JUDGE A. G. WALKER DEAD.

Ex-Confederate Veteran and Highly Respected Citizen.

Quietly and without a struggle, Judge A. G. Walker answered the last roll call Sunday morning, and crossed the river to the brighter shores beyond. His death came as a surprise and shock to his family and his friends as well, as he had apparently been in good health and spirits up to Saturday night being actively engaged in his professional duties about town. When the members of his family tried to awaken him Sunday morning he was found cold in death, but so suddenly had the final summons come that he appeared rather to be sleeping. A physician was called, who pronounced the cause of death as heart failure.

Judge Walker was born in Simplin county, Miss., July 4, 1847, and at the time of his death was 65 years of age. During the civil war he enlisted in a Mississippi regiment, serving with distinction. Shortly after the close of the war he came to Texas, and for a number of years he was located at Lampasas. There he was married in 1880 to Miss Mary Adkins.

From Lampasas he moved to Quanah, where he was located for some time, moving from there to Hill county, and coming to Brady about eight years ago since when he and his family had made their home here.

Mr. Walker was a splendidly educated man with scholarly attainments, and while he was an attorney by profession, many of the prominent citizens of Lampasas county today remember him as one of the best teachers they ever knew. He was a man of kindly disposition, sincere in all his ways, and a man who was never heard to speak disparagingly about anyone behind their back. He was a member of the Christian church, having joined the church in 1892 at Quanah when Rev. Chas. Benton was pastor. He was a member of the local lodge of Odd Fellows, and also a member of the K. of P. lodge at Lampasas. He bore the distinction of being one of the oldest Odd Fellows in the state of Texas. Mr. Walker was likewise a member of the local Camp Ben McCulloch, and was one of the leading spirits in the entertainments of the camp. For the past year he had served as attorney for the Santa Fe in Lampasas, San Saba and McCulloch counties, having been appointed to the position shortly after the extension of the Santa Fe to Eden was completed.

The funeral services were held Monday afternoon and were most impressive. Rev. Caperton conducted and was followed by Rev. Hardison, the ex-Confederate veterans assisting in the services. Interment was made in Brady cemetery under the auspices of the Odd Fellows.

Surviving are his widow, two sons, Roy, of Lampasas and Lee of Kansas City, and two daughters, Mrs. Paul Willoughby and Miss Helen Walker of this city, besides several brothers. Of his brothers only one, Jack Walker, of Mineral Wells was able to be present at the funeral. Mr. and Mrs. Roy Walker were called here, but Lee Walker, who is in railroad construction work in Kansas and Missouri, could not be located until yesterday, and was therefore unable to be present.

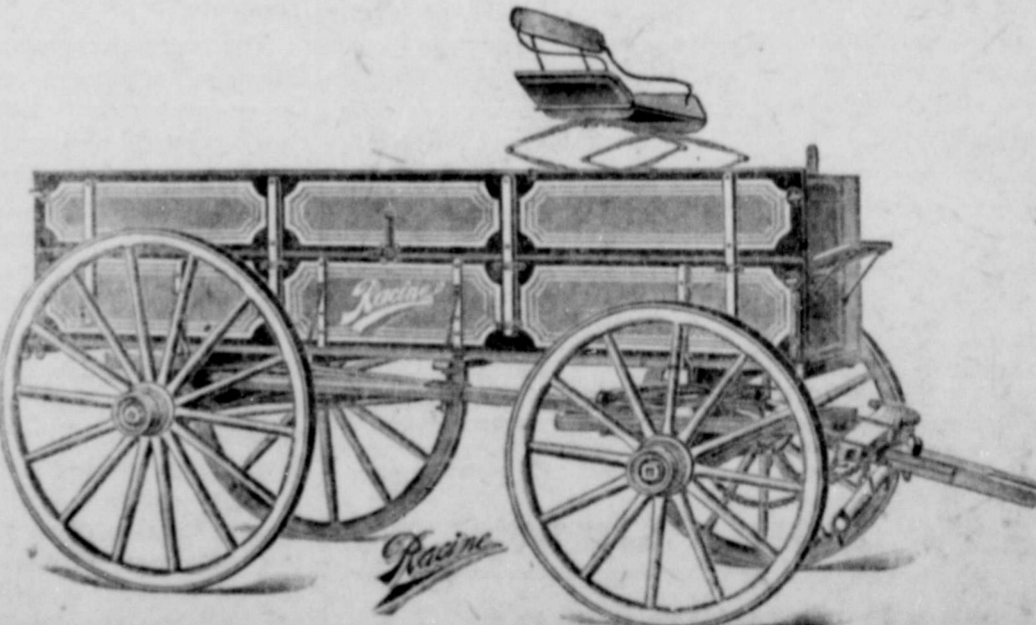
