SETTLEMENT EFFECTED.

With Abney & Vincent, Wilson and Jones Drug Co.

Adjustment of the claims for losses in the recent fire have been effected by the representatives of the insurance companies with Abney & Vincent, Jones Drug Co. and O. R. Wilson. Abney & Vincent secured a settlement in full of the loss on the building and stock, and they assumed the salvage from the fire. FORT WORTH BOOSTERS

GIVEN ROUSING RECEPTION UPON ARRIVAL IN BRADY

Live Wires Greeted by a Large Crowd of Citizens—Addresses Feature of Day.

The Fort Worth Trade excursionists, about seventy-five strong, arrived in Brady last Friday evening at 7:45 o'clock, on the last lap of their 1000-mile tour of Western Texas.

Immediately upon arrival at the union passenger station, the party formed in parade, headed by Prof. Conner's band of twenty-five musicians, and marched direct to the court house, where a short program of speeches was rendered.

The excursionists were welcomed to the city by Secretary Hardison of the commercial club after which short talks were made by members of the Fort Worth party. Wm. James, of the James-Mickle-Schow Wholesale Saddlery Co., told of the wonderful growth of the wholesale interests of the state in the past twenty-five years in which he had been in Texas, and assured the citizens of Brady and McCulloch county of the hearty cooperation of the Fort Worth wholesale interests in the development of this section of the state.

Mr. James was followed by Hon. Clarence Ousley, editor of the Fort Worth Record, who told of the wonderful development of the state along agricultural lines and put in a plea for diversification of crops as the proper method of obtaining the best results from the soil.

Short talks were also made by E. J. Hosey, of Armour & Co., and C. C. French, of the Fort Worth Stock Yards Co., also made short talks along lines of diversification, and emphasized the raising of more hogs. Mr. French is the originator of the Boys' and Girls' Hog Clubs, which have been organized so extensively over the state, and stated that he expected to return here at an early date and organize a club at this place.

Col. Louis J. Wortham of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram was the last speaker of the evening, and his remarks were along humorous lines, eliciting frequent applause from the large audience present. Indicative of the wonderful productivity of the soil of the great state of Texas, he told the story of the Tennesseean, who at the close of the civil war, returned from the field of battle to find his home in ruins, his farm devastated, the only thing left by Sherman in his march to the sea being his half starved wife and children and a yoke of old poor oxen and a broken down wagon. Thoroughly disheartened, he loaded his earthly possessions into the old wagon, hitched up the oxen to the wagon and started for Texas. After a long and tortuous journey he finally crossed Red river and camped on the south bank of the river for the night. That night one of the oxen died, and the old man could go no farther, so decided to locate there and make a crop with his one remaining oxen. And it is told that he marked and branded five hundred calves the next spring from this one oxen. The party left at 1:00 for the jumping off place.

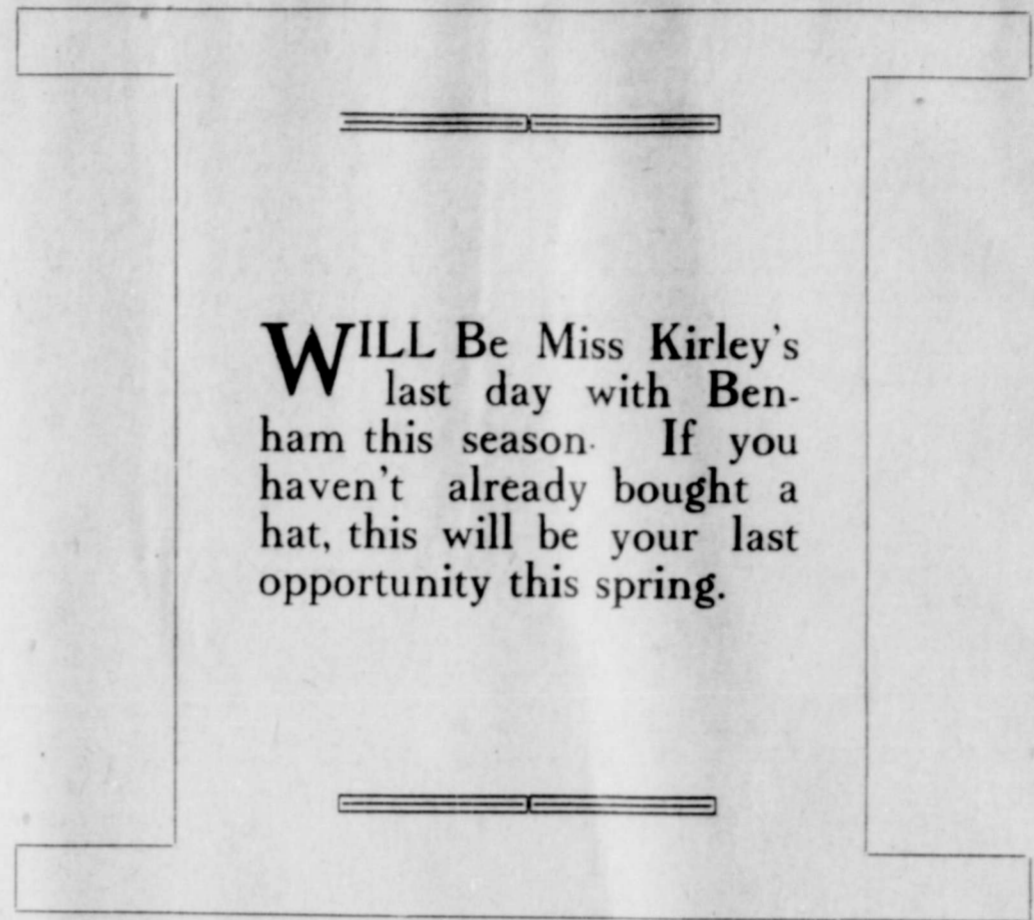
To the Voters of McCulloch Co.:
