of Miss Lowrance. Mr. Miller was a former student at the University and for several years has been teaching at Thorp Springs. He is a live, wide awake teacher, and knows what he is doing. The school made a decided gain in the exchange of teachers.

"Miss Ward is engaged principally in giving the English. She is doing her work well and is meeting university requirements. The history is divided between Miss Ward and Mr.

Miller.

"Mr. Wallace, the principal, has most of the mathematics. He has promised to arrange the course of study in that subject to meet our suggestions.

"The trustees I met promised to give the school another teacher next year allowing more rest periods for the teachers and enabling them to carry out more nearly the departmental plan.

"After looking over the school I see no reason why it should remain on probation, and hence recommend that the school be retained with its affiliation as now given. In addition, I recommend that should specimen papers in Physics and Physiology be passed upon favorably by the schools concerned, affiliation be granted in those subjects."
