ORGANIZE LAKE CLUB

A FISHING, BOATING AND OUTING CLUB VENTURE.

J. E. Shropshire Places Splendid Site at Disposal of Club. Limited Membership.

"The Shropshire Lake and Boating Club" is the newest organization in Brady, and as its name indicates, it is purely a pleasure club. While the organization of the club has been under discussion for some weeks, it was not until last week that any active steps were taken toward organizing and enlisting members, and the ready response met with was a surprise and source of gratification to the promoters.

The following articles of agreement are largely self-explanatory:

"We, the undersigned, agree to each subscribe for a share in the 'Shropshire Lake and Boating Club,' to be organized in Brady, Texas, under plans similar to those adopted by the club owning a lake about six miles south of Brownwood, in Brown county, Texas. This said club to be conducted either as a joint stock company or as a corporation under by-laws similar to those under which the said Brownwood club is managed, said by-laws to be agreed upon and formed by our board of directors hereafter to be selected."

The site owned by Mr. J. E. Shropshire is a most beautiful one, about two miles from town, and admirably located for the purpose for which the club was organized. Its proximity to town will make it an ideal camping place for the business man, and the location itself cannot be excelled as a camping or fishing grounds. It is planned to construct a dam which will make the lake cover an area of about 35 or 36 acres, and as the membership is limited to forty, this will give each member nearly an acre of water in which to fish, boat, swim or grow fish in.

The members are all enthusiastic about the proposition, and since the list has been made out, the members have been besieged by numbers of citizens who desire fellowship in the organization. A meeting of the members will be held shortly, at which time the site will be inspected and the future course determined.

Died at Brownwood.

Mrs. T. J. McAfee was called to Brownwood Sunday by the serious illness of her father, W. T. Orr. A message from her yesterday brought the sad intelligence of his death at his home there Tuesday morning at 2 o'clock. Mr. Orr had taken suddenly ill Saturday night with congestion of the brain, which resulted in his death forty-eight hours later. He was about 50 years of age and was one of the prominent business men of Brownwood, having engaged in the general merchandise and other lines of business during the past seven years. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon. Mrs. McAfee has the sympathy of Brady citizens in her loss.

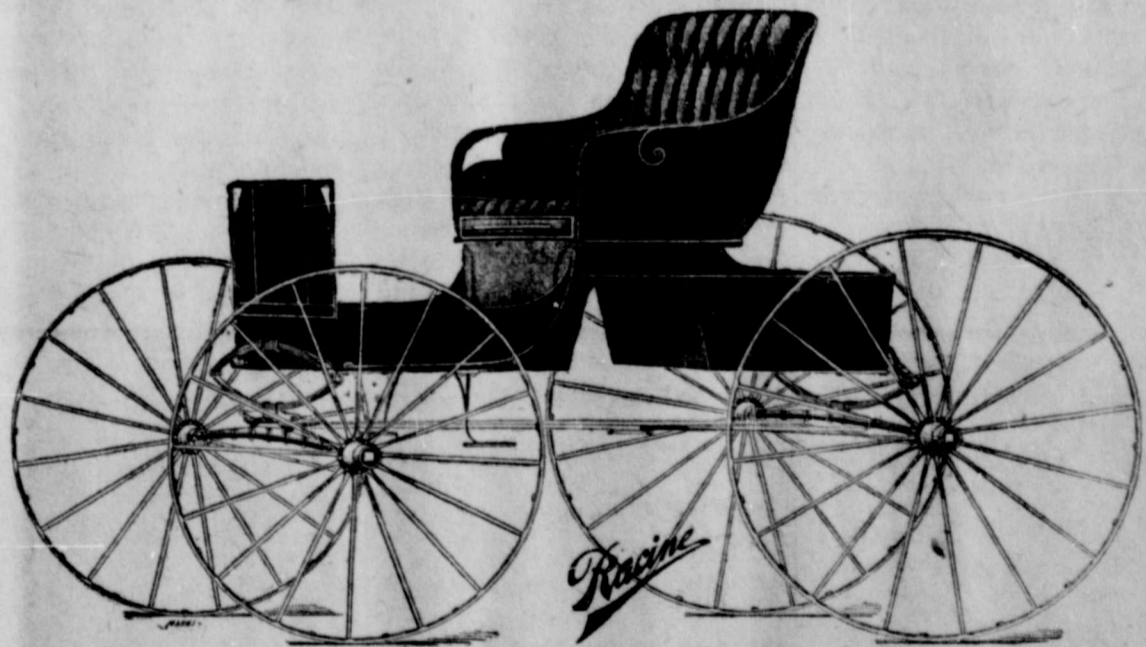
