## SCORES GREAT SUCCESS

CLUB BANQUET OCCASION FOR BOOSTERS.

The third annual banquet of the Brady Commercial club was a pronounced success. ## To the Democratic Voters of McCulloch County, Texas:

You are hereby called to meet in precinct convention at your regular place of holding elections, on Saturday, May 4th, 1912, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 8 p. m., for the purpose of electing delegates to your county convention to be held in Brady, Texas, at the court house, on the 7th day of May, 1912. Said county convention to send delegates to the National Democratic convention to nominate democratic candidate for president. The precinct chairman in each precinct shall preside at such meetings and the voters present may elect from their number present a qualified voter voting with the Democratic party as secretary, whose duty it shall be to keep a correct record of the things done. After the convention has been organized they may proceed to elect delegate or delegates to the county convention and transact such other business as may come before it.

The officers of said convention shall keep a correct list of all of the delegates appointed and of all proceedings had and shall return the same to the county convention, the same shall be signed by the chairman and the secretary and sealed and delivered to the county chairman of the county. No one shall be allowed to participate in the precinct conventions unless he be a qualified voter. Each precinct will be entitled to one vote, consequently one delegate to the county convention, for every 25 votes or major fraction of 25 votes cast for governor in the last general election.
