### COMMERCIAL CORNER By the Secretary.

#### UNITED CHARITIES.

A Worthy Organization That Is Deserving of Support.

We wish to call attention to this organization in our city. It was organized about eighteen months ago for the purposes of assisting the needy and keeping off our streets many papers and professional beggars unworthy of assistance. This has been done fairly well until recently when our funds have given out.

Our city council, recognizing the importance and the relief that this society would give to the people of the city, passed an ordinance forbidding the collection and the passing of beggars on the streets of Brady. The only exceptions to this ordinance being the churches of our town or the party taking a paper for collection purposes must be by the authority of the mayor or the United Charities Association.

Some few weeks ago two of our ladies started to collect funds for the treasury that has long since been empty, but some of our citizens thought that the collections were coming too often and they quit. Yet there have been only three regular collections taken during the eight-month period. First, in February, 1911; then in September, 1911, and the last one in November, 1911. Now, it is November again. If that be too often, then we had just as well quit.

There are cases that come up every week even when there is work to do, still some who are unfortunate are not able to work or cannot prevent illness by being poor and helpless. Unless some help can be given by those who are able to help, we had better appeal to the city council to repeal the ordinance mentioned above and let our streets open to all classes of deadbeats and unworthy beggars.

Almost every city in the state recognizes the importance of a systematic method of dealing with the helpless and the poor. We should put our institution upon a firmer basis.

One good man asked me why we do not send around a collector. Well, that is easily answered. We have no one to go. All we ask, provide some excuse, and they have good reasons. So many men will stop and object and make the solicitor feel that they are imposing upon the public, that they do not care to be humiliated for giving their time to a needy cause. At the same time that fellow will spend more in one day on himself for his gratification than he will give in a month for charity. At the same time it should be a pleasure to do a simple duty that we owe to our fellow man.

Suppose we do something for our city along this line. Can you not put something to the credit at each bank to the United Charities? This can be easily done as you transact your other duties and save a lot of worry about collections.

Mrs. C. K. MacFadden Meets Terrible Fate.

Word has been received here that Mrs. C. K. MacFadden was burned to death Wednesday of last week in a hotel fire in St. Louis. MacFadden, who was located here for several months, and who was interested in promoting the McCulloch county oil fields. The fire in which she lost her life occurred in the Berlin hotel at St. Louis, and, according to a confession, the hotel was set on fire by a nurse who wished to see some excitement, and who also set on fire the Windmore hotel at St. Louis. The latter fire was discovered in time to be extinguished with small loss, but the Berlin hotel fire had gained such a start before discovered that the building was destroyed and four guests—three women and a man—lost their lives.

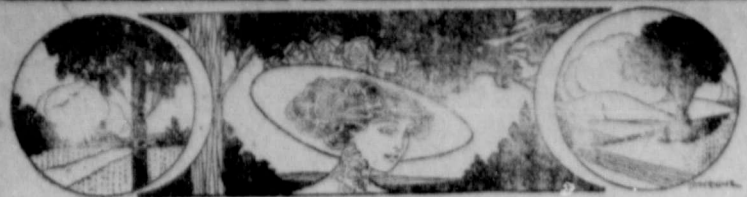
