PROPOSITION CARRIES

CITIZENS RATIFY PROPOSED CONTRACT.

Vote Stands 128 For, 75 Against the Waterworks Proposition, Giving Majority of 53.

The proposed contract between the city council and the owners of the Brady Water and Light Co., for the purchase of the waterworks system and lighting plant for the sum of \$42,250, Saturday was ratified by a vote of the citizens of Brady, the election resulting in 128 votes being cast in favor of the proposition as submitted and 75 against the same, making the majority in favor 53.

The election passed off quietly, and up to noon the indications were that very little interest was being taken in the election, voting being very light. In the afternoon the voting was quite brisk, and a total of 203 votes was recorded.

The good majority in favor of the proposition is a source of gratification to the members of the city council who submitted the proposed contract to the citizens of Brady, as well as to all who favored the issue. On the other hand, not a single complaint has come from those who were in opposition to the same, but every citizen has signified his willingness, now that the question has been settled, to do everything in his power to help the city build a waterworks system that will redound to her credit and be a model for other cities.

That there was a great change in favor of the proposition during the day or two preceding the election there can be no doubt, and many who opposed the proposition, went to the polls Saturday and voted for the same. The change in feeling no doubt was due largely to the mass meeting held Friday night, at which the proposition was thoroughly discussed, both by friends and opponents of the proposed contract, and at which many of the problems that had perplexed the citizens were satisfactorily explained. The citizens who took active part in the discussion were Mayor F. M. Richards, Aldermen A. C. Baze, C. D. Allen, I. G. Abney; Dr. B. L. Craddock, Henry Miller, Judge Joe A. Adkins, Tom Bell and others. The utmost harmony prevailed, the various speakers setting forth their views and opinions, without attempting to dictate to anyone or to provoke a clash. Something like 75 or 100 citizens were in attendance.

The council met last night in regular session, at which time the election returns were canvassed and plans discussed for the formal taking over of the plant.

The Pittsburgh Filter Co., which installed the filter plant in Brady, was the successful bidder for the installation of a new plant at Waco.

DESTROYS OIL MILL.

Fire Loss At San Antonio \$250,000 or More.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 15.—Fire tonight destroyed the Alamo Oil and Refining Company's plant. The loss is estimated at between \$250,000 and \$300,000. The oil mill was one of the largest in the state. T. A. Coleman was president and C. H. Bencini of Fort Worth, vice president. The origin of the fire was not ascertained. The fire being about 8 o'clock and despite all efforts of the firemen it was impossible to stop the spread of the flames, and the entire plant was destroyed. With the plant burned a great quantity of cotton seed and oil. For a time, many other buildings in that immediate neighborhood were threatened.

The above clipping is an account of the second fire that has visited the Bencini mill at San Antonio this year, the first having occurred last August right at the opening of the season, with a reported loss totaling \$45,000. The burned mill was immediately rebuilt, and has been in operation up to the time of the fire Friday night. C. H. Bencini, who was in San Antonio at the time of the last fire, gave out a statement that the mill would be rebuilt immediately with fire-proof structures.

INSURANCE RATES.

With the acquisition by the city of the waterworks plants, the proposition of greatest importance to the citizens, next to the distributing of an abundant supply of pure water to every part of the city, is the reduction of the insurance key rate of Brady by the replacing of the six-inch mains within the fire limits with eight-inch mains, thereby making a reduction of \$1.00 on the \$1,000 in the present rate. That this will mean an immense saving can be seen at a glance, and the opinion seems to prevail that this change cannot be made too soon.

Eight-inch mains have already been laid from the new stand pipe to the old stand pipe at the top of Blackburn and from the filter plant to the south west corner of the square, and it is estimated that the balance of the \$40,000 fund received from the sale of the water bonds will just about cover the expense of taking up the six-inch pipes about the square and the purchase and laying of eight-inch mains in their stead, connecting with both the mains from the filter plant and from the stand pipe.

While of urgent importance, this is but one of the many improvements that will have to be undertaken in the rebuilding of the waterworks system, and in their undertaking of this great task, the city council will find the citizens of Brady working with them in peace and harmony—all striving with a unity of purpose for that great goal, the upbuilding of Brady and the advancement of her best interests.

BEST INVESTMENT.

Brady is to vote on the purchase of the city waterworks on Saturday. The Bulletin doesn't know anything on earth about the price or the terms, but if these are satisfactory, the city should by all means purchase the plant. No city should pass up any reasonable opportunity to own and control its public utilities. Brownwood's waterworks system has proven its best investment. —Brownwood Bulletin.

Brady has followed the example set by Brownwood in the purchase of the waterworks system, and has gone Brownwood one better by already having ready for service an up-to-date filter plant, thus assuring Brady citizens the purest water that it is possible to obtain so far as the knowledge of man goes.

\$100,000 BONUS READY

FREDERICKSBURG PUTS UP BIG SUM FOR RAILROAD.

Will Give \$50,000 When Through Train Service Is Established. Contract Is Signed Up.

