RAIN AND ICE.
Endangers Fruit and Other Crops Last Week.

Just about the time one gathers up a nice handful of moth balls in order to pack our winter clothes away, we don't. The reason is that it isn't necessary. A nice blue norther saves us the trouble. Last week we thought the momentous occasion had arrived, but it was not to be. A cold rain fell in gusts and sheets during Thursday night, freezing as it fell, and Friday morning our winter clothes were restored to favor once more.

The snap was not only unexpected, but was the coldest experienced for years at this season, and only the old timers can recall a similar experience. While the trees, as well as the ground, were covered with ice, the damage to fruit and crops was estimated at a very small figure because of the rain affording protection. Friday night, however, the freeze was much more severe in consequences, and fruit is reported more or less damaged in various sections of the county, and in several places maize and corn were bitten to the ground. Both of these latter will come out all right though. Reports upon the fruit crop vary, some claiming that fruit was not damaged, while others do not hold out as good reports, and it will be a matter of a week or two before anything definite concerning this can be had.

A SUGGESTION.

It has been suggested, and we have found the suggestion worthy of comment, that some patriotic society of Brady ladies should join the Daughters of the Confederacy in giving an entertainment for the purpose of securing funds to enable several of the old soldiers in Camp Ben McCulloch to attend the great Confederate reunion to be held in Macon, Ga., May 7, 8, and 9th. The rates to the reunion are very low, the round trip ticket being but about \$22, and stop-over privileges all along the line are permitted, as well as extensions of the time limit. Thus it will be seen that it would require no great effort to secure sufficient funds to give some three or four of our veterans this long to be-remembered pleasure.

One enthusiast on the subject voluntarily stated that he would give \$5.00 in the furtherance of such a movement, and there are numbers of Brady citizens who will not be backward about contributing support toward such a movement. The ranks of the boys who wore the gray are thinning with every year, and but a short time remains to make the surviving members happy with our attentions.

Let Brady citizens unite in the movement and provide means for sending several of the veterans to Macon for a last rally around the camp fires.

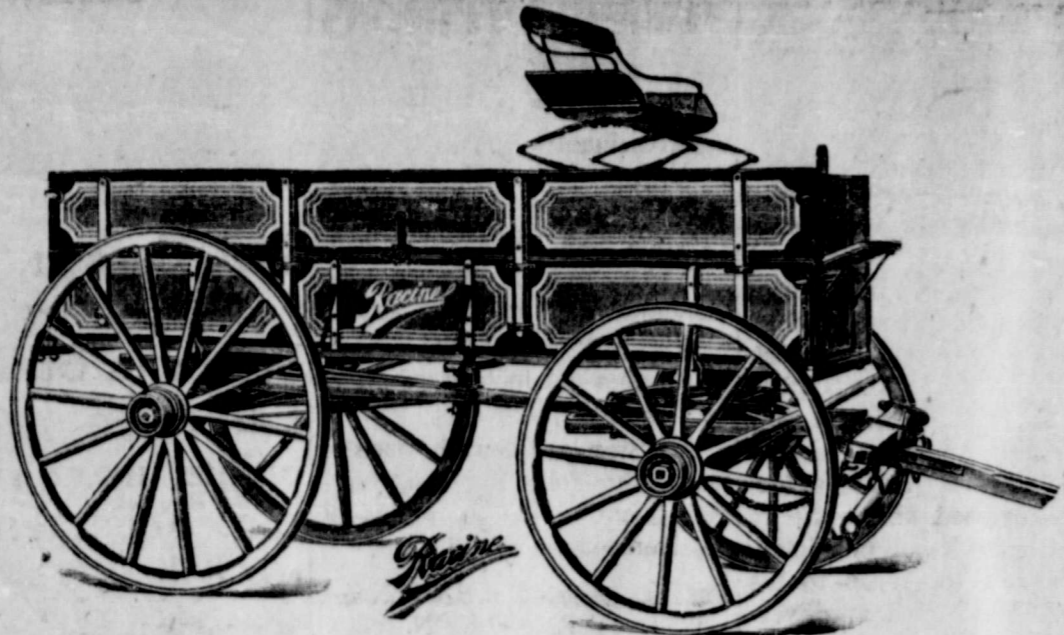
