We made remarks in this column recently about the advantage of local persons shopping in their home town, and still heartily recommend it. But someting that we didn't


minion in connection with it is the part we think that local merchants should play in attracting all the trade from this area.

# Important Cotton Vote Monday

Monday, December 15, Parmer County cotton growers will go to the polls to vote on whether marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1959 unland cotton crop. This is probably the most important referendum local farmers have ever voted on.

The secretary of agriculture is required to proclaim marketing quotas if the supply of upland cotton is more than the normal supply. Such a proclamation for the 1959 crop has been made by Secretary, Benson.

Marketing quotas cannot be continued in effect, however, without the approval of at least two-thirds of the cotton growers voting in a referendum on the question. So the next step is to hold a referendum in which farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1958 are eligible to vote.





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

Readers of Farm and Home will probably show more than passing interest in an experiment we learned of through the Texas Department of Agri-

culture. While our area is not predominantly dependent upon cotton as is the case of the farm we will tell you about in the hypothetical switch from cotton to beef, the fact that it was an all-cash-crop type setup has a familiar ring in these parts. The constant search for more

farming profits has led to an experiment aimed at making a drastic switch from exclusive cotton production on a medium sized farm to a small beef production center. Agricultural research ex-

perts began with a 132-acre South Carolina cotton farm, studied all possibilities, and launched a five-year program to convert it to a 161-acre beef and small grain project. This basic change is predicted to increase annual cash receipts

by the state ASC committee was only 1.6 percent for 1959. This Bailey is the first time this reserve Borden has been held to below 6 percent and the small reserve this time enabled farmers all over the state to retain more acreage than was anticipated under operation of the new 1959 farm bill.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has allocated 16,310,000 acres among the 21 cotton producing states for 1959 cotton, and the portion of that for the state of Texas is 6,846,752 acres. The 1958 allotment for the nation was 17,554,528, and for Texas it was 7,474,661. County ASC offices throughout the state this week are mailing 1959 allotments to farmers. These allotments are needed before farmers vote December 15 in the cotton referendum to determine whether marketing quotas will be operative for the 1959 crop.