Telephone messages received from Charles Nimitz, chairman of the Fredericksburg railroad committee, are to the effect that a contract was signed for the construction of a line of road from that place to a road on the San Antonio & Aransas Pass railway. To bring about the construction of this railroad the business men of Fredericksburg will give a bonus of \$150,000 in cash, right-of-way through Gillespie county and terminal facilities in the town.

The Chamber of Commerce of San Antonio is pledged to give \$50,000 toward the construction of the railroad. This sum is to be paid when through train service is established between San Antonio and Fredericksburg.

Business men of Fredericksburg have subscribed \$100,000 of the bonus that is asked of them. The remainder is to be raised within ten days. Messages from that city said there was no doubt but the additional \$50,000 will have been gotten together within a week, and probably less time. There is a great deal of enthusiasm over the signing of the contract, which the Fredericksburg committee believes insures them a road, as the contractor, Oscar Crane, will put up a bond of \$250,000 to insure the construction of the road. He is to begin work immediately after Fredericksburg has raised the entire bonus.

The bonus which Fredericksburg gives for a road is one of the largest ever offered in this state. It is equivalent to \$6,000 a mile for the twenty-five miles that span the distance from that town to Comfort, where the connection with the San Antonio & Aransas Pass will likely be made. By some railroad engineers who have gone over the ground this is considered the most logical route. Should the road be built to Comfort the contractor will have the benefit of almost twenty miles of dump that was thrown up years ago when a new railroad seemed to be in the making. The project, however, failed, but the dump still stands, and much of it can be used with but little additional work thereon.

The right-of-way is a strip of valuable land opening, as it opens into one of the richest ag-

ricultural regions in the state, and then the terminal properties which will be given at Fredericksburg are worth much.

The people there, however, believe the railroad is worth almost any price to them to overcome the handicaps they have been working under because of the lack of railway facilities. San Antonio business men look on the project in a similar light, and for that reason the Chamber of Commerce stands pledged to give \$50,000 when the train service is established. Despite the hardship and the long haul overland, the greater part of the business from Fredericksburg has come to San Antonio. That town is within the defined trade territory of this city.

As Fredericksburg sees it, the new road will not alone mean greater expansion, but will cheapen many articles and at the same time create greater wealth for the farming element. As an illustration of this it was pointed out not long ago that so valuable a by product of the fields as cotton seed could not be profitably marketed in many instances, as the overland transportation charges would eat too deeply into the returns from the sale. This is merely an instance of where the more modern transportation will create the market. The Fredericksburg community is rich in things agricultural, and it is doubtful if there is a more thrifty section in the state.

The town has long been on the map, and despite the many set-backs the people have had in their fight for a railroad, the white flag has never been hoisted. The substantial business men fought against all obstacles, and yesterday's report from them have only an optimistic tone. Thus, it seems a railroad is assured after a long struggle covering a period of probably a score of years.—San Antonio Express.

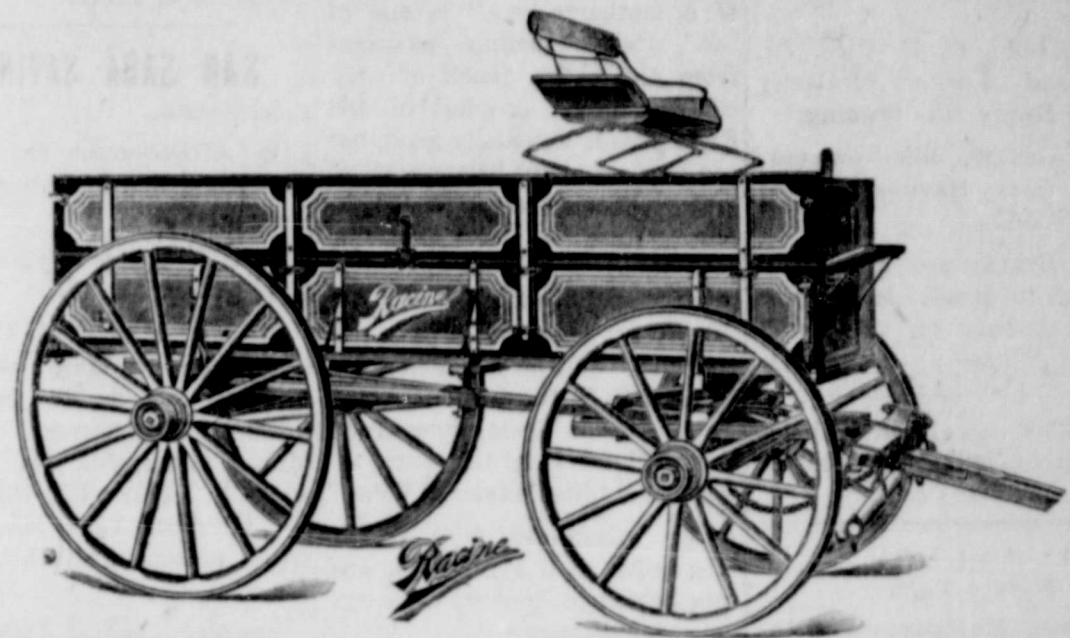

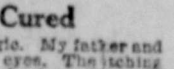
