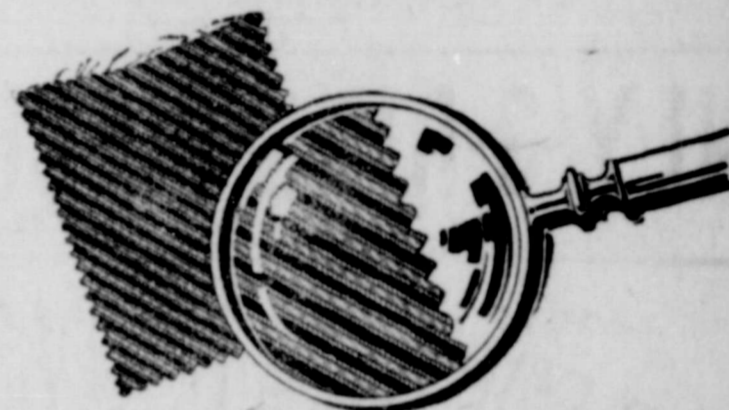

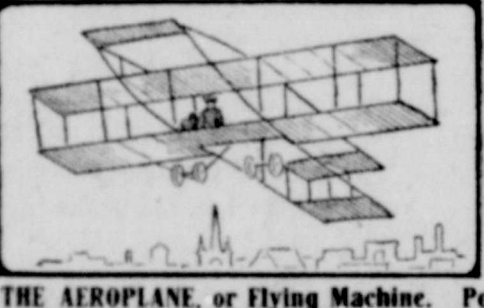

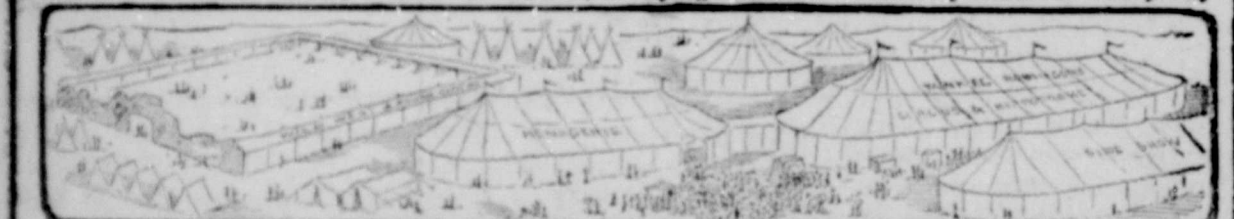

This meeting will be held in conjunction with the McCulloch County Poultry Association. It was suggested that this day for the county exhibit should be the beginning of a regular trades day for Brady. The time set for this display will be October 19th. At this time the regular premiums will be hung up for those who successfully compete for them. We shall endeavor in the next issue of this paper to have a list of all premiums and also such rules as may govern the exhibit.
